

### **Woodend Community & Cultural Centre update**

Members of Woodend Community & Cultural Centre's team were inspired this month by a visit to the recently opened Berninneit community centre in Cowes, along with representatives of Macedon Ranges Shire Council. With a population



similar in size to Woodend's, but extending to 40,000 over the tourism season, the centre has replaced Cowes' aged tourism information centre and library with one that also offers a multitude of gathering spaces, cinema and kiosk. This venue has also been certified with Passivhaus status. Funded pre-Covid, the centre is sympathetic with timber and glass features similar to Woodend's own Concept Plan ideals.

The Woodend project is refining its concept offering and is identifying the activities that it can provide to the shire and beyond that are not currently provided in other Council venues, recognising the performances currently held in the Kyneton Town Hall and the arts-based activities that will be enhanced by the development of the former Kyneton Primary School precinct. The future Woodend venue will instead offer the Woodend and broader shire community a sensitively designed, flexible, contemporary and relevant space to host

essential attractions for both locals and those travelling to Woodend. While the town already draws visitors for a range of activities from the Woodend Winter Arts Festival to a scout meeting, the current Woodend centre is aging and there is a shire-wide need for an open, affordable and modern central facility that is postioned centrally, with immediate access to rail, shops, and parking, to host local dance, lectures, festivals, school concerts, yoga and all ability presentations and events. Woodend has the potential to fulfil this unmet need, with its proposal for a new centre, which will ensure grassroot events have a place to grow and develop and be enjoyed by residents and visitors alike.

# Islay House restored

Sitting just north of Five Mile Creek opposite the primary school, Islay House has a colourful history and is well known to locals. First catering to the hopeful miners heading to the Bendigo goldfields it has recently been renovated and opened for luxury colonial-style accommodation.

New owners Clive Warner and Tarni James moved to Woodend irresistibly drawn by the charm of the building. "It was love at first sight. We adored Islay House from the moment we laid eyes on it and have enjoyed the hard work bringing it to our taste. We wanted to respect the history of the property and blend that with modern expectations,

Clive, trained as a boat builder with a long career as an international motorcycle racer and Tarni, a television producer and journalist, have been 'on the tools' for the past sixteen months, with the help of long term renovation collaborator Andrew Wiffen and great support from the Woodend

hardware store!

"People have been really interested in our progress, stopping for a chat, taking photos, giving advice - we always invite them in to see what we're doing.

"It's named after the Scottish Isle of Islay (pronounced eye-luh) the Celtic heritage of the house's name would have certainly pleased my mum and the fact that Isle of Islay is synonymous with fine, smoky Scotch whisky would certainly have pleased my dad! We felt an instant connection to the house and love the town."

The owners opened the property for a viewing on Saturday 17 February. "The day was a huge success, and we were really happy that so many local people came to view what we have done. We are very conscious that Islay House belongs not only to us, but to the whole town and everyone has an interest in the property! We hope to do right by the house and the community!"

Though the proprietors had anticipated a very small crowd of maybe 20, their

neighbours knew better, warning them to "get ready!"

"With their help, we had a volunteer steward in each room equipped with a cheat sheet of information about the renovations and the origins of the furniture and antique fittings and art works," said Tarni. "To our delight, 255 people came through. It was like a Bourke Street tram at peak hour! 100% positive comments flowed in, and we were very grateful for the feedback," she said.

A 'lucky dip' for a free night's accommodation was held - Mike Garnett was the winner. "His son and daughter-in-law will be enjoying a night with us."

Another open day will be held down the track, and Islay House is taking bookings through Visit Macedon Ranges website or Airbnb.

# Honouring Every Role, **Every Sacrifice: 2024 Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service**

The 2024 Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service will take place on April 25 at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross.

The local community are invited to attend and help acknowledge this year's theme, 'Honouring Every Role, Every Sacrifice', showcasing the different ways that Australians have served, and continue to serve, in wartime, conflict or peacekeeping.

As part of the service, students from local schools will read excerpts from the accounts of local veterans, including 99-year-old Joy Daymon from Woodend North who served as a Flight Mechanic in the Women's Auxiliary Australian Airforce (WAAAF) from 1943–1946 and 102-year old Joyce Strawhorn from Kyneton, who served as a cook, cleaner and ambulance driver during her period of service, which included the Women's Air Training Corps (WATC), the WAAAF and the Australian Women's Army Service (AWAS).

There will also be a special tribute to late Gisborne-based veteran Robin Funston, who had served as a Chief Petty Officer mechanic for the Royal Australian Navy during Vietnam and was a life member of the RSL, serving as president and secretary of the Gisborne sub-branch.

This year's service is expected to be a special one, according to President of the Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service (MMADDS) Committee, Leona Latcham.

"We have found some wonderful stories that show the diverse ways that our local veterans have contributed to protecting our country, and we really look forward to sharing them with the community on Anzac Day. There's something so special about the dawn service at the Cross – it's an iconic location that sets a very moving scene for the morning's proceedings."

The service commences at 6am and runs for approximately an hour. Free shuttle buses run from Tony Clarke Reserve in Macedon from 4.15am as roads to the Cross are shut to public traffic for the morning for the safety of attendees.

Plenty of parking is available at Tony Clarke Reserve and a free bus service will also run from Gisborne, Woodend, Sunbury, Kyneton, Riddells Creek, Lancefield and Romsey. The timetables for the town buses will be available closer to the date.

Attendees are encouraged to dress for the weather and bring a water bottle, torch and cash to purchase a snack or drink on the day, with any donations also appreciated.

MMADDS thanks its sponsors, including the Victorian Government through the Victorian Veterans Council, Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Bendigo Community Bank Gisborne and Region, Public Transport Victoria, Gisborne Region Events Activities & Tourism and KGMG Creative. # The History of the Vanuatu **School Project**

As regular travellers to Vanuatu to support local business training, Allan Cann OAM and Shirley Cann OAM became concerned about the number of children they saw out and about during school hours.

"In 2017 in Port Vila, we noticed that many children were not in class. We went to see the Ministry of Education and Training to ask why this was and were told that many parents could not afford to send their children to school, and the schools were so overcrowded new students were often turned away," explains Allan.

Allan and Shirley proposed to the Woodend Rotary Club that we construct new classrooms at a Vanuatu school. The Club agreed to build a new cyclone rated building and set a budget of around \$80,000. The project was made possible in part by a grant from The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, as well as support from the Rotary Clubs of Wendouree, Werribee, Yarra Bend, Kardinia and Swan Hill Sunrise and the community of Woodend through events and generous donations via the collection tin at Bourkies.

Originally the project was planned for Ambae Island, but following a volcanic eruption, the residents were evacuated, with many going to Mwast; so the focus shifted to that remote village, about 25km from Luganville, the capital of Espiritu Santo.

In 2019, the Club signed an MOU with the Vanuatu Ministry of Education and Training for the design, supervision and construction of the new building. Rotary paid for the materials and the community agreed to undertake the construction of the new building.

Construction commenced the same year, but faced a number of lengthy delays following Cyclone Harold in 2020 and then the pandemic. It commenced again in 2022.

An important partner in the project has been the Rotary Club of Santo, whose members built a wash stand and tank to support the increased numbers of students and who helped us source the solar panels and battery from a local Vanuatuan supplier.

# "It was a welcome none of us will ever forget."

Last month, a group of sixteen Woodend Rotarians, including family and friends, travelled to Vanuatu for the official opening of the new school building at Mwast Primary and Junior Secondary School on the island of Espiritu Santo.

We were greeted by villagers and students in traditional dress performing songs and dance in a ceremony that they had designed and planned especially for the occasion. School students then took the hands of each guest and led us into the grounds where the whole school was waiting. After we took our seats, the children sang a special song welcoming us from Woodend, Australia to Vanuatu.

During the opening ceremony, school principal Diallo Wabak spoke about the importance of the new school building to the surrounding villages. The school has grown from 120 to over 300 students, with some walking over an hour each way every day. The solar panels and battery we installed late last year mean the school now has lights and can be used for meetings and study after hours. Electricity also means the students can start learning to use computers and, with a new communications tower nearby, they can even use the internet.

Diallo Wabak is especially proud that last year, for the first time ever, 21 students from the school sat the national year 10 exams with a pass rate of 95 per cent.

He also took the opportunity to share his vision and future plans for the school with us. The club is now working with him to look at the feasibility of a new outdoor covered area for the school.

It was indeed a day to remember. Before we could enter the new school building we were handed a machete and each of us had to cut down a tree in a "jungle" planted in front of the door. We were then shown around the classrooms by the students and treated to a feast prepared by the teachers using traditional local ingredients.

On behalf of Woodend Rotary Club, President Deidre Willmott thanked the Mwast community for their support for the project and told the students how proud we are of their achievements and their desire to learn new knowledge and skills.

All Rotarians and friends travelled from Australia at their own expense. The attendees express their gratitude to Macedon Ranges Travel Service for their dedicated assistance.

We also thank Ed Irons and the Woodend Bookshop for generously donating children's books for us to take to Mwast School.'



# Would you like a flying scholarship?

The Kyneton Aero Club (KAC) flying scholarship will continue this year, 2024.

The scholarship is a support program for young people with a demonstrated interest in aviation. It is open to new students and to people who have already commenced flight training.

It is open to persons aged between 16 and 22 years of age until 30 of April 2024.

The scholarship will pay 50% of the cost of each instructional or flying hour, to a maximum total value of \$5,000. This value will be provided progressively as the training is undertaken.

Former Scholarship applicants are encouraged to re-apply.

#### **Selection Criteria**

Applicants must:

- undertake a trial introductory flight with KAC at the applicant's expense
- in a letter of less than 500 words, demonstrate to the assessors their passion for aviation.
- provide a reference of fewer than 300 words from a member of the community (not a family member), such as a school teacher or community leader who has known the applicant for at least two years
- be no younger than 16 and no older than 22 years of age
- if under the age of 18 years, provide written consent from a parent or guardian to allow them to undergo Recreational Aviation Australia (RAAus) flying training



- meet the medical requirement for the issue of a motor vehicle driver's licence
- live within a practical distance of the Kyneton airfield with suitable transportation.

### **Expectations**

KAC expects that scholarship recipients will:

- possess the necessary English language skills and general aptitude.
- agree to participate in ongoing surveys and evaluation activities after completion of the scholarship.
- consent to KAC promotional and reporting publicity in full.
- inform KAC of extenuating circumstances that will delay or prevent their training progression.
- actively participate in Kyneton Aero Club activities and fundraising events.

# Message from your local sergeant

Hello again – time for my regular update! Crime has been relatively stable; there have been a number of thefts from motor cars – mainly after people



have left valuable items within view, plus there have also been a few tradies' vehicles targeted. So, as I always say, don't leave anything in your cars like phones or wallets, and tradies, it's always advisable to have your vehicles in garages, or parked in the backyard, behind gates and not on the street.

I see that there has been a tentative start on the Black Forest Drive roadworks. It will be interesting to see how this pans out. I will remain neutral on this subject and just watch with interest on how this affects driver behaviour, traffic flow and access to the southern end of the town. What I will say about this is: please be respectful of the workers and drive to the speed limits, especially around the work zones. Road work is a dangerous job and I certainly don't wish to be called there about abuse, or even worse, for a collision/injured worker.

Finally, Woodend Police Station has been undergoing some renovations to enable the rollout of new officer safety equipment, which hopefully will give us further capacity and safer outcomes for all Victorians. But as a result of this, plus our commitment to backfilling Gisborne, annual leave and public order obligations in Melbourne, we have been greatly affected in our presence and availability. I hope this will soon change and we'll have greater capacity in the near future.

An estimated 1400 visitors flocked from afar to see the beautiful garden of Stone Hill on February 17. People came on a perfect sunny day to see the garden in full colour and magnificence. Thank you to all those that came and especially to Sue and Gerry Moriarty for generously opening their garden for this cause.

Designer Michael McCoy was on hand to answer design and planting questions. A local coffee and gelato van provided adults and children with the sustenance required to wander the meandering pathways.

The money raised was above expectations. This has enabled the Woodend Refugee Resettlement (WRR) group to initiate the next step. CRISP - Community Refugee Integration and Settlement Pilot, a federal government initiative has now matched WRR with a refugee family of five. Originally from Syria, the family has been displaced in Lebanon since 2014. They will arrive here within the coming months and are beyond excited to live here in Woodend. Like all of us, refugees just want a safe place to live where their kids can get an education and a brighter future.

The members of the WRR group will help the family to adjust to life in Australia by assisting to find accommodation, employment, translation/language services, to navigate the health and education system, and to connect directly with the local community and culture upon arrival. The group provides very hands-on support as the family get established, with the view to helping them be completely independent after 12 months.

# Showcasing our shire and supporting residents during autumn

The award-winning Autumn Festival returns this April, showcasing towns across the Macedon Ranges through a range of new and returning trails, events, activities and participating business specials.

Joining the popular suite of tailored trails and regular markets this year from 5 to 28 April are the Live & Local in Community Halls series, celebrating locally-based artists and community venues, and the Treasure Trail highlighting some of the region's top leafy picnic spots.

Returning are the Autumn Pie and Tart Trail, the Food and Drink Passport, Tipple Trails and the Edgy Veg Trail, with the Woodend Visitor Information Centre the go-to festival hub.

Mayor Annette Death said the festival, now in its fourth year, was a growing celebration of the region's natural beauty mixed with some of the best local seasonal produce and performers.

"I'm unashamedly biased but proud in saying that the Macedon Ranges has so much to offer all year round, but there's definitely something extra special in the air during autumn," she said.

"Whether you're a first-time visitor to our shire, a regular visitor or a resident, we encourage you to plan your trip in advance and enjoy all of what our beautiful towns have to offer."

To specifically support Macedon and Mount Macedon residents and visitors during the busy autumn period, limited temporary measures will be reinstated along Honour Avenue and surrounds, following a comprehensive review that has prompted Council to refocus on its core responsibilities.

To help manage the influx of visitors, from late March through to 12 May (Mother's Day weekend), temporary signage will be installed along Honour Avenue in neighbouring Macedon and other

Council-managed roads, to clearly highlight – and enable Council officers to enforce – no parking zones.

Then from 29 March (Good Friday) through to Sunday 28 April, on weekends and public holidays, traffic management personnel will enforce a full road closure along the same section of road from 8am to 6pm, to support public safety and in anticipation of higher visitation on these days.

Extra toilet and waste facilities will also be provided in the immediate area, while residents/quests within the road closure area will be provided with exemption passes in addition to multilingual signage to display on their properties.

"The Autumn Festival helps to disperse visitors and economic benefits across the shire, but we acknowledge that people continue to be drawn to Honour Avenue, and Council is working to proactively communicate expectations with visitors before they arrive," Mayor Death said.

"We are committed to supporting residents, and this year's core safety measures reflect that, but it became clear that pursuing extended measures over the longer term would not be financially sustainable or responsible without external support.

"We are however working closely with our partner agencies, such as the Department of Transport and Planning and Victoria Police on areas they are responsible for, such as Mount Macedon Road and the Calder Highway, and providing advice to our local community groups and businesses who may wish to explore further temporary measures to improve amenity of the area on busy days. I'd like to thank all those local residents and businesses who took the time to provide valuable feedback during our review, and we will continue to manage this peak period as best we can."

## Change Your Clock, **Change Your Smoke Alarm Battery**

Sunday 7 April is the end of daylight saving, and at 3am you need to move your clock back one hour. Along with changing your clock, why not also change your smoke alarm

All smoke alarms, whether hard-wired or wireless, require a battery. Hard-wired alarms use a battery as a back-up and that battery needs to be changed as well.


House fires occur more frequently in the cooler months, and in autumn and winter, we tend to stay indoors more, turn on the heating and do more cooking indoors. Only the sound of a smoke alarm, not the smell of smoke, will wake you in a fire, so it's essential that smoke

Smoke alarms usually have a lifespan of about 10 years – alarms older than this should be replaced. Some smoke alarms have a printed use-by date, but if an alarm is still 'beeping' after its battery has been changed, it should be replaced.

### Only a working smoke alarm saves lives

If there's no sound from your smoke alarm, there's no warning.

Remember, it is normally smoke, not flame or heat, that harms the majority of fire victims. When asleep, our sense of smell is largely diminished, and we're unlikely to smell smoke.



To ensure you have a working smoke alarm:

- Test it weekly by pushing the test button with a broom handle to make sure it beeps.
- Dust the alarm with a vacuum cleaner brush.
- Change the battery at least once a year.



## Cadella Park Open Garden

Situated in one of the oldest settled areas in the Macedon Ranges, Cadella Park is a working farm with a rich pioneering past filled with original buildings and landscape where agricultural and pastoral activities have flourished since the late 1830s. Until renamed in the 1950s, Cadella Park was called 'Oatlands' - a 650-acre property originally known for its oat crops. The Woodend Star reported on 20 May 1911 that Oatlands was the scene of a damaging fire, when some 50 tons of oat and wheat straw were destroyed, and quick thinking neighbours prevented the destruction of a further 600 bags of grain and 100 tons of hay.

In other phases of history, Cadella Park housed prestigious horse racing stables - credited with a 1933 Melbourne Cup winner (Hall Mark) and the establishment of a 1963 Murray Grey stud, which pioneered breeding and the export of cattle to America, winning

Today Cadella Park is a family home, a working farm and a venue for private events by Prunella. It covers 120 acres, with the garden and building occupying eight acres, and has not previously been open to the public.

You enter the property through a long-gravelled driveway framed by towering elms, some 180 years old, flanked with tapestry hedging. Well-maintained mature evergreen and deciduous trees feature throughout the garden, with recent garden bed additions designed by Simon Rickard.

For our Open Garden on 27/28 April 2024, the original bluestone homestead, circa 1845, will showcase Dubarry footwear and fabulous apparel by The Woodshed in Kyneton. Prunella has created a Champagne Bar from the old diary and will be offering champagne, cocktails, cheese boards and chicken sandwiches. The old hay shed, which has been completely renovated into a spectacular events space and courtyard, will be transformed into a Prunella pop-up cafe with delectable cakes, tea and coffee. Numerous stalls, gazebos and music will fill the garden, selling plants, unique garden tools, sculptures and more, to create a whimsical garden fair for young and old. So please bring yourself, your family, your friends and a picnic rug, and enjoy our first Open Garden at Cadella Park.


Saturday evening will see the inaugural Spudfest Cèilidh, a traditional celebration of Celtic music, food, and dancing, to mark the halfway point of the festival.



### Coffee cups are recyclable!



Coffee cup recycling is a hot topic! Some websites say you can recycle the cups but not the lids and some say the opposite.

Thanks to new technology at our material recycling facility, Macedon Ranges residents can recycle coffee and soft drink takeaway cups in their kerbside recycling bin (yellow lid). Drink cartons, including milk, juice and stock can also be recycled.

Sadly, the lids and caps are considered too small to be recycled, you can pop these in your general waste bin (red lid) for now.

Want to do better? Check if your take-away coffee cup is compostable. If so, you can take it home and pop it in your FOGO bin. Or consider taking a reusable coffee cup with you to avoid waste altogether!

### Reusable rebate

Time is running out to apply for the reusable nappy, sanitary and incontinence product rebate!

The rebate program aims to reduce waste sent to landfill and assist residents in accessing affordable reusable items.

Residents can claim up to 50 per cent of the purchase on selected reusable items (conditions apply). The rebate program closes 30 April 2024, unless the funds are exhausted prior.



# Woodend Landcare volunteers Clean Up along Five Mile Creek

On 3 March, Woodend Landcare ran a Clean Up Australia Day event along Five Mile Creek between Wood Street and Bowen Street. Together with other community groups such as Woodend Girl Guides, Macedon-Woodend Scouts, 1st Woodend Scouts and Woodend Primary School, Woodend Landcare volunteers collected litter along Five Mile Creek and its tributaries within the Woodend township.

Woodend Landcare volunteers and Woodend Primary School students each collected two bags of rubbish, while the Scouts and Guides focused on the area from the Children's Park to Gilbert Gordon oval and the scout hall and found a lot more litter. By far the most common type of waste collected was soft plastics. These were predominantly food packets and wrappers. All collected rubbish was disposed of appropriately, including recycling items such as aluminium cans, bottles and green waste where possible.

Litter in Woodend gets blown and washed into Five Mile Creek, where it pollutes the ecosystem. This harms the habitat for frogs, fish, insects, birds and other animals that live in and on the waterway. From Five Mile Creek, the water and litter then flows into the Campaspe River, then into the Murray River and eventually out into the ocean in South Australia.

It is estimated that 80% of plastic that enters the oceans comes from rivers. Preventing rubbish from entering Five Mile Creek can therefore have a great impact, not just on our local environment, but also much further afield.

Thank you to our panellists: Shamila Gopalan, Chief Commercial Officer of SisterWorks; our homegrown Miranda Johnson-Jones and Laura Crozier with their Growing Up Clueless podcast; Aunty Joanne Honeysett, Taungurung elder; and Mary Attard, Deputy Director of Her Place Women's Museum Australia.

Having a safe home and work environment assist in empowering women to do their best. Macedon Ranges Shire Council is proudly one of only 12 councils to be awarded a "Free from Violence" Victorian State Government grant. We will receive \$262,500 over three years to support primary prevention of gender-based violence and gender equality initiatives in our workplace and the community. We will be employing a Free from Violence/Gender Equity Officer, who will be able to enhance the great work we have already undertaken in this area.

Ensuring people from all backgrounds are included and treated equitably touches on what is known as intersectionality. If you are a woman from a different background, then it can often be harder to feel safe and be able to achieve to your maximum potential.

To learn more about this, on 22 March, we celebrated cultural diversity week, partnering with Regional Victorians of Colour, Kyneton Community House, and The Kindness Collective, where we were able to hear stories, from locals of diverse backgrounds on what it is like for them to live as part of our community. We also heard from the Multicultural Centre for Women's Health.

In March we also held our annual Youth Summit, following a few years' break. This event provided councillors and staff the opportunity to engage with representatives from all year levels of our local schools to see what really matters to them and how they see the future of the Macedon Ranges. Including everyone in our discussions is so important.


## **Tribute to Tony Stidwell**


