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
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Success for the Woodend Winter Arts Festival

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
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Woodend history book earns **Don Grant Award**

The recently published book, The Enterprising Thomas Fitzsimmons of Woodend has received a special mention in the Don Grant Award for 2023.

The Don Grant Award is awarded to the best family biography in a given year and aims to encourage the craft of writing family history.

Don Grant was the cofounder of the Australian Institute of Genealogical Studies (renamed Family History Connections in 2018), an organisation



created in 1973 to promote and support genealogical studies, the history of the past and present members of a family or

The book, The Enterprising Thomas Fitzsimmons of Woodend traces the history of the Fitzsimmons family from Ireland to Woodend, the place where the family flourished and Thomas became an enterprising and important part of the community.

In making the award the judges made the following comments:

"The author moved to Woodend, asked the Woodend and District Historical Society if he could volunteer and this project was suggested to him - to research a pioneer of Woodend about whom there was very little information. This commendable book is the end result of much digging into Thomas Fitzsimmons' family background and life; and who turned out to be a businessman, a publican and a farmer, but not always successfully. The book is a very useful addition to the history of Woodend.'

Jo Clancy's bridge opening

Woodend provided us with a nice break in the wintry weather on the occasion of an opening ceremony for the new pedestrian bridge over Five Mile Creek on Sunday 18th June. The new bridge was built by virtue of an incredibly generous bequest by Jo Clancy, who served on the Woodend Landcare committee for many years and was President for a time. Jo passed away in 2018.

About fifty community members assembled and were joined by local councillors, the designer and the builder of the bridge, as well as twelve members - three generations lo Clancy's family, who travelled from Melbourne.

After some of Jo's friends, colleagues and family members shared their reminiscences, all adjourned to the site of the memorial where Jo's family (pictured) unveiled a memorial plaque. Shared refreshments followed, and those present had the opportunity to look at photos and plans of the site dating back to 2006.

Jo came to Woodend in about 2002 with her daughter Ruth. She was able to buy her house after winning two luxury cars on Sale of the Century, and she quickly became involved with Landcare.

She had an enduring interest in the natural environment and one of her dreams was that one day, there would be a pedestrian bridge across the creek between Bowen Street and Wood Street. A site for that potential bridge was included in our plans

in 2007. Jo decided to leave her entire estate to Landcare, with some very specific wishes for us to carry out. High on her list was the bridge. Sixteen years later, it became a reality thanks to Jo!

Getting the bridge to completion was not an easy task. Being on public land, there were requirements to be met, and the advent of COVID and rampant price increases, for a while it looked doomed to failure.

But with the help of Jo's family and the staff and councillors at MRSC, we finally got over the line and the result is an outstandingly useful and attractive piece of infrastructure which cost the community virtually nothing.

All attendees tested the integrity of the 25-metre long bridge after Ray, the designer assured us it would cope.

Afterwards, Jo's family scattered some of her ashes from the bridge as a final tribute.

Landcare will be adding some more plantings near the approaches to the bridge in spring, so we hope the community will help us with the plantings and of course with our ongoing weed control.

Rotary on the Move

Peace took centre stage in Melbourne in May

A Nobel Peace Prize laureate inspired participants at the Rotary International Convention in Melbourne, Australia, about how they can build more peaceful societies and combat climate change.

As convention attendees continued to explore Melbourne and enjoy events planned by local Rotary members, they also heard from speakers who have already made an impact in areas that are priorities for Rotary, including promoting peace, protecting the environment, and eradicating polio.

Leymah Gbowee, a Liberian peace activist, social worker, and women's rights advocate, shared how the dream of a future without war taught her a new understanding of peace.

"Peace is not just the absence of war, but the presence of conditions that dignify all of us," said Gbowee, who lived in a refugee camp and worked as a counsellor for child soldiers during more than a decade of civil war in Liberia. "We cannot boast of peaceful societies while there are unfulfilled dreams stemming from a lack of opportunities."

"Many regions need essential social services so all - men, women, boys, and girls - can feel a sense of belonging and validation," she continued. "That, I believe, is the Rotary dream serving humanity and ensuring that all feel a sense of purpose."

Gbowee said her dream of a better world is what propelled her to start the Women of Liberia Mass Action for Peace, a campaign that helped bring about the end of the civil war and led her to become one of the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize laureates.

"While we all have dreams we wish to fulfill, each dream is tied to the next person's. Like the rainbow, our dreams are the radiance of hope we want to see in our world."

She urged participants to "make our dream of a peaceful and safe world a reality."

The Royce Abbey Award went to Josephine Falzarano, given to a Rotarian who has demonstrated enthusiasm and commitment to the Object of Rotary.

Incoming president Deidre, who joined the Rotary Club of Woodend in September 2020, was warmly welcomed by members. She said she was very excited to be taking on the presidency for the next year.

Deidre welcomed the new board, consisting of Adriaan Adolph, Mick Deviny, Josephine Falzarano, Mike Hamer, Rosemary Guyatt, Terry Longton, Steve Simpson, Tony Waters and Ann Brown.

Highlights of this year's Handover lunch was the presentation of a cheque for \$30,000 from The New Woodend Star's Management Committee, \$7,310 to provide free cleft repair surgery to underprivileged children in Bangladesh, enabling them to live normal and meaningful lives, and we inducted two new members to our Club – Jenny and Joop Rysenbeek.

The Power of the Personal

On Sunday 18 June, at Kyneton Town Hall, an audience of around 150 listened transfixed as speakers from Iraq, Afghanistan, South Sudan and Burundi told stories of their quest for freedom. Hosted by Macedon Ranges Rural Australians for Refugees, with the support of Macedon Ranges Shire Council and the sponsorship of Bendigo Bank Gisborne, the event marked the beginning of Refugee Week 2023. The stories were harrowing, and for all, the journey to rebuild their lives is a work in progress.

Ali escaped the Taliban and made a perilous journey across the Timor Strait and after years in detention was granted refugee status. He hopes to start a business one day, but his main goal is to be reunited with his wife and daughter.

The first Gulf War left Dalal Sleiman's life in ruins. Forced to flee Iraq, she found refuge in Australia, where she learned English, earned a degree from Victoria University and established the Australian Chaldean Family Welfare and the Chaldean Women's Association in Victoria. Dalal remembers her former life and home with fondness but is now a proud Australian. "When we play Iraq," she says, "I barrack for Australia."

The event had its sombre moments. Lizzy Kuoth's testimony reduced many in the audience to tears. But emcee Tom Ballard struck a balance between humour and respect. Organisers Gwen Wilson and Karen Pierce were delighted. "Tom grew up in a family with a strong sense of service," Gwen said, "and it shows. He gave up most of his Sunday to be with us, in support of a cause he feels passionate about. We couldn't be more grateful."

The event was supported by local businesses Epis Domaine and Bindi wineries, Woodend Nursery, Woodend Golf Club and Kyneton-based traders Duck Duck Goose & Larder, Monsieur Pierre, The Social Foundry and The Town Roaster.

The afternoon included the drawing of a raffle and the launch of a writing competition. Sponsored by Woodend Lions and Aesop's Attic Bookshop Kyneton, the competition closes on 31 July and will award prizes worth \$200 in each of three age categories. THE HIDDEN FACES OF HOMELESSNESS

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The Problem of Homelessness in the Macedon Ranges

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Winter is also a time for rest and comfort food. Lemon drizzle cake includes citrus notes, wholesome flour and yoghurt with pantry staples such as butter, sugar and eggs and can easily be adapted to change the flavour from lemons to orange or from cake to a muffin.

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Sunday: Closed

Gorse! There is help.

Gorse is a noxious weed introduced as a fencing solution from Ireland. Living up to this role, gorse forms spiney, dense and impenetrable thickets. It is extremely flammable, threatening assets nearby, is a favourite haven of foxes and rabbits, decreases land values, affects farm stocking rates and seriously threatens bushland and recreation reserves. This, combined with its potential to spread to all soil types and most climatic zones in Victoria, it is no wonder gorse has climbed the ranks to be listed as a Weed of National Significance (WoNS), one of the most problematic weed species in Australia.

Keep your eye out; it is a leguminous plant covered in hard spines at all its terminals, with bright yellow, pea-like flowers setting in from 18 months of age. Seeds are viable for decades, therefore it is wise to tackle the new isolated plants first, then make a plan to eradicate the main stand. Surprisingly, many of us are unfamiliar with gorse or have misconceptions around its control.

We at the Victorian Gorse Taskforce (VGT), a not-for-profit organisation, want to support communities in reducing gorse in their local area through grants, resources, networking and information events.

If you just have small patches of gorse and wish to start controlling it one by one, we recommend the 'cut and paint' technique, in which a dabber applicator bottle is used to apply a minimal dose of a registered herbicide to the target cut stem only. If gorse is a problem on land you manage, we encourage you to connect with your local community group. 

Setting an ambitious emissions reduction target

The State Government is setting one of the most ambitious emissions reduction targets in the world - planning to cut Victoria's emissions by 75–80 per cent by 2035.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas welcomed Minister for Climate Action Lily D'Ambrosio's decision to formalise the new target to cut the state's emissions by 75-80 per cent by 2035 under Victoria's Climate Change Act 2017.

This target builds on progress to date, having already cut the state's emissions by 32.3 per cent below 2005 levels.

To achieve this, zero-emissions transport, helping farmers cut emissions, storing carbon in our landscape and driving down emissions in the waste sector through the circular economy.

All government operations will also be powered with 100 per cent renewable electricity by 2025.

The re-establishment of the State Electricity Commission (SEC) will be a key driver reducing emissions and bringing down power bills through \$1 billion of initial investment into new renewable, government-owned energy. This investment will deliver 4.5 gigawatts of renewable power - the equivalent of Loy Yang A.

Victoria's target of 95 per cent renewable energy generation by 2035, renewable energy storage target of 6.3 GW by 2035 and offshore wind energy targets will also enable the state to make

The emissions reduction target of 75-80 per cent by 2035 and net zero emissions by 2045 will be legislated later this year.




Check in with the Woodend Neighbourhood House to see what soups will be on that week.







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Federal Budget 2023-24

The Budget recently handed down by the federal government is expected to provide cost of living relief, with the community benefiting from savings on child-care and medicines. A new Energy Price Relief Plan will provide eligible local residents and businesses with a rebate of up to \$250.

Changes to Medicare will also see bulk billing incentives triple.

What Budget 2023–24 will mean for our division:

- A \$40 increase to Jobseeker payments for approximately 12,500 people
- An increase in payments of \$92.10 per fortnight for almost 500 Jobseekers aged 55-59
- A 15% boost in rent assistance for almost 12,000 households
- The childcare package is expected to benefit 6500 families.
- Over 3000 apprentices currently training in the division will benefit from Australian Apprenticeship supports to improve completion rates.
- Medicare bulk billing incentives will have immediate benefits for almost 70,000 people in McEwen.
- Over 35,000 people will be able to buy 60 days worth of medicine for the price of one prescription for more than 300 common PBS medicines

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Transforming early childhood education for the best start in life

More children and families will have greater and more affordable access to two years of quality kindergarten, with the Government's new Best Start, Best Life reforms.

The Victorian Budget 2023/24 provides for \$1.8 billion for early childhood education, ensuring more children get the best start in life while giving more parents – particularly working mums – the choice to do what's best for their families.

The investment will lock in Free Kinder, continue the roll-out of Three-Year-Old Kindergarten and start the transition of Four-Year-Old Kindergarten to Pre-Prep from 2025. It will also support Aboriginal community organisations and Traditional Owners to improve cultural safety and inclusion in early childhood services.

This historic expansion of early education meets a need so Victoria's littlest minds grow and learn. To support the need for more educational toys and equipment for play-based learning, a \$5,000 grant will be provided for every kinder in Victoria.

This funding means each kinder will see new, inclusive and ageappropriate materials including construction blocks, musical instruments, puzzles, chalk, gardening tools and sensory toys encouraging children of all abilities to use their imagination and creativity, while learning through play.

"Our Best Start, Best Life and Three-Year-Old Kindergarten reforms are transforming early childhood education, saving hard-working families money and supporting parents to return to the workforce," said Victorian Premier Daniel Andrews of the

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said "I'd like to thank our local early learning educators across Macedon for their amazing work. \$5000 for additional educational toys and

equipment will help give our local kinder kids the best start to life, close to home."

With wear and tear inevitable, services will be encouraged to purchase toys made of natural and sustainable materials extending their durability and keeping them out of landfill.

Up to 140,000 children and families are already benefitting from the first year of Free Kinder, which gives children 5 to 15 hours of funded kindergarten each week - while saving families up to \$2,500 in fees per child.

Pre-Prep will start in 2025 in the local government areas of Ararat, Gannawarra, Hindmarsh, Murrindindi, Northern Grampians and Yarriambiack – with other LGAs progressively joining the roll-out in following years.

Further funding in this year's Budget includes \$1.2 billion for infrastructure projects critical to the delivery of 15 hours of Three-Year-Old Kindergarten each week by 2029, and 30 hours of Pre-Prep each week by 2032.

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5 things I've learnt from my first week as an EV owner

I've had my EV for just over a week; here's what I've learnt.

#1. Going full charge: From phone to car batteries -Some people keep their phone batteries topped up at all times, while others live on the wild side, hoping their phone won't die when they need it most. I used to be in the second camp – always running on near-empty fuel. But owning an EV changed that. It's best to keep your EV juiced up and ready. Thankfully, with a home charger, refuelling is a breeze. No more cold 10-minute waits at the servo. Just plug in when you get home. (It takes less than 10 seconds!)

#2. Driving on sunshine: Harnessing solar power -My EV runs on sunshine – believe it or not! I've got solar panels at home and at the Bluegum office, plus a smart charger. Now I'm charging my EV with solar power that would have otherwise gone back to the grid. It's like I'm fuelling up for free. How awesome is that?

#3. Battery benefits for EVs - On those gloomy winter days with no surplus solar power at the Bluegum office, I simply plug my EV in when I get home and use the solar energy stored from the day in my home battery. When I get home after kinder pickup, my 2-year-old reminds me, "Plug the solar in, mummy."

#4. EVs are guick off the mark – and they need guick charging to match - My Volvo XC40, for example, would take nearly 40 hours to charge from a normal powerpoint. That's why I use a Fronius Watt pilot charger. It charges my EV quickly at 11kW per hour on 3 phase, and it's dynamic, so it can vary depending on how I want to charge, switching between solar, battery, or grid power automatically as required. Best of all, I just plug in and walk away - easy peasy!

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Winter warning for firewood sales

Illegal firewood operators are being put on notice, as the Conservation Regulator and Parks Victoria urge Victorians to source their winter firewood from reputable sellers and report dodgy dealers.

Firewood theft from public land is a significant issue across Victoria which heavily impacts critical wildlife habitat and cultural heritage. Sadly, much of the stolen timber is sold onto unsuspecting customers.

Firewood sellers can only sell timber sourced legally from a wholesale supplier, commercial wood lot or from private land with the permission of the landowner and in accordance with the Guidelines for the removal, destruction or lopping of native vegetation.

It can be difficult for customers to recognise reputable firewood sellers, so buyers are encouraged to ask the following questions:

- Where does your wood come from? Firewood sellers should be able to provide the details of where the wood for sale is sourced from.
- Can I get a receipt? Firewood sellers should provide a tax receipt with a business name and ABN listed.
- Why is the wood so cheap? If the firewood seems cheaper than similar sales nearby, ask the supplier why.

Buyers should report details about suspicious sellers or firewood theft from public land by calling 136 186.

This year the Conservation Regulator is targeting firewood theft with Forest Fire Management Victoria and Parks Victoria through Operation Hollows. Authorised Officers are patrolling forests, parks and reserves, and use concealed cameras and other methods to detect offences.

Anyone caught cutting or taking timber illegally from public land can face on-the-spot-fines of \$740 under the Forests Act 1958 or a maximum penalty of \$9,246 and/or 1 year jail if the matter is taken to court. Chainsaws, trailers and vehicles can also be seized if they're detected as being used for the offending.

"Firewood theft is a major issue in Victoria's parks and forests, impacting the habitat of hundreds of native wildlife species, which is why the Conservation Regulator is committed to investigating and prosecuting those responsible," said Kate Gavens, Chief Conservation Regulator.

The autumn firewood collection season from public land ended on 30 June, and the spring season begins on 1 September.

Don't ignore road closures and 'wheel be all

Victorian public land authorities are warning off-road adventurers to obey all closed tracks and gates in forests and parks as seasonal road closures come into effect from this long weekend.

The Conservation Regulator and Forest Fire Management Victoria Authorised Officers are targeting illegal vehicle use and gate breaches on public land during patrols over the cooler, wetter months of the year.

Seasonal closures are in force between June and November every year to protect sensitive environments and to preserve public access tracks when they are most vulnerable to damage. Driving off-road and going around these gates destroys important native plants and vital wildlife habitat, including billy buttons and Clover Glycine.

Between June and November 2022, more than 400 breaches of closed gates and roads across Victoria were recorded, with hotspots in alpine areas, Mt Disappointment State Forest, and Lerderderg State Park.

Conservation Regulator Authorised Officers also fined more than 95 people during the same period for vehicle offences, including illegally driving or riding off-road or on a closed road, and breaching a closed gate.

David McIlroy, Acting Director of Regulatory Operations, Conservation Regulator, said "Victoria's forests are home to thousands of native plants that need our protection and there is no excuse for people deliberately driving and riding around locked gates or on closed roads. The damage they cause seriously threatens environmental health and biodiversity."

Last year, a Bairnsdale man was convicted and ordered to pay \$1,744 in fines and legal costs after he pleaded guilty to damaging a seasonal closure gate and driving on a closed road in Nunniong State Forest in October 2021.

In Victoria, it is illegal to drive or ride on a closed road on public land. Anyone caught breaching road closure rules can be fined up to \$925, and the offence carries a maximum penalty of \$9,246 if prosecuted in court.

The public can find out more information about seasonal closures by visiting ffm.vic.gov.au/forest-and-road-closures. Local conditions and weather can affect the timing and locations of road closures, so before leaving home, drivers can check specific tracks via the MapshareVic tool: mapshare.vic.gov.au/ webmap/publicaccess.

Free Rego for all Victorian **Apprentices**

The Victorian Government will help to ease cost of living pressures for apprentices by making vehicle registration free for eligible apprentices from next month.

Premier Daniel Andrews and Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne visited the Kangan Institute in Broadmeadows last month to meet apprentices who will be eligible for free vehicle registration from 1 July, saving them up to \$865 every year.

The \$10 million initiative is being delivered in the Victorian Budget 2023/24 will provide free registration to apprentices like carpenters, joiners, bricklayers, plumbers, electricians and chefs if their employer can verify that their vehicle is an essential part of their work.

Mary-Anne Thomas, Member for Macedon said, "We are proud to be supporting our local hard-working tradies and easing the cost of living pressures where we can."

Apprentices who need their car for work are already entitled to a 50 per cent discount on their vehicle's registration fee as part of the Trade Apprentice Registration Discount scheme – with over 12,000 apprentices and trainees currently taking advantage of the discount.

The scheme was introduced in 2016 to reduce costs for trade apprentices needing to use their own vehicle for work purposes, and expanded to border communities earlier in the year - giving apprentices who live in Victoria but work in New South Wales and South Australia the same savings as those who live and work in Victoria.












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
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100 years ago ... in the Woodend Star, July 1923

Morning tea in the newly restored Stables is included with this tour.



The Woodenders go bowling

On 1 June 1890, an enthusiastic gathering of Woodenders formed a bowling club and a tennis club. The new Woodend Bowling Club Committee applied to Council for permission to use land south of Five Mile Creek. Once granted, the committee had a picket fence erected around the site and the bowling green was laid. The club made rules similar to those of the Kyneton Bowling Club, formed in 1877. On Christmas Day, the committee opened the green with a match between Messrs McKenzie, Tassell, Johnson and Froomes. Woodenders often preferred to play in Kyneton for several years while the rather bumpy Woodend green flattened out.

In 1898, the Woodend Star reported that at the annual meeting of the Bowling Club there were insufficient members for a committee or a president. Once an active group, the Bowling Club was defunct, while the tennis and croquet clubs carried on. However in 1903, the previous president, Mr H.D. McKenzie, rallied about thirty gentlemen at a special meeting, and reformed the club. Half the green was used to play bowls, the other half croquet. The bowling green was reopened 28 October 1903. The Kyneton Guardian reported that 'the weather was beautiful ... a scene of bustle and excitement, the summer dresses of the ladies being a relief to the eye after the cold, wet and changeableness of the season just passed through. There was a goodly company present ... and a very pleasant afternoon was spent.'

A new green was constructed in 1907. The original was stripped, followed by further digging of earth which was then mixed with screened ashes from Melbourne. Further screening was laid, followed by at least 11 pounds of grass seed. In 1918, the first recorded Ladies Bowling Match was held between Castlemaine

and Woodend at Woodend. Woodend won by six shots. The game was reported as one of the most exciting seen for some time. Since those heady days, the club has continued to thrive for men and women on a green enlarged in 1923.

Congratulations to Paul Burke who has won a 'Don Grant Award – Special Mention' for his book, The Enterprising Thomas Fitzsimmons of Woodend, Adventure and Survival in Colonial Australia.

The book is available for \$25 at the Woodend District Heritage Society in the Old Woodend Courthouse in Forest St, which is open Wednesdays 10am–12:30 and 1:30–4pm.
