# Rotary Club of Woodend improves education opportunities for girls at the Mwast Vanuatu school Rotary Club of Woodend

The Rotary Club of Woodend completed a new school building in a remote village in Vanuatu, and during the opening ceremony in February last year, attended by 16 Rotarians and friends, the women of the group learned that many local girls did not attend school during their menstrual cycle, due to their families being unable to provide the necessary products. An initiative was devised by the group to engage a social enterprise called Mamma's Laef in a small village outside Port Vila to manufacture washable and re-useable sanitary pads, providing both employment for women in the village to work with the enterprise, and an opportunity for girls to attend school more regularly. Seventy-five kits, each containing ten pads,

a wet bag and a carry bag with instructions have now been ordered and delivered to our partners, the Rotary Club of Santo on the island of Espiritu Santo, where our school building is located.

The women of the Rotary Club of Santo will shortly deliver the kits and carry out training for the girls of the Mwast school. Once the kits are in use, the girls will be able to attend school regularly, which will enhance their education.



## Strategic vision key to Dja Dja Wurrung success

DIAARA, the Dia Dia Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation, recently demonstrated its vision and leadership with the launch of two strategic documents, the implementation of which will continue to benefit all who live, work and play on Djandak (Dja Dja Wurrung

In a celebration attended by more than 100 people, including Elders and community members, and high-level representatives of government agencies and business, DJAARA unveiled the revised Dhelkunya Dia, Dia Dia Wurrung Clans Country Plan (2014–2034), and Wuktjarrang - Trading Our Way, DJAARA's first Economic

Dhelkunya Dja (which means 'healing Country' in Dja Dja Wurrung language) was developed by Djaara (Dja Dja Wurrung People) over a decade ago as the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation signed a Recognition and Settlement Agreement (RSA) with the State of Victoria.

Interim Dja Dja Wurrung Group CEO Cassandra Lewis described the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan as the foundational roadmap and 20year vision for Dja Dja Wurrung People, Country and Culture.

"At the halfway mark, we've delivered on so many of the objectives we set out to achieve," Ms Lewis said.

"Ten years ago, the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation was a small, single entity, with a modest team, focused primarily on securing rights and recognition for Dja Dja Wurrung People.

"Today, we are a large, thriving organisation with multiple enterprises that enable us to achieve more goals, across many fronts.

"We are a mob that gets things done," Ms Lewis said.

The Dja Dja Wurrung Group (DJAARA and its enterprises) works in collaboration with partners to improve the health of our land and waterways by bringing Dja Dja Wurrung traditional knowledge and practices together with Western natural resource management methods; to share Dja Dja Wurrung Culture and language in public space and through tourism, cultural arts and education; to develop bush foods and bring bush tucker back to Country; and more.

Now with more than 200 staff, the Group has become one of Central Victoria's large employers, stimulating significant economic activity across the region.

The Dja Dja Wurrung Group has demonstrated its capabilities across a broad range of areas, as equal partners.

In the implementation of Dhelkunya Dja, the Group has negotiated agreements and partnerships with many organisations, including local government, natural resource management agencies, and

The Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan is important as a guiding document not only for DJAARA and its enterprises, but also for those engaging with us and walking together in collaboration.

What has not changed in the Dhelkunya Dja review are the nine goals at the heart of the plan, which remain just as relevant today.

"At the halfway mark of Dhelkunya Dja's 20-year vision and schedule of actions, our aspirations remain steadfast: to uphold the health and wellbeing of Djaara and Djandak, and our living Culture," Ms Lewis

"This refreshed Dhelkunya Dja is more than a look back; it's a powerful step forward. It sets us up to continue to deliver for People and for Country, for now and for generations to come."

The document is the foundation for a range of DIAARA strategies, which further guide the Group's work.

Wuktjarrang - Trading Our Way, DJAARA's new economic strategy builds on Dhelkunya Dja Goal 8: Murrunayangu (we all live, thrive) - We have a strong and diverse economic base to provide for our health and wellbeing, and strengthen our living Culture.

The Strategy outlines the way Djaara (Dja Dja Wurrung People) do business. It's a statement of the intent to continue the

Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation

Traditional Owner economy – an economy where the purpose of exchange is to uphold or improve the wellbeing of People, Country and Culture, and the relationships between them.

Wuktjarrang means 'exchange belonging to us' in Dja Dja Wurrung language, and Wuktjarrang - Trading Our Way explains how we'll continue practising Cultural Ways in a contemporary setting: how the Traditional Owner economy can operate in today's world.

Developed by Djaara Knowledge Holders and Dja Dja Wurrung Group staff, Wuktjarrang - Trading Our Way also demonstrates the significant contribution the Group makes to all communities and the broader economy. This includes creating environments that increase liveability, attracting families, businesses and investors seeking


Wuktjarrang – Trading Our Way offers a positive cultural and economic framework to respond to the needs of today, and to again generate wealth without having to compromise on integrity of cultural values and obligations to Country.

"Both these documents will be instrumental to Djaara achieving self-determination - including economic self-determination. And the impact of our work is far-reaching, creating positive outcomes for all communities on Dja Dja Wurrung Country," Ms Lewis said.

# The Black Forest Sawmill: More than meets the eve

You may have driven past recently, or you may also remember the old days when the Black Forest Sawmill was a thriving operating mill, processing timber products sourced from our local and surrounding forests. Operating at the current site in Woodend, the sawmill first opened in the mid 1950s and with the amalgamation of other nearby mills in 1974, the Black Forest Sawmill continued to operate until the early 2000s, when State Government forestry policies forced the closure of the working

The site is now home to a range of local businesses and community groups who utilise the space to provide products and services to the local Macedon Ranges community. The site has also become a hub for community activity as the headquarters for the Woodend Men's Shed. Visitors to the mill site will find a variety of businesses that provide specialty timber, custom made furniture and timber products, as well as bespoke timber and aluminium windows and doors and glass products. Whatever you are after, make sure your first step is to call in to the mill and have a chat with one of the local business operators.

# Landcare Week 2025: **Everyone Can Make a Difference**

Landcare Week 2025 runs from 4-10 August, celebrating everyday people who are restoring bushland, protecting native species, improving soil and water health, and passing on knowledge to the next generation. These are people who see a problem and roll up their sleeves to do something about it.

The ongoing message behind the campaign is simple, but powerful: L.I.F.E - Landcare Is For Everyone. You don't need to be a conservationist or a landholder to make a difference. Whether you're planting native plants in your garden, looking after a patch of remnant bush, or simply choosing to live more sustainably, you are part of the Landcare movement.

#### **Ashbourne Landcare**

Ashbourne Landcare Group (ALG) has received a grant to establish a process of seed collection, propagation in a greenhouse and planting. The group



focusses on the control of weeds, particularly gorse, blackberry and hawthorn, and on the care of the natural environment, enabling residents to plant locally sourced plants to greatly benefit the environment and local wildlife.

Much of Ashbourne lies in the catchment area of the Campaspe River, which flows into Campaspe Reservoir, which in turn supplies water to many local residents. The quality of the water greatly depends on how landholders treat their patch of the catchment, in particular protecting waterways from degradation by livestock and weeds. The ALG assists landholders who wish to do this work by providing advice and seeking grants and advice from relevant authorities.

At the group's recent AGM, a film showed the history of the various grants received in recent years, which have concentrated on assisting landholders to control their weeds, established bio links to encourage wildlife and funded speakers on a range of topics relating to farming, land care and wildlife such as frogs and birds. 

#### The cheaper home battery program began on 1 July, 2025

A cheaper Australian government program became available on 1 July that provides an upfront discount on the cost of installing home batteries.

Key features of the program include:

- A discount of around 30% on the upfront cost of a solar battery, capped in practice at approximately \$344 per usable kWh of
- Available for households, small businesses, and community organisations with a new or existing solar PV system.
- The battery must be capable of being part of a Virtual Power Plant (VPP), but joining a VPP is optional.
- Installation must be done by a Clean Energy Council accredited
- The rebate will conclude on December 31 2030, with the incentive amount decreasing each year.
- This rebate can be combined with eligible state and territory battery incentives.
- Savings: The cost of a typical 13.5 kWh battery could be reduced by up to \$4,000 with the rebate.
- The rebate is delivered through the Small-scale Renewable Energy Scheme (SRES), similar to the way rooftop solar subsidies
- You can only claim this rebate once per property, so getting the right sized battery from the get-go will save money.

Victorian residents could also benefit from a solar panel rebate (see www.solar.vic.gov.au/solar-panel-rebate) up to \$1,400 and an interest-free loan equivalent to the rebate amount.

# Nice warm toes? Remember where the smoke goes

Victoria's environmental watchdog has advice for wood burning heater owners this winter.

The condition of the heater, the flue and the fuel you're using all contribute to the amount of smoke from your chimney. EPA's Chief Environmental Scientist Jen Martin says you'll get less smoke and more heat, if you do it right.

"Have your chimney professionally cleaned every year, only burn dry, clean wood, and extinguish your fire before going to bed or leaving the house," Dr Martin said.

"Don't leave it smouldering, it's inefficient, generates more smoke and creates a fire hazard," she said.

Wood heater owners have an obligation under the Environment Protection Act's General Environment Duty to minimise the smoke from their wood heater. EPA urges anyone burning wood to consider their neighbours' health and seek alternative heat sources, especially on calm days with not much wind.

The people most sensitive to smoke from wood heaters are those with heart or lung conditions such as asthma, pregnant women,

young children, those aged 65 years and over, people with diabetes

"If you suffer from heart or lung disease and you notice symptoms of smoke exposure, take your regular medications, rest and seek medical advice if the symptoms persist," Dr Martin said.

We should also avoid burning the wrong things, including coal, coke, driftwood, household rubbish, painted wood, chemically treated timber or the green-coloured pine logs used at parks and playgrounds.

# Woodend Landcare – Saving a threatened species

Landcare

Woodend and surrounds is the only home in Victoria to the threatened Black Gum

(Eucalyptus aggregata). The Black Gum is our unofficial floral emblem! Woodend Landcare has spent decades working to save the Black Gum population from extinction with a combination of weed control to allow more natural recruitment, and by planting young Black Gum trees.

Our efforts have mainly focussed on public land along the creek, inside the town boundaries. Once, there would also have been plenty of Black Gums growing on private land along the creeks between Hanging Rock and Woodend, and also downstream of Buffalo Stadium and along Slatey Creek. Many of these areas only have scant native tree cover, are devoid of trees entirely, or are infested with forests of weedy trees such as willows and poplars. The long-term plan is to bring some of these areas back to a more natural state, and in the process, create a significant corridor for wildlife - a "biolink"

Our friends at the Threatened Species Conservancy have been working with Landcare's help for many years, bolstering Black Gum numbers and habitat on private land outside the town boundaries.

At our AGM (10am Sunday 10 August, Woodend Neighbourhood House), our guest speaker Stan, from the not-for-profit organisation Threatened Species Conservancy (TSC), will give us an overview of the inspirational projects TSC are involved with, including the next steps for our Black Gum's conservation.

If you own property along the creek lines around Woodend and Hanging Rock, and/or would like to help threatened species, this talk will be of interest to you. If you prefer to avoid the AGM and just listen to the talk, feel free to join us at 10.45am for morning tea, with the TSC talk to follow.



According to a 2022 YouGov survey, only 53% of Australians feel comfortable talking to a family member about their end of life. It's a tender topic, often avoided. Yet by opening these conversations, we offer a deep kindness to those around us - removing guesswork, easing burdens, and allowing our wishes to be known.

Dying to Know Day on 8 August is a National Day of Action acknowledging the final stage of life and encouraging Australians not to wait to talk about death.

Following on from the success of their Open Day last year, Natural Grace in Woodend is again opening their Sanctuary for everyone to come and visit. They will have a variety of coffins, caskets, shrouds and urns on display, and attendees will be able to look behind the scenes at the operations of a funeral home.

Attendees will also be encouraged to ask questions that they might not otherwise feel they could ask.

Sharon Tregoning, Practice Manager and Holistic Funeral Director said that no question is off limits.

"Our aim is to provide a warm, welcoming and safe space for people to come and have their questions about end of life and funeral care addressed. August 8th is also our 13th birthday, so join us for a cuppa and a chat," she said.

# **Message from your West Ward councillors**

The clock has ticked past the longest day (winter solstice) and it's a new financial year, with the 2025/26 budget adopted. The budget includes an increase in expenditure to renew and upgrade Council's assets and works on Council's local roads, bridges, drainage and new footpaths and also building renewals. The work is spread over the year and is planned with consideration to such things as weather conditions, so although works may be included in the budget they may not occur until later this year or in 2026. Funds are allocated for design work for various projects and recreation initiatives that we hope can then be built the following financial year. In addition to two vouchers for free green waste in Shire Life, there will also be two weeks of free unlimited green waste disposal, which is anticipated to be for one week around October 2025 (in preparation for summer) and for one week in June 2026 (post-autumn).

Following the deliberative community engagement process and a workshop with councillors and officers, we hope to have the draft ten-year Council Plan and other important documents out for community feedback, so please keep a watch for these and take some time to read them and let us know your thoughts.

Thanks to those who attended and/or made submissions to the consultation for the proposed speed reduction for the central area of Woodend, which aims to improve safety for pedestrians and all road users. This is a joint project together with the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) and the Transport Accident Commission (TAC).

Shout out to the Woodend Neighbourhood House (WNH) and other Houses around the Shire who have partnered with Council to host some workshops focused on being prepared for and responding to emergencies together. Our Shire has experienced a very high number of emergency event declarations in Victoria since 2019, and this work is very important as we look to the future.

Finally, our congratulations to the Woodend Hesket Football Netball Club (WHFNC) on the opening of the two new netball courts. We recognize the efforts and determination of all those who were involved over the years, especially Kellie Duff. The lifetime award and official naming of the court after Kellie is well deserved and a fitting tribute to recognize her tireless energy over so many years supporting women and girls in netball.

# **Homelessness Week in the Macedon Ranges**

Council is partnering with Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health on a community event in August marking Homelessness Week 2025, to raise awareness of the issue and local supports available.

The event will be held on Tuesday 5 August at the Kyneton Mechanics Institute, with doors opening at 10:30am and the event commencing at 11am, followed by a networking and service expo at 11:45am including a morning tea, where you can meet local services and find out what support is available in the Macedon Ranges.

Mayor Dom Bonanno noted that in some of the latest available data, being the Australian Bureau of Statistics' March 2023 Estimating Homelessness report, homelessness in the Macedon Ranges had increased by 31.4% between the 2016 and 2021 Census.

"Homelessness is a complex issue that touches more lives than many people realise. Events like this bring our community together, help reduce stigma, and connect people with the services and information they need," he said.

"By working together and raising awareness, we can take meaningful steps towards ending homelessness in the Macedon

Mayor Bonanno also reiterated that amid the Victorian Government's recent housing targets, an essential aspect of meeting the future housing needs of the Macedon Ranges was to ensure the availability of local, affordable housing.

"A minimum \$30 million investment has been allocated to the Macedon Ranges through the Victorian Government's Big Housing Build; however, to date, only \$12.5 million has been allocated to our region," he said.

"We have requested confirmation from the Victorian Government as to the availability of the remaining \$17.5 million and how it will be allocated, and we welcome future partnership opportunities to provide more local affordable housing."

Homelessness Week is a national campaign that encourages community support and government action to end homelessness. It's also a time to learn more about how the issue affects people in our own region.

The event is free and open to everyone. No registration is needed just come along.



#### **Dangers during winter**

CFA statistics show that one-third of all house fires started in the kitchen, 20% were caused by heat from fuel fires and fuel-powered objects such as stoves and heaters, and another 20% from faulty or overloaded equipment. Here are several other examples: electric blankets, clothes dryers, open fire places, heaters, candles and powerboards.

Keep clothes and other items at least one metre away from all heating devices. Supervise children near all types of heating. Never leave portable heaters or fireplaces unattended; and turn off heating devices before leaving home or going to sleep.

Develop and practice your escape plan - have two ways to escape from your home. Above all else, make sure your smoke alarm is working. Take a few minutes today to test your smoke alarms. It could save your life.





In the country, we have to travel for away games and the clubs are fully supported by the names of towns they proudly carry. It's the people who week in week out volunteer to make those clubs back up each game.





# **Special Metro Tunnel tour for** Woodend rail pioneer

Recently Woodender Peter Bishop and a group of former City Loop colleagues had a rare glimpse into the city's next massive rail upgrade, with a visit to the Metro Tunnel's Parkville Station.

Mr Bishop, 83, was the supervising engineer for the construction of the City Loop tunnels, the last major transformation of Melbourne's train network, back in the 1970s.

Mr Bishop and a group of other City Loop veterans, including architects and engineers, were guests of the Metro Tunnel Project team for a guided tour of the new state-of-the-art station, located on the doorstep of Melbourne University, the Royal Melbourne Hospital and the Peter MacCullum Cancer Centre.

Mr Bishop said the group was impressed by the design and architecture of the station.

"Having seen a few other metros in various other parts of the world ... I was pleased to see it's got all the facilities and technology that's equal to anything else I've seen around the world," Mr Bishop said.

"It's also a nice station (with) lots of natural light and open space and the width of the platforms have been designed for peak loading in

The two groups of experts compared the challenges of building train stations in the centre of a major city and chatted about advancements in technology.

But Mr Bishop said the construction of the projects, though separated by decades, also had similarities.

"The improvements in technology for doing work ... there's been big improvements in both materials and equipment, which, in theory, make it easier," Mr Bishop said.

"Nevertheless, you've still got the people issues to deal with, in other words the labour force, and equipment.

"It's really not a lot different but you're able to do trickier things because of the improvements in materials and technology."

The Metro Tunnel is the biggest upgrade of Melbourne's train network since the first part of the City Loop opened in 1981 and will more than double the size of Melbourne's underground rail network. With five new underground stations and 9km twin rail tunnels under the city that will connect to the Sunbury Line, the Metro Tunnel will transform the way people move around the city when it opens later

Bendigo Line passengers will be able to change at Footscray for a Metro Tunnel service.

The new underground stations are Arden in North Melbourne, Parkville, Town Hall and State Library on Swanston Street in the CBD, and Anzac on St Kilda Road.

"The new Mental Health and Wellbeing Local in the Mount Alexander Shire, that will also service the Macedon Ranges, will make a real difference for our community - providing welcoming, accessible support close to home for people who need it," said Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas.

The new Mental Health and Wellbeing Locals are expected to open from late 2025.

# Improved connectivity for the **Macedon Ranges**

Connectivity is being improved for Victorians, with more than 850 mobile and broadband projects now completed across the state.

As part of the government's Connecting Victoria program, the Macedon Ranges community has seen two mobile infrastructure upgrades since March 2025, allowing locals to better connect with loved ones, work and study.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "For too long I've heard from locals about connectivity issues across the Macedon Ranges, it's fantastic to now have these projects completed to boost connectivity and coverage - helping people study, work and keep

Minister for Government Services Natalie Hutchins announced the milestone, marking the completion of more than two thirds of projects supported by the Connecting Victoria program, which aims to deliver 1300 mobile and broadband projects, with over 900 in regional Victoria.

One hundred new mobile tower projects have also been completed; consisting of brand-new mobile towers, and tower upgrades for 5G use and for additional telecommunications providers.

Two hundred mobile resilience projects have also been completed. These involve the installation of battery back-ups to make towers more resilient during natural disasters.

While the Commonwealth is responsible for telecommunications services in Australia, the Connecting Victoria program aims to address connectivity gaps in regional communities. Reliable mobile and internet coverage is essential for communities to access emergency services and check on family during emergencies.

## More backing for local entertainment

Local musicians, venues and festivals will benefit from funding that will keep jobs and the economy pumping in the live music capital of

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas last month announced the local musicians, bands, venues and festivals that will benefit from a \$3 million boost designed to strengthen the industry, and the jobs and communities it supports.

The latest round of 10,000 Gigs: The Victorian Gig Fund will fund 136 venues across the state to stage paid gigs by local artists.

Recipients include iconic pubs, clubs and band rooms, including local venue Newham Mechanics Institute. Other recipients in the region include the Wombat Forest Vineyard in Denver, the Lancefield Hotel, Mount Macedon Hotel and The 1860 Hotel (Evans Bar) in Romsey.

The Live Music Festivals Fund will support 11 festivals across the state with grants of up to \$50,000 to help put on new or existing events.

Music Works will also provide more than \$940,000 worth of grants, backing the careers of emerging and established artists, supporting them to create new music, tour and reach new audiences.

In addition, more artists will have opportunities to develop their careers through Multicultural Arts Victoria's NEWPRINT program, which is designed to support artists, producers and creative workers from culturally and linguistically diverse communities to break into the music industry and take their careers to the next level.

Live music plays a crucial role in Victoria's creative sector, while driving jobs and the economy. This latest package will support not only the musicians on stage, but the crews behind them, as well as venue owners, hospitality staff and local businesses.

Ms Thomas said, "Congratulations to our amazing recipients. Macedon is a hub for live music with iconic venues. This investment will help keep that local energy alive, while supporting local artists

#### Statewide on-farm drought grants now open

Minister for Agriculture Ros Spence announced the opening of the On-Farm Drought Infrastructure Grants program statewide, with updated guidelines based on farmer feedback and expanded

The program, managed by Rural Finance, makes available cocontribution grants of \$5,000 for all primary producers across the state, with \$10,000 available for eligible farmers in south west Victoria and parts of West Wimmera to help those who have been in

Eligible activities under the grant program now include pasture re-establishment and water carting - reflecting the wide-ranging pressures farmers are facing and ensuring support reaches where it's

Agriculture Victoria's technical decision-making services are also now live and farmers across the state can access a free one-on-one consultation with a farm advisor to help make the difficult decisions they are facing, particularly due to fodder and water shortages.

Agriculture Victoria has engaged 60 consultancy businesses in Victoria, including more than 90 individual farm advisors, who will assist farmers to take action to develop a drought action management plan.

The Look Over The Farm Gate farmer mental health and wellbeing program is also now open, bringing communities together and supporting farmers and farm families under stress.

The program, managed by the National Centre for Farmer Health on behalf of the Government, will provide grants of up to \$5,000 for community-led events that promote social connection and mental health awareness

Other supports are also available including the Farm Household Allowance, and Regional Investment Corporation loans.

The Rural Financial Counselling Service offers free, confidential and independent financial information, options, decision-making support and referral services to farmers and small rural businesses who are in, or at risk of, financial hardship.



#### New service to resolve rental disputes: fast, fair and free

Victorian renters and landlords will be able to resolve simple disputes - fast, fair and free.

Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for Consumer Affairs Nick Staikos announced the go-live last month of Rental Dispute Resolution Victoria (RDRV).

RDRV will help renters and rental providers settle disputes over bonds, compensation, repairs and rent increases in a more informal setting, freeing up VCAT to deal with other cases.

The free service – announced as part of the Government's housing and renting fairness reforms - will give renters a fairer go without the barrier of expensive legal fees or an intimidating VCAT hearing.

Anyone involved in a residential tenancy dispute can access the free service by calling 1300 01 7378, jumping online, or attending RDRV

At RDRV, highly skilled resolution experts will work to bring parties together and resolve rental disputes quickly and avoid a formal hearing. They will oversee each case from start to finish.

A new team of around 40 resolution coordinators have been recruited and trained to handle cases, and an additional 10 staff will soon join as intake officers to support the RDRV call centre.

RDRV will be headquartered on King Street in the CBD with four community locations at Oakleigh, Bundoora, Frankston and Bendigo. It's also a digital-friendly service that can be easily accessed and used online.

More than 60 per cent of disputes are expected to be able to be resolved through RDRV. It's all about guiding parties to the fastest and best result, reducing time, stress and cost, and reducing the

Consumer Affairs Victoria will still be accessible to people seeking information to better understand their rights.

RDRV is the first of its kind in Australia. Victoria is leading the nation on renters' rights with more than 100 reforms already implemented and more to come including portable bonds, tougher penalties for dodgy landlords and more powers to stop excessive rent increases.

#### New committee and selectors elected for 2025-26


The Woodend Bowling Club recently held our Annual General Meeting, which included the election of new office bearers for the 2025-26 year.


We had some winners and losers on the day. Ken and Lyn Murchison came first and second, and Shane Wellington picked up the third



## The Woodend **Theatre**

"Show Place in the Mountains" was once the eye-catching sign above the Woodend Picture Theatre, where the IGA supermarket now stands. The owner, Mr Ashby, had the theatre built by Turner Brothers of Kyneton to include a dress circle, back stalls and front stalls and his policy was that only the best films be shown. Allen Higgs remembered watching the theatre being built in 1933 when he was going home from school. Peter Hume delivered the bricks to the site from the Woodend railway goods vard in a four-wheel lorry drawn by two draught horses. When the theatre was finished, Allen often went there with his family who had booked tickets for two shillings and sixpence. In the early 1940s, Allen worked at the theatre part-time pasting up billboards advertising the films.

Mr Ashby's son Tom was the projectionist assisted by Allen who trained as a projectionist and picked up the films from the station every Friday. In 1948, Mr Ashby sold the theatre to Mr McMillan from Shepparton, who added the sign, and it was managed for some time by Mr Williams. Margaret Bowen was one of four usherettes then employed. At that time films were shown on most Saturday and Wednesday nights and, sometimes, to Clyde girls on Saturday afternoons. Some evenings were very crowded and at interval,

Margaret remembered that people bought refreshments at the Theatre Milk Bar on High Street or had to hurry to other milk bars nearby. Mr Ashby, despite very limited eyesight, made his own soft drinks and sold them at the Theatre Milk Bar.

From 1963 until the 1970s, Eric Brinkley was the projectionist and rented the building from Mr McMillan. Eric remembered that the children were often very rowdy while waiting for the film to start, but a visit from the local policeman quickly silenced them. Eric, his

wife and his children cleaned up the next day; mess from possums needing the most urgent attention. Possums sneaked in through the vents in the ceiling, sat on top of the screen and urinated down it. By this time, films were only shown on Saturday nights, unless a school asked for a particular film during the

With the increasing popularity of television, Mr McMillan decided to sell the theatre, closing it in August 1964. However, for a short time Joe Bateman resumed showing films. Ron McKenzie recalled that one night the theatre caught fire, and although the fire brigade quickly quelled the flames, the screen was destroyed. Other damage was manageable, so Mrs Bateman stitched together a few double sheets and the show went on. After a stint as a studio for producing films, the building was sold to make way for a supermarket.

# Students find their voice in Podcast Challenge!

Sacred Heart College Year 11 VCE VM students recently participated in an exciting, hands-on media project – a Podcast Challenge, led by Making Media. The Challenge was funded by the Murray Primary Health Network, and facilitated by Anglicare, and provided an opportunity for students to build on a range of technical and communication skills, in a dynamic environment.

Students researched a range of wellbeing issues including mental health, substance use, and gambling harm, preparing a range of questions before hosting podcast interviews with local youth services and lived experience speakers. The Podcast Challenge involves schools around Victoria, offering the school with the most listened to podcasts the chance to win a \$3,000 podcast kit. At the conclusion of the Challenge, our students were thrilled to learn that they had come second by just eight 'plays' of the podcast between first and second place. Two of our teams ended up winning best podcast in their categories.

The podcast experience is far more than just a contest; it's a powerful opportunity for young voices to break out, promoting 'help-seeking' and leading the conversation on youth wellbeing. Saffron explained – "It was so interesting talking with people who have firsthand experience of these issues, I enjoyed hearing their stories and also learning how to think on the spot and signal to others in my team when it was time for them to be involved in the interview." Liam said, "I hope the podcasts reach people who may be struggling with similar issues and provide some support and information about ways to get help."

Of the experience, VCE Coordinator Jodie Wattie said "The Podcast Challenge was a great real-life experience for our students. They got to work with state-of-the-art equipment and professionals who work in

the media. The experiences were highly engaging and motivating for our students and the increased confidence demonstrated by the students was a delight to observe. The students took so much out of the experience, both through enriched learning opportunities and personal growth; we are incredible proud of them all."


