Woodend Landcare

The Thursday Crew began in 2003, when local residents in Quarry Road (Bert Dawson, Bernie Franklin and the late Arthur Howden) decided to clear the Quarry Road Reserve of dense thickets of invasive woody weeds (pine trees, gorse, broom and blackberries), to create a makeshift path into town and to the railway station. After 15 months of hard yakka, a nondescript pathway was completed. This path continues to be used today. The clearing of the area also created a firebreak for the residents.

The Quarry Road crew joined the 'Woodend and Five Mile Creek' Landcare group in 2005. Because of commitments on weekends, the Thursday Crew was formed to also assist in the restoration of the natural beauty of other areas within Woodend.

Major achievements of the Crew have been the clearing around Lake Earnshaw in 2013 and planting of numerous indigenous plants in the local environment.

At this time, the Crew were ably led by the late Stewart Olney and consisted of former forestry employees Bernie Franklin and Brian Christie. They were ably skilfully supported by such local luminaries as Bob Sullivan, Barry Clark, Paul Newman, John Newell, Jack Manning, Bill Hebb, Mark Horner, Doug Dalgleish and the late Howard Jackson. Some of these members were instrumental in the foundation of the Woodend Men's Shed. Other major works carried out by the Crew were the clearing of gorse along Ella's Way (southern boundary of Gemlife) and the construction of pedestrian footbridges to enable year-round access for people using that route.

Nowadays, 50 per cent of the Thursday Crew are women, but the group continues to carry out mainly woody weed eradication on the public areas around Woodend.

Don't let your campfire become a bushfire this summer

Fire authorities and public land managers have called on anyone camping in Victorian parks, reserves and forests this summer to check the conditions and brush up on campfire safety.

The Conservation Regulator, Parks Victoria, and Forest Fire Management Victoria are reminding campers to act responsibly and be campfire-safe to prevent bushfires, particularly as the weather warms up.

A total of 726 unattended campfires and BBQs were detected by the Conservation Regulator, Parks Victoria and Forest Fire Operations field staff on public land for the 2023/24 financial year.

Our authorised officers are increasing patrols across Victoria's public land to ensure campers are doing the right thing.

During the Labour Day long weekend last year, authorised officers patrolled campsites statewide and found more than 40 campfires still alight during a Total Fire Ban.

Many people try to put out campfires incorrectly with soil, or not enough water to extinguish them completely. Fires that haven't been properly extinguished can smoulder under soil for days and reignite in the right conditions.

Before you light a fire, check fire restrictions and for any Total Fire Ban restrictions. Download the VicEmergency app to stay informed.

- Plan ahead and consider alternatives for cooking such as a portable butane cooktop.
- Use a purpose-built fireplace if available; otherwise, dig a trench at least 30cm deep.
- Always follow the designated rules of your campsite. In national parks, fires can only be lit in purpose-built fireplaces unless marked otherwise.
- The campfire must not exceed one square metre, and three metres above and around your fire must be clear of flammable material
- Branches and logs on your campfire must be no longer than one metre.
- Never leave a campfire unattended an adult must always stay within a 50-metre line of sight.
- Campfires must be extinguished with at least 10 litres of water every time you leave the site, even if it's for a short while. If the remains of the campfire, including coals, are cool to touch, it is safe to leave.
- All rubbish must be taken home with you, not burned.

People who breach campfire regulations on public land face fines of \$577 or a maximum penalty of \$19,231 if the matter is prosecuted in court. The maximum penalty for lighting or maintaining a fire during a Total Fire Ban is \$46,154 and/or two years in jail. Report unattended campfires to 136 186 or call 000 to report a bushfire. Kate Gavens, Chief Conservation Regulator said, "Campfires are a cause of bushfires that are 100 per cent preventable. Ensure you know the rules and are up to date on weather conditions before you light any fire. Your fire is your responsibility."

An independently managed selection process has chosen a mix of people of diverse ages and backgrounds to form a Community Deliberative Engagement Assembly. They will gather in February. This is an important process to ensure we have a good representation of the Macedon Ranges community to provide input into the Council Plan, Financial and Asset Plans and it's great to see people interested and apply to be part of it. This is a requirement under legislation for all Councils.

At the December 2024 Scheduled Council Meeting, Council endorsed a Notice of Motion to write to the Minister for Roads and Road Safety requesting an urgent written response regarding Council and the community ongoing daily safety concerns for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles at the intersection of High Street and Urguhart Street in Woodend (known to many as the Coles intersection), and when a recommendation for the treatment of the intersection will be made publicly available for community feedback. We hope this letter will receive a response shortly, as we would like this project to be fast-tracked.

West Ward Councillors will be launching our community catch-ups in February as well, so please keep an eye out for dates.

November and December 2024 Council Meeting wrap

The new Councillor group held its first scheduled Council Meeting (following the earlier unscheduled meeting to elect the Mayor and Deputy Mayor) on Wednesday 27 November 2024 at the Gisborne Council Chambers, with the evening opened by a Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony.

The following matters were considered and endorsed at the November 2024 Council Meeting:

Contracts to be awarded: Council noted the awarding of contracts by Council officers under delegated authority, for identified renewal works on the Bolinda Hall and for the replacement of the Clarke Street footbridge in Mount Macedon.

Delegated authority was also granted to the CEO to award contracts for two new netball courts at Gilbert Gordon Oval, as well as endorsing selected contractors to the supply panel for future asphalt works on roads across the shire.

Quarterly Financial Report: Council received a report detailing Council's financial performance against the Budget 2024-25 for the first quarter of the financial year (as at 30 September 2024).

The income statement reports an initial operating surplus of \$61.99 million - exceeding the budgeted surplus of \$58.66 million - with this balance to decrease as the year progresses and expenditure is incurred to deliver various services and works.

Audit and Risk Committee Councillor appointments/Council

memberships: Council appointed Cr Alison Joseph and Cr Christine Walker as Councillor delegates to the Audit and Risk Committee, with Cr Cassy Borthwick and Cr Daniel Young appointed as Councillor delegate substitutes.

Council also endorsed ongoing memberships to a number of important industry or advocacy bodies including:

- the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance
- Rural Councils Victoria
- the Municipal Association of Victoria
- the Victorian Local Governance Association
- the Australian Local Government Women's Association Victorian Branch

The December 2024 Planning Delegated Committee Meeting was rescheduled to provide sufficient time for the consideration of any planning matters for the new Councillor group; it was held online at 7pm on Wednesday 11 December 2024.

The following matters were considered and endorsed at the December 2024 Council Meeting:

Adoption of Amendment C154macr: Council adopted Amendment C154macr with changes and moved to submit the Amendment and an associated planning permit application to the Minister for Planning for approval.

The Amendment seeks to rezone some of the last remaining parcels of Farming Zone (FZ) land within the Malmsbury township boundary, at 1 Wills Street in Malmsbury, to Neighbourhood Residential Zone. The planning permit application seeks a nine-lot subdivision with lot sizes from 2,000 to 2,182 square metres.

Environment Group Support + Community Climate Action Grants 2024-25: Council endorsed funding recommendations for successful recipients for the Environment Group Support Grant Program and Community Climate Action Grants 2024–2025.

The 2024-2025 Environment Group Support Grants enable just under \$70,000 to flow through to the shire's Landcare and Friends groups across three grant categories: Group Support, Strategic Weed Partnership Program and Biolink Boost. The new Community Climate Action Grant stream is funding an additional \$33,000 in grassroots climate action projects.



The new Community Climate Action grants and the Biolink Boost grant stream of the Environment Group Support Grants are cofunded in partnership with Macedon Ranges Community Enterprises (MRCE) and Community Bank Gisborne and District. MRCE will match Council's funding to the amount of \$40,000.

PLN/2023/462 - Council endorsed a Notice of Decision to Grant a Permit for the subdivision of land at 104 Melton Road in Gisborne, which would enable 17 lots adjacent to an arterial road, and include removal of native vegetation and the creation of three conservation or drainage reserves.

In considering the application, Council noted a total of 10 objections received through the application process with concerns including overdevelopment, the extent of native vegetation removal proposed and a lack of pedestrian paths/connectivity. A number of these concerns are addressed within the meeting report.

Contracts to be Awarded as at December 2024: Council endorsed an amended motion to defer the item for consideration to the March 2025 Council Meeting, to enable more time for Councillors to be briefed on the proposed supply panel process for commercial builders and associated delegations.

Council Meeting Dates 2025: Council adopted a meeting schedule from January - December 2025, the schedule remained consistent with previous years. A Council Meeting to elect the Mayor was also scheduled for 25 November 2025 at 11am. Council also scheduled a Submitters' Delegated Meeting to be held online at 7pm on Wednesday 19 February 2025 to consider budget submissions and other matters if required.

Integration of the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, Disability Action Plan, and Council Plan: Council approved that the Council Plan, Disability Action Plan and Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan be integrated into a central plan for the community.

Community engagement and stakeholder consultation will be required to inform the development of these plans, with this process already



underway in consideration of a refreshed Council Plan to be adopted by Council by 31 October next year (the year following a general election).

Reconciliation Plan 2024–2027 Draft update: Council received a progress report on the draft Reconciliation Plan 2024-2027, following further consultation with the three Macedon Ranges Traditional Owner groups: DIAARA (Dia Dia Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation), Taungurung Land and Waters Council (TLaWC) and Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Aboriginal Heritage Corporation (Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung).

bagMUSTER has arrived in the **Macedon Ranges**

In January this year, bagMUSTER launched at Council's resource recovery facilities.

An extension of the drumMUSTER program also offered by Council, bagMUSTER recycles eligible single-use polypropylene (PP) agricultural plastic bags used for products like fertiliser, seed, grain (excluding silo bags), stock feed, and pet food.

Agricultural plastic bags typically range from 25kg format to over 1,200kg bulk bags. This program aims to recycle 100 per cent of the bags collected, ensuring they are transformed into new products rather than being sent to landfills.

Farmers, agricultural businesses, and anyone who has purchased single-use polypropylene (PP) agricultural bags, are encouraged to drop off their eligible plastic bags free of charge and support sustainable farming practices.

Renewable energy news from Go Renewable Energy Group

How we can help support the grid's stability and our transition to a renewable energy future

Australia now produces enough electricity from renewable sources such as solar and wind to power about 75% of the country's electricity needs at midday. The nation's challenge now is to store this energy for use at times of peak demand (between 3 and 9 pm). Individual homes can store this energy in the form of hot water using electric hot water systems, or the more efficient hot water heat pumps. Households that own electric vehicles (EVs) can run their cars on sunshine by charging their car batteries when their solar panels are producing energy. Or homes can invest in a home battery and save their energy for the time when the sun goes down and peak electricity prices apply.

Up until now, only off-the-grid homes were allowed to run their homes off their large batteries on wheels (EVs), but the government is now changing the Australian Standards to allow households connected to the grid to feed their homes with energy from their electric vehicles.

This change has big implications for our grid as it allows the use of Virtual Power Plants (VPPs) using electric vehicle batteries, as well as home batteries to be drawn on when the grid demand peaks, to help support the grid's stability. VPPs have just become mainstream as Origin have introduced \$1 plus the normal FiT for each kWh the VPP operator draws down from your batteries. They will draw down a maximum of 200 kWh per annum and won't drain the battery.

Changes in home rooftop solar feed-in tariffs

Up until October 2024, those far-sighted people who installed rooftop solar between 2009 and 2011 were receiving around 66 cents for each kilowatt-hour (kWh) they fed into the grid. This has now changed, and electricity retailers are offering between 3 and 8 cents per kWh (this is known as a "feed-in tariff" - FiT), reflecting the fact that renewable energy from wind and solar are now by far the cheapest way to generate electricity.



This now means that those households with rooftop solar should run their electric water heaters, washing machines and dishwashers while the sun is shining. Those early adopters who have invested in electric vehicles (EVs) will now also be charging their cars while their solar panels are generating electricity and running their cars on sunshine at no cost; or, if they pay for their EV charging energy from the grid, at between a guarter and a third of the cost of petrol.

Volunteers at the Go Renewable Energy Group's (GREG) community buy project can assist Macedon Ranges residents to transition away from gas and to more efficient electrical equipment that can be powered by renewables, by putting them in touch with carefully selected, trusted installers of rooftop solar, home batteries, hot water heat pumps and reverse cycle air conditioners. 

42 years since Ash Wednesday

On February 16, it will be 42 years since the devastating Ash Wednesday bushfires destroyed over 425 houses and claimed seven lives in the Macedon and Mt Macedon areas.

The 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires also extensively damaged the Memorial Cross and gardens, and the area lay in disrepair till the mid-1990s when the Grollo Family and generous community members provided funding to reinstate the cross in its current form.

We will also pass 16 years since Black Saturday on 7 February, and five years since the infamous Black Summer, to remind us that we should never become complacent.

There is still one month of summer to go with some warm weather ahead, and our forests and grasslands are now well and truly baked from the recent dry spell.

This month remains a very dangerous part of the fire season, with history showing that most major grass and bushfires in the Macedon Ranges occur in February and March.

Everyone needs a fire plan

One of the most important things we all need to do is prepare and practice a clear Bushfire Safety Plan, particularly whether you are going to stay or go.

Will you have time to leave the area safely? When will you go? Where will you go? What will you take? Who will you tell? What about your pets? Will you know in which direction the fire is travelling?



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
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If you can see the fire, it's probably too late to leave. You should not attempt to leave your home at the last minute, when radiant heat is at its peak. The vast majority of deaths in bushfire involve people caught in cars or on foot. Once the fire is close, visibility will be very poor and travel will be hazardous. Fallen trees, power lines, abandoned cars or even firefighting vehicles may block roads.

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
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




Paddock-to-Plate lunch showcasing local produce

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More support for sports clubs

The Allan Labor Government is backing local sport clubs with grants to help more people get involved in the sports they love.

Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence announced late last year that 875 grants will go to more than 740 clubs, who will share in more than \$1.2 million from the Sporting Club Grants Program. Among the grant awardees were:

Woodend Junior Football & Netball Club, which was awarded \$1,971 for first aid training and \$1,000 for a new defibrillator and first aid supplies; and

Woodend Hawks Basketball Club, who were awarded \$1,000 for new balls and first aid kits for young teams

The grants are intended for the purchase of uniforms and equipment, training of volunteers, coaches and officials, and to improve accessibility and engagement with local communities. Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "This program is always popular amongst our local clubs and athletes, it supports them to have what they need, to take part in the sports they love."

Maintenance improvements for Woodend Primary School

Students will benefit from maintenance works set to be carried out at Woodend Primary School. Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas announced Woodend Primary to be one of 88 schools that will



share in over \$19.9 million of funding from the Planned Maintenance Program (PMP) to undertake 90 maintenance projects between them. Woodend Primary will receive funding to completely rebuild three ramps and undertake minor works at five ramps. This is the latest round of PMP, which provides funding to address high-priority maintenance works across Victoria's government schools, including essential work in classrooms and other school buildings such as roof repairs and window replacement, ramp maintenance, painting, and floor resurfacing, as well as some external works like the improvement of pathways.

"Every student should have access to a great school, that's why we're supporting local schools in the Macedon Ranges with the resources they need to make a difference to the educational outcomes of students across the state," said Ms Thomas.

Works are determined by a rolling facilities evaluation process, which provides up-to-date information on the condition of schools to create a faster and more targeted allocation of funding. In 2024, 342 schools have received over \$99.9 million in total for work on 349 projects, including the projects announced today.

Giving Macedon women and girls fair access to sport

The State Government's Fair Access Policy Roadmap is now statewide, ensuring women and girls across Victoria have equal access to sporting facilities and opportunities.

Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence recently announced the policy's statewide adoption. All of Victoria's 79 councils and Alpine Resorts Victoria will now adopt the framework for their local communities, including the shires of Macedon Ranges, Hepburn, Mount Alexander, and Moorabool in Macedon.

Since its launch in August 2022, the Roadmap has been helping councils and their local sporting clubs create equal access and opportunities for women and girls so that all Victorians can participate in the sports they love.

As part of the Roadmap, councils must have policies in place to be eligible for community sports program funding. The policies are tailored to the local community and designed to achieve long-term change resulting in more equal participation for women and girls.

Examples include how women and girls will be considered when it comes to allocating community sports facilities, like ovals, changerooms and courts.

"This policy will make a big difference for the women and girls of Macedon, ensuring they get access to the sports facilities and opportunities they deserve."

Developed in partnership with Sport and Recreation Victoria and VicHealth, the Roadmap supports councils with obligations under the Gender Equality Act 2020.

Commissioner for Gender Equality in the Public Sector Dr Niki Vincent said, "For too long, women and girls have been overlooked in the design and delivery of public policies, programs, and services. Thanks to the Gender Equality Act and the role of the Fair Access Policy Roadmap in supporting councils, this is changing for community sport. This powerful change is to be applauded."

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Fire Danger Period continues

The Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges began on 25 November 2024 and will continue on 1 May 2025 unless otherwise advised. No fires can be lit in the open air without a permit during this period.



The Bureau of Meteorology forecast an increased chance of warmer than average days and nights across most of Australia during this summer.

Council's CEO, Bernie O'Sullivan, said several shire-wide fire prevention initiatives were already well progressed to slash grass along Council-managed roadsides, keep trees a safe distance away from powerlines and reduce fuel loads, such as unmaintained long grass, excessive woodpiles or other debris, on private properties.

"We know fire does not discriminate and so it is important for us to complete annual programs we're responsible for, while working closely with the community to collectively reduce the shire's fire risk," he said. Mr O'Sullivan encouraged residents to review their fire plan, or create one, drawing from the range of useful resources available online through trusted authorities such as the CFA.



Recollections of Early Woodend

In Woodend's early days, the sound of axes chopping wood rang through the forest. Men felled logs with an axe and snigged them with horses or bullocks to a sawmill nearby. Timber was in great demand for fencing, railway sleepers and buildings. Even in the 1930s Depression, Paddy Cocks and his brother Jack boosted their income as timber cutters. Their parents William Cocks and his wife Mary raised their family of

three girls and four boys on their mixed farm in Woodend.

William also earned money as a blacksmith and a farrier and mowed the fairways of the Woodend Golf Club.

His grandson, Donald Humphrey, remembered spending his holidays on the farm and watching horses being shod. He said he would never forget the ring of the hammer on the anvil as his grandfather shaped a new piece of iron from the forge. He also remembered how William fitted a new iron tyre to the

> wooden-spoked wheel from a dray, first removing the old tyre, then heating the new tyre to a dull redness, the careful lifting of the new tyre over the wooden rim and the quick quenching of the flames on the rim. Donald loved pumping the bellows of the forge and the smell of the blacksmith's shop was unforgettable.
