Woodend Community Centre moving forward

Plans for the new Woodend Community Centre are moving forward this year, with the Cultural Heritage Management Plan completed successfully in February, in conjunction with the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation, paving the way for the building permits to commence for Stage 1. This follows the successful endorsement of the completed Woodend Community Centre Master Plan and Business Case last year – allowing this site to be rebuilt into a sustainable, all-inclusive centre that meets the modern needs of our whole community.

The rebuild will include a new library, community and visitor information hub, multipurpose indoor and outdoor performance spaces, small gallery and local produce display. What we need now from the community are your letters of support to demonstrate excitement

Mount Macedon Dawn Service

The Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service Committee is very pleased to announce that it will be conducting an Anzac Day service at the Mount Macedon War Memorial Cross this year.

The Dawn Service is a commemorative event that honours the sacrifice of veterans, salutes their service and seeks to learn from the experiences of servicemen and servicewomen.

This year's service will pay tribute to the Papuan and New Guinean civilians that provided vital logistic support to Australian and US troops during World War Two. The service will also recognise those Afghan civilians that acted as interpreters for Australian forces in Afghanistan over the last 20 years.

"It is important to recognise that our military forces are often supported by indigenous personnel in various conflicts around the world," said Bruce Mildenhall, Chair of the Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service Committee. "In some cases, such as recently with the Afghanistan deployment, pressure from Australian veterans and their supporters has seen Afghan personnel and their families permitted to seek refuge in Australia," he said.

The Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service is possible through the generous support of several sponsors, and dozens of volunteers. The committee thanks them for their commitment to our mission and the community.

In order to provide a safe and orderly event, private vehicles (including cars, motorcycles and bicycles) are not permitted to travel to the Mount Macedon War Memorial Cross on Anzac Day morning.

To attend the service, you must book a seat in one of the buses that move people to and from the Mount Macedon War Memorial Cross. Bus services operate from Gisborne, Woodend, Sunbury, Kyneton, Riddells Creek, Lancefield and Romsey, with continuous shuttle buses from Macedon's Tony Clarke Reserve from 4.15am. See the accompanying poster for the bus schedule and details on how to book a seat.

Attendees are requested to ensure that they dress for the weather and bring a water bottle and a torch. Attendance is free, but please bring some cash in the event you would like to purchase a snack or drink. Any donation towards the ongoing conduct of the Dawn Service is appreciated.

Rotary on the Move

Rotary Vanuatu School Project completed

After several years of setbacks, the rural village of Mwast on the Vanuatu island of Espiritu Santo now has two new classrooms and an office.

The project began in 2017, when Woodend Rotarians Allan and Shirley Cann who have provided business mentoring for many years as volunteers in Vanuatu first suggested building classrooms in Vanuatu as a worthwhile project.

"We noticed that many primary school-age children were not attending school and were told by the Ministry of Education and Training (MoET) that many parents could not afford to send children to school, and many schools were so overcrowded, new children were turned away."

The Rotary Club of Woodend undertook to raise the funds to build the new classrooms. A budget of \$100,000 was considered necessary, and the project was made possible in part by a grant from The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, and the commitment of the Rotary Club of Woodend, and the generosity of the Rotary clubs of Wendouree, Werribee, Yarra Bend, Kardinia and Swan Hill Sunrise. The Woodend community has also supported this project through generous donations, particularly through a collection tin at Bourkies Bakehouse and at community events.

The classrooms were originally planned to be built on the island of Ambae, but due to a volcanic eruption, the island was evacuated and some of the villagers relocated to Mwast.

Mwast is a small village 25 kms north of Luganville on the island of Epiritu Santo. It is reached by a 60-minute drive along a tortuous 4-wheel drive track. Some students and staff have a long walk to the school, and due to the distance, they have to travel and spend the week at the school, using the school buildings as their sleeping guarters after classes.

In early 2018, we signed a MOU with the Vanuatu Ministry of Education and Training (MoET) for the design, supervision and construction of the proposed school. The Rotary Clubs paid for the materials and the local villagers undertook to construct the school building themselves.

Allan, Shirley and myself visited Vanuatu to view progress on the Mwast School building in November 2019. The concrete slab had been manually poured (no ready mixed concrete) the concrete block work finished and preparation for the roof commenced.

However in 2020 Cyclone Harold hit Vanuatu. The village suffered damage, but the school building was undamaged as it had been built to cyclone standards. Then Covid-19 arrived, and Vanuatu was closed to all travellers, and construction was halted for two years. In June 2022, MoET recommenced the construction, using funds from the Australian Government Cyclone Harold Reconstruction fund.

The Rotary Club of Woodend is delighted to finally see the completion of the International Project. The official school opening ceremony will be held mid-year and a self-funded group from the club are planning to attend.

Big rise in local property prices helps Woodend mortgage broker to slash clients' repayments

The steep rise in Macedon Ranges house prices over the past few years is helping people to fight back against soaring mortgage rates.

Peter Machell, who runs Mortgage Choice in Woodend, has saved clients a combined total of \$13,500 in just four weeks.

He says people who have a \$400,000 mortgage and haven't recently reviewed it could secure at least half a percentage point off their current rate.

That would save them about \$2,000 in interest a year.

"In one instance, we negotiated a rate discount of 0.37 percentage points. This secured our client a saving of \$2,045 a year in interest," Peter said.

"Another client's rate was trimmed by 0.42 percentage points, resulting in a saving of \$1,662 a year in interest."

When reviewing a home loan, Peter and his team also assess the price of the property. If the price has risen substantially since the loan was last reviewed, they use it as leverage with lenders.

"People who took out a loan two or three years ago – especially first-home buyers – may have borrowed with little equity in their property. But now their home could be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars more," Peter said.

"Because the size of their loan is now smaller when compared with the value of their home, lenders become more willing to discuss a better rate."

Peter, who has been a mortgage broker for 20 years, is urging people to get a review of their mortgage if they haven't done so recently.

"In only four weeks since the middle of February, we've been able to save a combined \$13,503 a year in interest," he said.

Our Earth, our home



For over forty years, Woodend Landcare and its predecessors have done a lot of work to control weeds along Five Mile Creek and in other areas, to eradicate the most invasive weeds, such as gorse, broom, willow and hawthorn, and to allow indigenous vegetation to flourish. In many areas, we are seeing great results.

But in recent years a new threat that is much harder to deal with has arisen: English Ivy (Hedera helix).

The rise of English Ivy in Woodend

After a wetter than average last three years coinciding with a reduced Landcare working bee program due to COVID, ivy has taken off.

English Ivy is an aggressive, highly invasive weed, and in Woodend it has no natural predators. It is generally spread by birds, illegal dumping of garden cuttings and seed, which the plant produces after climbing a tree or structure

As ivy thickly covers the ground in search of trees to climb, its thick ground layer prevents natural regeneration of seedlings, smothering and killing ground layer plants. Then when it finds a shrub or tree, it can climb up to 30 metres high, and once off the ground, produces flowers and black, berry-like fruit containing seeds, and eventually it kills the plant it has climbed.

By eliminating other plants, ivy reduces the diversity of native flora. Without a variety of plants for food and shelter, native wildlife is also affected; leading to a loss of biodiversity in our reserves and backyards.

The threat of English Ivy

To humans, all parts of ivy are poisonous if ingested, and the sap is an irritant on contact. The plant is also covered in minute hairs, which may cause sneezing and eye irritation.

Getting rid of English Ivy

We all need to play our part in reducing the amount of ivy, and therefore increase the number and variety of native plants and animals, in Woodend.

Although ivy is difficult to get rid of, cutting the stems at the base of trees it is climbing prevents it from setting seed. Pulling up runners along the ground in smaller infestations can have a positive impact, as can smothering it with sheets of plastic or old carpet.

Control with herbicides is difficult and requires expert guidance or the use of a qualified, experienced contractor. In the home garden, "cutting and painting" using a small purpose-designed dabber bottle with a foam tip (think shoe polish applicator) containing glyphosate can be quite safe and effective.

All parts of ivy need to be disposed of in your green FOGO bin. Ivy is not accepted as green waste at any MRSC transfer stations.

While ivy can look attractive, it is capable of wiping out other plants, animals and insects. Ultimately it destroys our native biodiversity, if not on your property, then on a nearby reserve. If you have English Ivy growing in your



garden, we ask two things – either remove it or at the very least do not allow it to climb and set seed.

Expert panel debates conservation approach 'rewilding' in Central Victoria

Hosted by local conservation organisation, Biolinks Alliance – an expert panel including representatives from ecology, research and the Dja Dja Wurrung – are set to debate whether 'rewilding' can solve widespread environmental challenges in Central Victoria.

'Rewilding' is embraced worldwide as an approach that goes beyond saving single species or patches of remaining habitat, to restoring the wider natural processes, and missing species that support life.

This free event brings together an eminent panel of experts and thinkers to discuss what rewilding could look like in Central Victoria, why it hasn't been taken up widely so far, and what potential it has to restitch the natural fabric of life in the region, so it can support future generations.

With Victoria being the most cleared state in Australia and having lost at least 13 mammal species in the last 200 years, the need for rewilding could not be greater, yet the approach has not taken hold here to the extent it has elsewhere in Australia.

"Restoring nature across large scales – together with drastically reducing greenhouse emissions – is the great environmental challenge of this decade," says Dr. Sophie Bickford, Biolinks Alliance Executive Director.



Tackling food insecurity locally: Woodend Neighbourhood House launches new Community Food Bank

Community members facing hardship now have improved access to pantry staples and frozen meals, thanks to a new food bank in the undercroft of the Woodend Neighbourhood House.



The new location helps Woodend Neighbourhood House better respond to the increasing demand for food relief.

Melissa Baker, manager of Woodend Neighbourhood House has seen first hand how important this service is to the local community.

"We first set up a community food swap at the end of 2021, with the idea that people could take what they need or leave what they could. Very quickly, demand outstripped supply, so we knew we needed to do more," she said.

Thanks to the support of Woodend Men's Shed, Gisborne Food Bank, CareWorks Sunbury, Bunnings Sunbury, Givit, and after several generous donations from members of the community, the Woodend Neighbourhood House has set up a dedicated space in the undercroft to better serve those in need.

"Our clients come from all walks of life and there is no shame in asking for help. Life happens to all of us, and the new food bank, just like the Woodend Neighbourhood House, is here for everyone," said Melissa.

The service is staffed by volunteers and offers a range of food and personal hygiene items.

"We're now calling on our community to consider how they can support this vital service. There are collections bins in both Coles and IGA in Woodend for extra items in your shopping trolley, and cash donations can be made in person at the Woodend Neighbourhood House between 9am – 3pm Monday to Friday."

"We're also asking anyone who can spare a couple of hours a month to get in touch to add their name to the roster. Shifts are two hours long, training is provided, and you will be paired with another volunteer each shift," said Melissa.

The Woodend Community Food Bank is open on Mondays and Thursdays between 12.30pm and 2.30pm. Access to the undercroft is via the gates by the skate park, off Margery Crescent, Woodend.

A message from your local police sergeant

Hi, I thought I'd start my monthly article on a brief rundown on what's occurring across our region, as well as what we have planned in the coming months in the Woodend area, from a policing perspective. But first, I'd like to thank everyone who has taken the time to speak to me upon my return, and the positive feedback about my writing in The New Woodend Star.

There have been the usual reports of theft within the area, and it would be fair to say that most, if not all, of these have been thefts by opportunity. This typically happens for things that haven't been put away, have been left in the open, or are in unlocked garages and/or sheds.

These are generally preventable by just taking the precaution of putting something away in a locked shed/garage, locking the bike up to a post when you are up the street or not leaving the car unlocked in the driveway at night. Locking things and putting things away is far better than having to report it to the Police Assistance Line (PAL – 131 444) and battling with your insurance company.

Easter can be a challenging time for policing and the other emergency services, as it is historically a period of more collisions/injuries occurring on our roads. As such, we are tasked to undertake a number of enforcement measures in an attempt to curb this. It's no secret that we will be doing a lot of random breath testing and enforcing speed limits, and we are always looking at distraction-type offences, for example being on your mobile phone.

I hope you have a safe and enjoyable Easter, that you have some time off with the people you want to spend time with. But please remember we will be out in force on the roads to ensure not only your safety, but that of everyone else.



Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery

Sunday 2 April is the end of daylight saving. While you're changing your clock is the perfect time to also change your smoke alarm batteries.

The message is quite simple: only working smoke alarms save lives. If there's no sound from your smoke alarm, there's no warning.

It is smoke inhalation, not flame or heat, that kills the majority of fire victims. When asleep, our sense of smell is largely diminished, and we're unlikely to smell smoke. The smoke may also put occupants into a deeper sleep, so a smoke alarm actually helps wake you.

Smoke alarms are compulsory in every home

Victorian law states that smoke alarms (complying with Australian Standards) must be installed in all homes, units, flats and townhouses. It is the responsibility of all owners and landlords to install working smoke alarms.

Homes constructed after 1 August, 1997 must have smoke alarms connected to 240-volt mains power. These smoke alarms must also have a backup battery installed, in case there is a loss of power, and these batteries should be replaced regularly.

Newer photoelectric smoke alarms with lithium batteries can last for up to 10 years without the need to change the battery. Please note, ALL smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years to ensure optimum safe operation.








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The EDIE experience



Macedon Ranges Shire Council flood recovery update

It has been over five months since severe flooding impacted Macedon Ranges residents, and Council has been working hard behind the scenes to advocate, investigate and repair damage since the floods.

Council has appointed a Flood Recovery Coordinator, Leah Rushford, whose role it is to support the community with recovery and make sure everyone impacted by the October 2022 floods has the support they need.

The Flood Recovery Coordinator liaises with various community organisations, State Government departments and agencies about the impacts and recovery of our towns and residents.

Council has been working on a number of key activities to support recovery from the floods:

- There are now only two roads closed in the shire from a peak of 41 roads initially. Works will continue to be carried out over the coming year to repair all roads that were damaged.
- Council has installed 15-tonne load limit signs on Darraweit Valley Road bridge, and has informed the Department of Transport and Planning to remove it as a heavy vehicle route.
- Drainage concerns across the shire are being investigated by Council. This is expected to be a lengthy process, but is a priority for our staff.
- Waste levy reductions have been extended by the Victorian Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) until 2 May 2023. Residents in the shire with flood waste can take it to Sunbury Landfill or any Macedon Ranges Shire Council transfer stations free of

charge.

- Some exclusions apply for this, including the amount you are offloading. Macedon Ranges Shire Council transfer stations are unable to accept commercial quantities. This would need to be taken to Sunbury landfill.

• Dangerous trees that were identified by an independent arborist in parks and reserves after the floods are being addressed by contractors. Not all trees will be removed completely but will receive the treatment they require to remain healthy in the long term.

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Another chapter for the Premiers' Reading Challenge

Children can go 'wild about reading', as they embark on the annual Premiers' Reading Challenge for another year.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas, said the 2023 Premiers' Reading Challenge was now open and supported students and families to get behind the initiative that promotes the importance of reading for children and students from early childhood to Year 10, while encouraging families to be more involved with supporting reading at home.

This year's theme is 'wild about reading', with the accompanying artwork designed by Kate Isobel Scott, a talented Victorian-based illustrator known for her colourful, quirky and endearing hand-made characters.

The Premiers' Reading Challenge encourages students to read a set number of books over the year, depending on their Challenge level, with their reading efforts recorded online. Picture books, short stories, poems or non-fiction books in any language can be part of the Challenge.

Children who have not yet started school are challenged to experience 40 books with the help of their families, as part of the Premiers' Reading Challenge for the Early Years.

Most of the books are from Challenge book lists, while the remainder can be of the reader's choosing.

The Challenge was launched in February 2005 to support children and young people's reading skills, highlight the importance of reading for literacy development and help more Victorians fall in love with reading.

Neighbourhood House to help Casuals access sick pay

Casual workers i will benefit from a new Victorian Government partnership with Neighbourhood Houses Victoria.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas, announced recently that the Woodend Neighbourhood House will provide free assistance to help community members sign up for the Victorian Sick Pay Guarantee.

The Woodend Neighbourhood House is one of up to 100 neighbourhood houses around the state ready to help eligible casual and contract workers sign up for sick and carer's pay. Participating neighbourhood houses and community centres can provide access to in- language support, computers and the internet, and help workers understand and sign up to the scheme.

Eligible casual and contract workers can sign up for 38 hours a year of sick and carer's pay with direct support from a participating neighbourhood house. This community-based approach will make the Sick Pay Guarantee more accessible for workers who may face technology or language barriers.

"We're making it easier for casual and contract workers to access sick and carer's pay. I encourage all eligible workers to sign up today, whether it's online or through our local Woodend Neighbourhood House," said Ms Thomas.

The \$245.7 million two-year pilot is fully funded by the Victorian Government until March next year.

Casual and self-employed contract workers who want to check their eligibility and sign up are encouraged to contact the Woodend Neighbourhood House, visit www.nhvic.org. au or sign up at vic.gov.au/sickpayguarantee. Eligible workers can apply for sick and carer's pay from the day they sign up.

Information is available in 19 languages on the Sick Pay Guarantee website. To speak to an interpreter, call the Translating and Interpreting Service on 131 450 and ask for the Victorian Sick Pay Guarantee hotline.

The \$1.3 billion Solar Homes Program helps households save on their energy bills through rebates for the installation of solar PV systems, batteries, solar hot water and heat pump costs.

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
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New greens starting to take shape

Dance classes are held at Buffalo Sports Stadium in Woodend and the Gisborne Community Centre. We currently have spaces available in the following classes:



The Flemings of Fleming Road

Many country roads are named after early residents, such as Fleming Road in Ashbourne. Joseph Fleming was born in Kilkenny in Ireland in 1832 and emigrated to Melbourne in the late 1860s. Ellen Treacy was born in Kilkenny about 1850 and emigrated to Melbourne in 1868 with her father Thomas, brother Denis and sisters Mary and Johanna.

Thomas and Denis took up land in the Woodend district, and Joseph began farming in Ashbourne, on the north-west corner of Chambers Road and Porkers Lane. Before long Joseph met Ellen, and they were married at St Mary's Catholic Church in Kyneton in April 1872. Potatoes were their main crop, but they also grew many fruit trees, including blackcurrants, apples and cherries.

The couple had a family of ten children, but, as was fairly common in those days, some of them only enjoyed a short life. The eldest, James, died of bronchitis when 20 years old,

a daughter Mary died aged eleven and Thomas died from



Another son, Michael Joseph, lived at Ashbourne for some time until he went west to work in gold-mining areas before returning to northern Victoria. He was a keen horseman and spent much of his youth mustering stock in the Black Forest.

Joseph lived at Ashbourne until his death in 1916, and he is buried in the Woodend cemetery. In 1918, when all his children had left Ashbourne, the farm was sold to A.F. Daniel, who is remembered in Daniels Road nearby.

After his death, Joseph's wife Ellen moved to live with her daughter Catherine at Bamawm where she died aged 92 in 1942. After a Requiem Mass in Rochester, her body was taken to Woodend for a service at St Ambrose's Church, and then burial. She left three sons, four daughters, sixteen grandchildren and one great grandchild.
