



# From The Woodend Star, August 1923

"Discovery of Silver - In the early part if the week, a discovery of silver was made locally in unique circumstances. Men have lately been engaged in forming a new putting green on the Hillside Golf Links [ed - now Woodend golf course] and for this purpose, a number of grassed sods were cut out. Before being laid to make the new green, these sods had to be put through a machine to reduce them to the required shape and thickness. Whilst this work was in progress the other day, the blade of the trimming machine sliced off the underside of a thick sod and revealed a five shilling piece and a sixpence. Both coins, but the crown especially, had the appearance of being very old, so much so that the dates had disappeared from them. They had evidently been concealed some inches beneath the surface for many years, but what concerned the workmen more than the antiquity of the coins was just where they had obtained that particular sod. Having cut out so many others in different places, they were at a loss to locate the spot where it was thought possible that there may be more hidden treasure."

# **Youth Take Over** interns launch memorial garden design for Edgar's Mission

A team of eight young interns launched their design for a new memorial garden for Edgar's Mission sanctuary in Lancefield, at an event in July.

The interns, all aged 16-22 and part of the Youth Take Over initiative, met weekly for eight weeks to work on the design, led by landscape architects from Pollen Studio. Youth Take Over offers groupbased work experience for young people in the Loddon Campaspe region, and aim to help young people become workready and find employment opportunities with a new project to showcase their skills. "Since we started Youth Take Over in 2021, we've had over 80 young people come through the program, with nearly a quarter of those going on to find employment in the region," says Ryan Hale, Project Director at Youth Take Over.

"We always try to tailor our work experience projects to both industry need and the interests of young people in our region," Ryan continues. "We'd heard from a lot of young people that they wanted to work with animals, so we set about designing a work experience that met that particular interest."

Edgar's Mission became involved when it was invited to nominate a project that would suit the Youth Take Over program. A long-held dream of the Edgar's Mission team was the creation of a memorial garden, that had kept being put on the backburner with so much work to do around the sanctuary. Guided by landscape architects from Pollen Studio, the Youth Take Over interns learned about all aspects of landscape architecture - from plant selection and costing to considerations around light, drainage and maintenance – and applied them to their design. They also learned crucial workreadiness skills, such as communication, time management, project management and collaboration.

"One of the things the Pollen team wanted to try and achieve through this Take Over is really successful group work, where everybody feels like their ideas have been taken on and understood and there's a shared sense of ownership," explains Pollen Studio director, Flynn Hart.

The resulting plan was given 10 out of 10 by Edgar's Mission.

"We are so grateful for all the hard work and the great level of detail that has gone into the memorial garden design," said Bianca Romero, sanctuary experience officer at Edgar's Mission. "It is very exciting to see this project in motion and it is all thanks to [the Pollen team along with the incredible interns."

Speaking at the launch event, the interns also reflected on the strong team bond

that developed between them, and their Youth Take Over experience. "It was a very collaborative process...all of us were bouncing off each other a lot," said intern Bella Dredge.

"I didn't expect to gain as much as I have during this Take Over," said another intern, Thaiesha Foti. "I don't think there are many other opportunities like this."

Woodend Rotary also supported the project with volunteer mentoring at each session. Careers coach Jon Hazelton ran two career sessions, where interns explored possible career paths, identified their strengths and learnt how to talk about them in a job application.

While the Take Over has come to an end, the interns plan to reunite in October to help with the first stage of the garden construction, assisted by the Pollen team and Edgar's Mission volunteers.

"I can't wait to see the interns' design come to life, and watch it grow and evolve over the years," says Ryan. "It's a real legacy."

# Realistic reserves would make property hunting more bearable

# Time to restore trust

To improve the transparency and integrity of auctions real estate agents should be required to publish vendor's reserve prices before auctions, writes JOHN KEATING

AUSTRALIA'S auction system for selling real estate has served very well for many years.

However, during the past 15 years the insidious ploy by many agents of overquoting to vendors and underquoting to purchasers has brought the trustworthiness of agents and the auction system into disrepute.

Underquoting, also known as bait advertising, has become a systemic and entrenched industry practice and Consumer Affairs Victoria and the Real Estate Institute of Victoria have not adequately controlled the practice under current laws and professional

codes of practice.

Auctions have always been a balance between integrity and street theatre, but the balance has got out of control and people are being duped every week by the subterfuge and creative vocabulary used by many agents to smokescreen the prices they know their vendors want.

Many agents are spooked by the idea of increased transparency. They think it will destroy auctions. Many of these are the same agents who said six years ago banning dummy bids would destroy the auction system. It didn't.

If we can make the auction process totally transparent, many more buyers will be encouraged to attend and buy at auctions, which can only be a positive outcome for vendors.

The best way to fix quoting problems would be for the Government to legislate that vendors and their agents publish either a reserve price, or an



estimated selling price range where the lower figure must be the reserve.

If reserve prices were required to be published then purchasers would not waste their time at inspections or their money on building and pest reports if the reserve was out of their price range.

Vendors' price expectations would be self-regulated because they wouldn't want to waste their money on expensive advertising campaigns if their own reserves were unrealistic.

The role of agents should be to use their skills and reputations in marketing, product knowledge and customer service, to attract the maximum number of qualified prospective purchasers to auctions, to compete in a fair and transparent process to achieve the best result for their vendor clients.

Auctions promoted with an advertised realistic reserve price do work.

The best auction system is one that has maximum public trust and transparency and where prices are set by the market - that is, by purchasers, without artificial price manipulation by agents, auctioneers or vendors.

Professional agents must act in the best interests of their vendor clients and respond to what their purchasers want. What purchasers want most of all is accurate pricing and transparency, not rubbery estimates or no advertised prices.

A transparent auction with published reserves would ensure a sustainable future for a trusted, fair and efficient auction selling system.

While agents have a primary obligation to their client vendors, they also have a responsibility for the integrity of the selling process because everyone must be satisfied for the system to work in the long term.

Publishing reserve prices is a reform that would be widely welcomed by nearly everybody from first-home buyers to the Reserve Bank and would enable the market place to be accurately informed on market activity and sale prices.

If we accept and embrace a new system that has maximum integrity, there is no doubt that the auction system will thrive and many more properties will be sold by auction.

Most agents who oppose the idea of further reform of auction rules have never conducted an auction with a declared reserve price.

To succeed in an environment with published reserves, many would need to develop new skill sets.

This would mean agents need to understand the meaning of misleading and deceptive conduct and learning how to speak the truth to vendors and purchasers.

For the right property, a properly organised, marketed and ethically conducted auction that has maximum transparency is undeniably the best, fairest and most efficient way for purchasers to buy, and vendors to sell real estate.

# What's on at Woodend Rotary

In July, Woodend Rotarians and guests heard Yorta Yorta man and Melbourne Rotarian Ian Hamm give an outstanding presentation about the Voice referendum. Ian has held leadership roles in State and Federal Government and chairs and is a member of a number of boards. He is also a member of the Stolen Generation, having been taken from his family when he was only three weeks

lan set out the history of constitutional reform in Australia, focussing on what previous referendum questions were really about. The 1946 social security referendum gave the Commonwealth power to make payments, he said, but was really about whether the Government should support fellow Australians who are disadvantaged. The 1967 referendum to include Indigenous Australians in the census was really about whether Aboriginal people were part of the country and Australia's future.

Looking behind the question that will be on the ballot paper in October, lan said, is what the current referendum is really about is the question, "Should Aboriginal people be able to speak, should we allow them to talk about things that are about them?"

Also in July, we were joined by Captain Steve Ritchie who spoke to us about his 30 years as a member of the Woodend CFA. All members of the unit are volunteers, and 35 – 40 operational members respond to small and major incidents and emergencies across the region. Woodend CFA is a member of the Mountain Group of CFA brigades that work together to support each other, especially in summer.

In the first week of August, David Mann of 3AW will be talking about some of the people he has met along the way.

The following week, on Tuesday 8 August, we will join with Rotary Clubs across the Macedon Ranges, Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group and Housing All Australians for a special screening at the Kyneton Town Hall of "Under Cover", a film about women and homelessness followed by a panel discussion on homelessness, housing availability and affordability featuring our own Past President Josephine Falzarano. # The Indigenous Voice to Parliament – A Woodend community information session

On Saturday the 24th June at the St Ambrose Parish Hall, there was a full house there to learn why the Voice referendum is so important to Aboriginal people. Local MC Samantha Rixon invited the audience to join her in welcoming Rachel Perkins, Marcus Stewart and Professor Marcia Langton to speak with us together with Jon Faine as moderator.

We heard how the Voice will deliver constitutional recognition to our First Peoples by enabling a Voice on matters that affect Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People. We heard about the history behind the proposed referendum. We heard how it will be established and the powers it will and will not have. We learned that "The Voice" and its details will be determined through the Parliament in the same way that all laws are made.

The audience was also provided with showbags that contained a pocket-sized copy of the Constitution, a copy of the Uluru Statement from the Heart, an explanation of how referendums work in Australia and a resources page.

The event wrapped up with Samantha presenting the speakers and moderator each with a gift basket filled with local Macedon Ranges produce.

# **Eye-opening** documentary and discussion to explore the hidden faces of homelessness

Hundreds of thousands of homeless people in Australia are hidden and go unrecognised as homeless. The majority of them are women. Women over 50 are among the fastest growing demographic of homeless in the developed world and are increasingly referred to as the hidden homeless. These women live in their cars, stay on a friend's couch or sofa bed, or live in short-term accommodation. They find themselves in this uncertain and terrifying position primarily due to the gender pay gap and the lifelong gendered expectation of unpaid labour; where women often find themselves left doing the caring roles in their homes, in their extended family and in their communities.

The Australian documentary, Under Cover, follows ten of these women from diverse walks of life in their different experiences. The panel which follows the screening of the Under Cover documentary comprises seven local experts from non-profit community, government and professional associations who will explore the extent and nature of homelessness in the Macedon Ranges. The goal of this event is to raise community awareness on this issue and to advocate government at all levels to address its causes.



# **Macedon Ranges** residents embrace **FOGO**

Since the start of the four-bin system, the amount of waste the shire is sending to landfill has reduced significantly. The introduction of the food organics



FOGO materials collected from kerbside bins are taken to Biomix in Stanhope and are turned into Australian Standard compost. During this process, our loads are screened for quality and contaminants. The most common contaminants found are soft plastics (these belong in your red general waste bin), hard plastics (yellow recycling bin) and non-compostable bin liners (general waste bin).

For the month of June, our contamination level was only 0.276 per cent - one of the lowest contamination levels we have ever seen. The lower the contamination rate, the better the quality of compost.

Thanks to our residents' hard work, we have been able to maintain a contamination level of below one per cent for quite some time. We would like to thank and congratulate our community for their efforts.

# Why do we use plant guards?



We are often asked what is the purpose

of plant guards. People probably assume that their main function is to protect the new plants from the elements. To some extent that is true, but their main function is to mark where the tiny plants are so that they don't get lost in the long weedy grasses and to protect them from trampling and herbivores until they are big enough for the guards to be removed. The stakes supporting the guards can also be used to anchor jute mats which we sometimes use to suppress weeds around the new plants.

Identifying where our new seedlings are by their guards enable us to more easily locate them for watering or follow-up maintenance. They also advertise revegetation sites.

Different types of plant guards are used in different situations with varying purposes. Along Five Mile Creek we don't have to worry much about seedlings being eaten by rabbits and wallabies, which may be a major threat when revegetating elsewhere.

Where possible, Landcare is moving away from using plastic guards, particularly near the creek, as they can be washed downstream in floods. We are experimenting with various environmentally-friendly options such as biodegradable cardboard guards. Unfortunately, these cost a lot more than plastic guards, so in some cases we don't guard plants at all.

The upcoming spring plantings form part of the Upper Campaspe Landcare Network's Pollinator Corridor Project. John Walter (UCLN President) will be speaking about this project at our AGM at 2pm, Sunday 10 September, Woodend Neighbourhood House. Please join us to hear about this exciting project.



# Storm recovery event: Cumulative Trauma with Dr Rob Gordon

6pm, Thursday 24 August, Woodend Community Centre

As part of Macedon Ranges Shire Council's ongoing support to communities following the October 2022 flooding events across the Macedon Ranges, Council will be hosting a free post-flood recovery session with clinical psychologist Dr Rob Gordon to support the wellbeing of affected residents.

Dr Gordon will talk about the cumulative effects of multiple traumas in the community, having previously spoken at an event at Darraweit Guim in December 2022.

Dr Gordon is an expert in mental health, first aid and supporting people affected by disasters, working for many years with the Victorian Government and Victorian communities impacted by emergencies to provide psychological support.





# **Beware of dangers** during winter

CFA statistics show that one-third of all house fires started in the kitchen, 20% were caused by heat from fuel fires and



fuel-powered objects such as stoves and heaters, and another 20% from faulty or overloaded equipment

Some simple things you can do to help reduce the risk of fires:

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Keep tea-towels and pot-holders away from the stove
- Keep grills, fans and cooking surfaces free from grease and residue
- Make sure heaters are off before going to bed or going out
- Keep clothing, curtains or toys one metre away from heaters
- Never overload powerboards
- Don't wait to replace faulty appliances do it immediately
- Clean chimneys and flues every year
- Always use a fire screen in front of an open fire
- Keep candles, incense, and oil burners away from anything flammable
- Don't leave electric blankets on for more than 30 minutes
- Clean the lint filter on your clothes dryer after each load

Never deadlock yourself in your home. Deadlocks should have keys in them when you are home. Develop and practice your escape plan – have two ways to escape from your home. And above all else, make sure your smoke alarms are working.

You could save your house by shutting a few doors

In recent years we have attended several fires that could have been a lot worse if people had not closed doors inside their properties.

In the first incident, a fire started in the garage. Fortunately, the residents had closed the door into the house, which contained the fire, significantly reduced smoke damage to other parts of the house and stopped it from spreading into the roof space.

The resident told Woodend Captain at the time that she had seen a recent post on the Woodend CFA Facebook page, advising people to close doors to contain a fire to a room ... and this is exactly what they did.

So, what is the lesson to be learnt? When you are not at home and do not need doors open for heating, close the doors to as many rooms as possible. It could save your house!

Hello everyone. At the time of writing, our Council Meeting on June 28th was a big one that featured many significant decisions, including approval of the Council budget for 2023/24 and Year 3 of our Council Plan.

Budget features include responding to community submissions, through providing \$120,000 for the Macedon Tennis Club to upgrade fencing and \$50,000 for paths at the Kyneton Tennis club, -. highlighting again the importance of community input into the budget process. Council is also planning to spend \$10.3 million on roadworks, \$1.9 million in building renewals and \$1.4 million for bridge renewals and upgrades.

Overall, councillors are very satisfied with the budget development process, which began in October 2022 and engaged councillors at every step of the way through regular briefings, workshops and comprehensive updates and documentation. Our thanks go out to everyone who has contributed ideas and suggestions. Obviously not everything can get up in a given year, but we do keep a list of projects that have missed out and encourage anyone who may have not had a successful submission this year to put in again next year. Councillors continue to rely heavily on submissions from community to lend weight to our arguments to fund individual projects.

Good news also for the Woodend Community, with Council approving a proposal to keep Council's Woodend Customer Service Centre open two days a week from 12pm to 5pm. This was after an earlier proposal to close the Centre due to declining patronage was put out to the community for feedback. Community response clearly indicated a preference to keep the centre open in some form and councillors were able to work with officers to find a solution.



Council also passed our 'Affordable Housing Policy' and the 'Shire-wide Footpath Plan' at the June meeting. The Affordable Housing Policy is something that councillors (and, in particular, your West Ward councillors) are very passionate about given the increasing lack of availability of social and affordable housing across our Shire. We also passed a motion recommending the council's draft Disability Action Plan for community consultation – watch out for this one as we are very keen to see your feedback on it.

For anyone interested in organising an event within our shire, Council will be running drop-in sessions for event organisers to connect with council officers every 4th Friday of every month from 12.30pm to 1.30pm from 28th July.

Also, a reminder with our winter chills and fevers upon us – COVID is still with us, and Council is still providing free RATs (Rapid Antigen Tests) as part of the government's Council Rapid Antigen Test Program, which has been extended to December 2023.





Thousands of rainbow trout will be stocked in more than 80 lakes across Victoria. Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas said fish stocked into local lakes would encourage families to make lasting memories in the great outdoors and get kids hooked on a new hobby.

Rainbow trout are ideal for budding fishers as they take a variety of widely available baits like worms or PowerBait. Most family fishing lakes feature pontoons or jetties, good access paths and parking for fishers of all abilities, as well as other nearby facilities like barbecues and toilets.

The state-wide stocking program released almost 10 million fish in 2022, with the majority produced at Snobs Creek and the VFA's native hatchery at Arcadia, near Shepparton. From the Mallee's Rainbow Lake to Guthridge Lake in Sale, Lake Pertobe in Warrnambool and 15 waters across metropolitan Melbourne – family fishing lakes across Victoria will offer families adventures in the great outdoors.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said of the program, "There's family fishing lakes throughout our region featuring easy access, regular stockings of catchable-size fish and many are in or not far from town, so the kids can jump on their bikes to try their luck."

The program is supported by the reinvestment of recreational fishing licence fees and the \$96 million investment to improve fishing, boating, piers and aquaculture.

#### Work starts on club's grass green replacement

The Woodend Bowling Club, was badly affected by the floods last October, when our synthetic green was destroyed and has been unplayable since. Our grass green was also damaged with flood waters washing away a lot of work that had been done and bringing in lots of unwanted seeds and weeds. We had to replace both!

Work started in earnest in mid-June with a sod cut of the old grass surface. It took just under four hours to complete the whole green. The sods were then all removed and taken for land fill.

The next stage of works was completed prior to another burst of rain. The under-soil was spread and levelled with the addition of a soil conditioner, fertiliser and a granular fumigant which controls a broad spectrum of weed and grass seed, tubers or rhizomes and diseases.

Immediate future works include installation of the new cement sheet plinths, further rotary hoeing and a laser level.

It will be a long process for completion, with the green planned to be ready-for-play next April.

#### Work to start soon on new synthetic green

The long-awaited and delayed work to replace the destroyed synthetic green surface was scheduled to start sometime in late July. Hopefully, we can give you a detailed report next month.



#### **Grocers Galore**

From Woodend's early days, several grocers in High Street supplied a range of goods, collected orders, delivered them in horse and cart and advertised regularly in the Woodend Star. In 1888, the O'Brien Brothers publicised that they manufactured the best bread in the district, that smallgoods could be made to order and that special arrangements could be made for schools and picnics. They offered the highest market prices for farmers' dairy produce and also bought other farm produce. Groceries were of the very best quality at the lowest prices. The advertisement led with 'By Special Appointment to His Excellency Sir H.B. Loch'.

Michael O'Brien opened the store in 1865 where Keating's real estate is now, with stables out the back. His son, John Francis, took it over and in 1906, advertised that he had moved further south along the street as the original shop had burnt down. His sons, Joseph and Frank eventually continued the business. Frank remembered how goods like sugar came by train in sacks, which were tipped into bins in the shop and then parcelled into the required amounts. When orders were delivered, the drivers were sometimes welcomed with a cup of tea and a longing to catch up on the latest news. Too much chatting meant the drivers were not home before dark.

Robinson ran a store in Woodend for some years, and at the Woodend District Heritage Centre, we have one of his business journals dated 1867-1870, which details the weekly shopping orders of most of Woodend's then residents. In the 1880s and 1890s, Purvis Brothers advertised that they were ironmongers, grocers, seedsmen and furniture dealers offering an extensive list of grocery and hardware specials. Daniel & Keating opened towards the end of the nineteenth century and operated for many

By 1907, H.D. McKenzie and Sons were advertising that they sold the cheapest groceries in the district. In the 1930s and 1940s I.M. Gagiero, grocer and baker, was offering specials on goods such as salmon, tea and sheep tongues. In June 1935, The Argus reported the destruction by fire of J.F. Gilchrist's grocery and produce store, tea merchant, wine and spirit store, constructed in 1856, opposite Islay House. O'Brien's closed in 1972 and Parker's, the last grocery in High Street, which operated for 71 years, closed in 1996.

The Mechanic's Institute, seen on the right, was not built until 1893 to replace the previous timber Mechanic's Institute. Michael's son, J F O'Brien, took over after his father's death in 1890, adding to the range of goods and services provided, including the agency for The Argus newspaper. It is interesting to see the delivery carts lined up, with bread baskets and packages, and to see so many goods displayed outside under the verandah. L to R:?, Cugkeman, McDonald (boy), Jack O'Brien, J F O'Brien, Bill Hayes (who worked at the store from 1902-1947), and Mick Redmond. The store burnt down in 1907 and J F O'Brien built a new shop on the same site. Note the Glover & Onians Real Estate advertising board on the extreme left.




