



# Vale Councillor Christine Walker

Council is mourning the sudden passing of South Ward Councillor, Christine Walker, having been made aware of the tragic news on Saturday morning.



Fellow South Ward Councillor and Mayor, Dom Bonanno, said: "I have spoken with Christine's husband Andrew and on behalf of Council, offered our deepest collective condolences and any support the family may need through this incredibly difficult time."

"This news has left me and many others in total shock. Christine brought a natural warmth and humour to the Councillor role, but she was also incredibly inquisitive, thoughtful and regularly offered valuable insights from her experience as a market researcher. Vale Christine – you will be sorely missed, and our thoughts and prayers are with Andrew, daughter Isobel, and the wider Walker family."

Cr Walker was first elected to the role in November 2023 through a countback to fill a vacancy caused by a resignation. She was then reelected for a four-year term at the October 2024 Council Elections.

Council's CEO Bernie O'Sullivan said Council staff were also notified of the shock news over the weekend and staff who worked closely with Christine will really feel this loss.

"I join the Mayor on behalf of Council and staff in offering my sincere condolences to Andrew, Isobel, and the extended Walker family," Mr O'Sullivan said. "Our Councillors become family in many ways – we are feeling this sudden loss deeply and will do for a long time."

"Christine came into the role later than those around her in her first term, but she showed great willingness to weather the whirlwind of information to support and speed up her induction. Her community-driven approach, attention to detail and warmth were respected by all those around her."

Council will be making no further comment at this point in time and ask that the Walker family be given time and space to privately grieve. More information on the Councillor vacancy will be provided in due course, in consultation with the Victorian Electoral Commission.

# Let's give our threatened species a helping hand, starting in our own backyards

# Gisborne's endangered vegetation and waterways receive restoration boost

Waterways, vegetation, and habitats for some of the Gisborne area's most vulnerable wildlife are set to benefit from a significant grant-funded restoration over the next three years.

Federal Member for McEwen Rob Mitchell MP, Mayor Dom Bonanno and CEO Bernie O'Sullivan, visited Jacksons Creek earlier this year to celebrate the successful grant of \$838,295, funded by the Australian Government's National Heritage Trust under the Urban Rivers and Catchments Program.

The project aims to improve the ecological health of the headwaters of the Maribyrnong catchment in and around the Gisborne and Macedon townships, benefitting native species including the Gang-gang Cockatoo, platypus, and various grassland and creek-line species.

It will involve site preparation works, revegetation, and management of threats to successful establishment (including targeting high-threat weeds, pest animal impacts, fire management, and monitoring works).

The objective of the Urban Rivers and Catchments Program is to conserve native and threatened plant and animal species and waterways in urban, outer urban/peri-urban, and regional centres. The project aligns with Council's environmental strategic plans including the Biodiversity Strategy 2018, Macedon Ranges Strategic Environmental Works Plan 2021, Environmental Management Plans for Bunjil and Howey Creek, and the Djirri Djirri Waterway Reserve – Revegetation Plan 2024.

The project is due to commence this month and will be completed in 2028.

# Climate-smart support available to farmers

More than \$76 million in funding to 54 projects across the country has been announced, which will help farmers adopt more climate-smart, sustainable agriculture practices.

One such project, North Central CMA's Climate Positive Farming Initiative, is making \$1.8 million available to the region.

Partnering with the agricultural sector to encourage the adoption of more sustainable farming practices, the project provides information on carbon and climate incentives, promoting best practices in regenerative agriculture, and focusing on innovation and soil health.

North Central CMA will partner with farmers, communities, First Nations People, universities, and industry by establishing climate adaptation plans for farmers, and running education programs around improving soil health and efficient land management.

The projects are funded under the Natural Heritage Trust's Climate-Smart Agriculture Program and will seek to build on local knowledge, targeting what is most needed, from improving soil health, combating land degradation and improving water-use efficiency to farm-management planning and revegetation.

Activities such as on-farm demonstrations and workshops will increase awareness and adoption by farmers and landholders.

The Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters MP lauded the program, and said, "This is a significant investment that will help local farmers adopt climate-smart farming practices, delivering better outcomes for rural communities and the environment."

The Climate-Smart Agriculture Program runs over five years from 2023 to 2028. For a full list of projects and to learn more visit: agriculture.gov.au/climate-smart.

# **Every backyard counts** - National Threatened **Species Day**

Sunday 7 September 2025 is National Threatened Species Day. It is a reminder that even the smallest actions can make a big difference for our native plants and animals - and it all starts in your own backyard.

As more of our natural habitat is lost or fragmented, our backyards and balconies are becoming important refuges for wildlife. Whether it's insects buzzing in the garden, lizards warming themselves on a rock, or birds stopping in for a drink - your garden can provide much-needed food, water and shelter.

Insects might not get much attention, but they're vital to our ecosystems. They pollinate plants, break down organic matter and support frogs, lizards and birds further up the food chain.

So how can you help? Try planting a few locally native species, leave some leaf litter for skinks, or put out a shallow dish of water for thirsty birds and bees. Even a single pot of flowers on a balcony can help attract pollinators.

# **Strengthening** the Woodend community

Federal Member for McEwen Rob Mitchell was proud to congratulate local Woodend community groups for successful grant applications under the Stronger Communities Grant program in August.

The Stronger Communities Programme (SCP) provides grants of between \$2,500 and \$20,000 to community organisations and local governments for infrastructure projects that deliver social benefits for local communities.

A number of Woodend groups were successful in receiving funding for some innovative projects.

The Woodend Golf Club's successful grant funding will allow them to rehabilitate a disused quarry on the course and convert it into an open space suitable for native plantings, passive recreation and golf.

"The area is currently infested with blackberries and other weeds, is not accessible and poses fire and other environmental risks, as it harbors foxes, rabbits and other pests," Club secretary James O'Brien said.

"Earthworks will allow for better public access, and extensive indigenous plantings

of native grasses and plants will encourage the restoration of habitat for native wildlife,"

Another local grant recipient is Woodend Bowling Club, who applied for funds to assist them to purchase and install a renewable energy source.

"With electricity one of our largest expenses, especially when hosting a large number of bowling and community events each year, the purchase and installation of a solar panel and inverter system will go a long way to reducing these costs in an environmentally friendly manner," Club President Mike Dornau

"Our club is hosting more and more community events and we like to be able to only charge low 'mates' rates' for volunteer and community groups who

wish to use the space. Reducing our overheads will go a long way to help us do this."

Mr Mitchell encourages all community groups to look out for the next round of **Stronger Communities** Grants, which will be advertised on his social media pages.

"Congratulations to the Woodend Golf

Club and the Woodend Bowling Club on their successful applications and for the contribution they make to our local community," Mr Mitchell said.

# The importance of plant guards

There are many reasons why plant guards are used when planting seedlings. Their primary role is to protect the tiny plants from:

- grazing by rabbits, kangaroos, etc
- · wind and harmful weather
- · trampling by people, dogs, etc
- destruction by mowers, whipper snippers, etc
- smothering and competition for resources by surrounding weeds (when used with a weed mat).

However, there are also many less obvious reasons for using plant guards, including:

- making a visual statement of where revegetation activities have taken place
- enabling easy identification of small natives from surrounding weedy vegetation. This is particularly important for native grasslike seedlings and bulbs that die back for part of the year.
- cordoning off areas from mowing to enable natural regrowth within revegetation sites.
- enabling data collection to monitor seedling survival rates, so planting success can be improved (even guards around dead seedlings give us important information!).
- enabling easy identification of seedlings for follow up watering and weed control.

#### Why don't we guard every plant?

Plant guards are expensive and installation takes time, so we don't guard plants unless we think it is really necessary.



Every planting site is different. For example, in our recent Black Gum Biolink plantings between Jeffreys Street and the Scout Hall, we mainly only guarded plants along the path to form a 'fence'. The majority of the plants inside the revegetation area are simply marked with a bamboo stake, as the mulch will prevent them from being smothered by weeds.

#### What sort of guards do we use?

There are many different plant guards available. Traditionally we have mainly used plastic sleeves held in place by bamboo stakes. However, as the use of plastic is no longer desirable, we only use plastic plant guards in places where they are unlikely to wash or blow into a waterway, and these are reused guards.

Instead, we now use biodegradable cardboard guards, which break down if they end up in the creek. Cardboard guards come in various sizes, with the larger guards having holes in the sides as well as the top, to allow light in. The size of the guard used is matched to the plant and the conditions.

#### Please, do not remove plant guards!

Woodend Landcare has spent a lot of time and money buying and installing plant guards. Recently guards have been disappearing before the seedlings are big enough to survive without them.

We strongly request that nobody removes plant guards for the reasons outlined above. Woodend Landcare volunteers will take away the guards when the time is right.

Welcome to September. Spring is here, bringing fresh landscapes, brighter days, and renewed energy across our community.

Last month, we were deeply saddened by the sudden passing of South Ward Councillor, Cr Christine Walker. Christine, in her second term on the council, contributed greatly with her intelligence, humour, market research expertise, and strategic insights. She was also a much-loved Mount Macedon local and friend.

Tributes from groups such as The Mount Players, Macedon & Mount Macedon Community House, and Change It Up Training reflected just how many lives she touched. Christine's impact was evident by the sheer volume of loved ones and overflow at her funeral. Vale, Christine Walker.

Council recently received a briefing on the Macedon Ranges Cultural Centre – a proposed project to revitalise the Woodend Community Centre and Library at High and Forest Streets. The project aims to enhance the area's cultural landscape by upgrading the current buildings, which are experiencing wear and tear, and utilising the spaces more effectively to meet the growing community's needs and the increasing tourism. At the July meeting, Council endorsed the release of the draft Woodend Racecourse Reserve Master Plan for four weeks of community consultation. The draft also included the potential inclusion of a facility to accommodate a Woodend Men's Shed, acknowledging previous interest expressed by the group. Once consultation opens, feedback can be shared via yoursay.mrsc.vic. gov.au.

The first hearing of the parliamentary inquiry into wildlife roadstrike was recently held in Bendigo. Witnesses included wildlife rescuers, researchers, and representatives from Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Macedon Ranges Wildlife Network, Wildlife Rescue Information Network, and RSPCA Victoria. Two-week-old wombat joeys were even presented as a poignant reminder of the impact of road strikes on native wildlife. Thank you to all who represented our region with such dedication.

Draft Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) 2026–2029

Feedback received regarding the draft DAMP (2026-2029) will assist Council to further refine the Draft DAMP 2026–2029.

The final draft DAMP 2026–2029, along with the consultation findings, is expected to be presented to Council to consider for adoption at its November 2025 Council Meeting. The new plan is then scheduled to be submitted to the Victorian Government in December 2025

Proposed changes to dog off-leash and prohibited areas (for both dogs and cats)

Feedback received regarding Council's proposed changes to dog off-leash and prohibited areas – otherwise known as Schedule 1 (dog

off leash areas) and Schedule 2 (prohibited areas for dogs and cats) of Council's Dog and Cat Order 2019, will be considered during early-mid 2026, as a first-year action of Council's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2026–2029.

Final amendments to Council's dog off-leash and prohibited areas (Schedules 1 and 2 of Council's Dog and Cat Order 2019) are expected to be presented to Council in mid-2026.

# **Equine Land Management Grazing Course**

The Equine Land Management Grazing Course has been designed to assist horse owners to improve their skills and knowledge about grazing horses. The course explores methods to increase soil health and perennial pasture species (including native species) while maintaining the health of their horses.

It is structured for small landowners (2–20Ha) with grazing horses and is designed to use the resources and time you have available to improve your property. The course is presented by Jason McAinch, Council's Private Land Conservation Officer, with a local horse owner.


The course will run across three sessions: Friday 17 October, 31 October, and 14 November from 2–6pm.



In their original music, there is much stylistic variation. Sometimes I will walk in and hear Nirvana on the boil; other times I could easily be sitting on a beach in Waikiki in the 1960s."

Their teacher is not surprised that the band's hard work has been paying off. "They were rehearsing at school during the holidays; at lunchtimes and during their scheduled ensemble lessons."The experience of competing in the Battle of the Bands was incredibly exciting for them, he says, and the win of the People's Choice - voted by members of the audience on the night, which included supportive family, friends and staff members from the school – was the icing on the cake. "I think the looks on their faces when they won said it all - a priceless moment for all of us ... We are incredibly proud of our students - their positive mindset and effort has truly paid off on this occasion!"

The Electric Eels were one of six acts participating in the Battle of the Bands. The overall winners on the night - chosen by three industry professionals, judges Tim Wamala from music not-for-profit The Push, Hannah Findlay from the band Stonefield and music producer Andrew McCubbin – were The Mods. Also in the running were The Felonys, Thunderchief, Elysium and soloist Mousie Coco. In his closing remarks, co-judge Tim Wamala noted that the standard of performance was among the highest that he'd seen in the many Battles of the Bands he'd judged.

Battle of the Bands is an annual competition for musical acts aged from 12-25 years, presented by Music in the Sticks, a project of Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Macedon Ranges Youth team.

After successfully resettling a Syrian family of five last year, the Woodend Refugee Resettlement (WRR) Group have been recently matched with a new family for resettlement. Again this is being done as part of CRISP – Community Refugee Integration and Settlement Pilot

Our new family are Venezuelan, arriving from Trinidad and Tobago. They are a young family with a primary school-aged son.

As we did last time, our group will meet them at the airport and from there we will begin the process of introducing them to life in Australia, and specifically, Woodend. Now that we have been given a date for their arrival, we will begin the process of finding and furnishing a house for them. Of course, this is the most difficult part of the process, and we are aware and sensitive to the fact that housing is difficult for everyone at the moment. If you do know of anything becoming available in the next few months or if you have accommodation that may not have full occupancy for a few months, we would be very grateful if you got in touch.

The family speak Spanish and are very keen to learn English as quickly as possible. If you speak Spanish and would like to join us for some morning coffees etc, please also get in touch.

Getting to know this family and being able to offer them the opportunity to rebuild their lives in safety is something we are very much looking forward to.

The aim of CRISP is to harness the generosity, goodwill and social capital of everyday Australians to provide a warm and supportive welcome into local communities. # What's better than Fortnite? Building a 50kg robot, obviously.

While most 13-year-olds were grinding for loot in Fortnite, a team from Global Village Learning spent the term building something way cooler – a real-life robot for the Melbourne Robotics Tournament (offseason edition).

As the newest team on the block, we entered a field of 26 teams with our bot that looked like a chicken coop on wheels. The competition was packed with action and quick decision-making – including being randomly teamed up with other competitors, sometimes just minutes after battling them.

We were incredibly lucky to be loaned a robot by none other than the current Australian champions, IC Robotics. Their support didn't stop there – their Lead Mentor, Marty Stow, gave us expert advice and ongoing encouragement that helped us stay focused and improve with every match. We honestly couldn't have done it without them.

Things got real when our robot controller gave up mid-match. But in classic robotics style, the community stepped up – with teams running over to lend us their spare controllers. Forget robot wars – this was robot graciousness.

Despite being rookies, we clawed our way to the preliminary finals, placed third overall, and took home the Rookie Inspiration Award. Not bad for a first try (and yes, our robot is still clucking along).

We learned more than just tech skills – resilience, teamwork, and how to think fast under pressure. And while Fortnite might build quick reflexes, building a bot builds brains, friendships, and some serious bragging rights.

We're now hoping to enter the full-season tournament kicking off in January 2026. To make that happen, we're raising funds to purchase a robot of our own and to travel to Sydney in March 2026 for the competition.

# An update from the **RSL**

It has been some time since we reported in The New Woodend Star, so we thought we had better report on ANZAC Day and more current items that we think will be of interest to the community.

The Woodend RSL Sub-Branch Committee and members wish to thank the community for both the excellent attendance and the support for ANZAC Day. We especially thank the local school children who presented and spoke well on this solemn occasion. We also acknowledge the support of the Braemar School Cadets in supporting us at the local market and for participation in the ceremonial activities on the day. Our ANZAC Appeal was again successful, thanks to the generosity of members of the public. The funds raised are for any Veterans and/or families to cover emergencies/change of circumstance.

Australia's newest Victoria Cross award was announced recently for Richard Norden. Richard was a Private in the Australian Army who performed a brave act that gained him the Distinguished Conduct Medal during the Battle of Coral-Balmoral (1968). It is guite a story about his bravery. When Richard (Dick) returned to Australia after his service he joined the ACT Federal Police Force. He was tragically killed in a motorcycle accident in 1972 whilst on duty. After 50 years of campaigning, his award has been finally upgraded to a Victoria Cross. This news was well received by our local veterans who knew and served with Dick.

Our projects are progressing with the commencement of our mural planned for spring. Once again, thank you to the community for their support for this local artwork to be done. It will be a fitting storyboard of Australian military history and will display a sample of local involvement in significant world events. We have installed lights and expanded the security system to cover that area of our building. This was an unfortunate requirement after our building was vandalised in January this year.

We have a new shed in construction, which was funded by a Victorian Government Veterans Capital Works grant. This will allow safer access for stowage and setup of event seating and other materials which are intermittently used throughout the year. This will also provide an undercover workshop area for building and grounds maintenance by veteran volunteers. The project will also involve removing the smaller, inadequate old shedding to create more useable space for events and activities.

We completed our install of our new pass-through washer in the kitchen with funding support from Kyneton RSL and a community grant from Bendigo Bank (Trentham). This will aid catering at functions and community events and reduce the risk of injury from bending and lifting with the previous under-bench washer, which was becoming unreliable after many years of work.

Our charter is not only to help and support veterans and service personnel and their families, but is also to work with the community to support each other and spread the culture of mateship. That culture of mateship helped get our past and recent ANZACs and soldiers through some tough times. Mateship is what we all need during tough times in civilian life as well.

Please contact us (admin@woodendrsl.org) if you are aware of any Veterans or Veteran families who may need some help or assistance. We have many Veterans from recent conflicts in Afghanistan and other places who are now in our community. They may need our support and mateship as well.

# Message from your local police sergeant

As we head into the back end of winter, the days are getting longer and there's a bit of warmth finally coming into the air. Hopefully this means less frosts and icy conditions.

Recently there were Loss Prevention Officers working at one of our local supermarkets, and disappointingly both they and Woodend Police were busy that day dealing with the aftermath; several people were arrested for shop stealing, ranging from youths to some of our more senior people within the community.

All of those arrested were locals and not one person caught stealing was doing so because they were desperate for food or short of money. In fact, quite the opposite, most (other than the youths) were financially well off.

We know that there are organised groups that steal from supermarkets, operating across Victoria and Woodend is not immune to these incidents.

However, locals committing petty thefts (thrill thefts) from local businesses is disappointing. It was a real eye-opener to the businesses, so don't be surprised if Loss Prevention Officers become more frequent in Woodend.

The frequency of serious collisions on our roads is a big concern for Victoria Police, the Government, and the other emergency services, so be assured that Woodend Police will be a strong visible presence out on our streets and roads – enforcing and educating.

Please take care, and whilst we are always happy for a chat, I'm sure you'd rather talk to me or one of the Woodend Police Team as a professional courtesy, rather than through a formal discussion about your traffic breach.

# Come and visit our Firewise Garden.

Now that spring is here, why not take some extra care in selecting any new plants you are thinking of adding to your garden? And what better place

to get some ideas than by visiting the Firewise Garden in front of the Woodend CFA Fire Station. The Firewise Garden was created several years ago to give residents and visitors an idea of plants that are ideal for our local conditions.

Landscaping for bushfire involves planning, designing, planting and managing the area around a house. This incorporates five key principles:

- Create defendable spaces
- Remove flammable objects from around the house
- Break up fuel continuity
- Carefully select and locate plants within the garden
- Regularly maintain garden and its interface with the house

Other key considerations in the design include that there should be:

- No flammable objects close to the eaves or roofline
- No overhanging or bark-shedding trees
- Non-flammable hardscaping: steel edging, wide gravel paths and gravel mulch
- Short, well-maintained areas of lawn.

Factoring in the various Firewise principles, the plant list for our garden consists of:

- A single smooth-barked tree with an open canopy and no lower branches
- Well-spaced shrubs and ground covers
- Few fine-leafed or very dense plant species
- Few resinous or waxy plants
- Few plants which drop or retain dead material
- A mixture of native and exotic plants
- Plants to attract birds, butterflies and other pollinators

# Did you know? Women in **Rotary**



Prior to women being permitted to join Rotary in 1989, wives of Rotarians were affectionately called 'Rotary Anns', a term of endearment that grew out of an interesting historical occasion.

In 1914, San Francisco Rotarians boarded a train for the Rotary Convention in Houston. Until the train stopped in Los Angeles, the only woman aboard was the wife of Rotarian Bru Brunnier, Ann, who was introduced as the Rotarian's Ann. This title soon became 'Rotary

Throughout the journey a number of songs and stunts were organised to be performed in Houston, including a 'Rotary Ann' chant. On the train's arrival, a delegation greeted the West Coast Rotarians, including Guy Gundaker of Philadelphia, whose wife was also named Ann.

During the rousing demonstration, someone started the Rotary Ann chant. The two petite ladies, Ann Brunnier and Ann Gundaker, were hoisted to the men's shoulders and paraded about the hall. The group loved the title given to the two women and the same term of endearment was soon used for all of the wives in attendance – the name

'Rotary Ann' was here to stay!

Guy Gundaker became RI president in 1923 and Bru Brunnier was elected president in 1952. Thus, each of the two original Rotary Anns became the 'first ladies of Rotary International'.



## It's not too late to vaccinate

Although winter might have gone away, the risk of catching the flu has not. The flu can make even healthy people very sick, and it spreads easily - especially in workplaces, schools, and public places. Each year, thousands of Australians end up in hospital due to flu complications, so it's important to take steps to protect yourself and your loved ones.

The flu vaccine is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over, and it's free under the National Immunisation Program (NIP) for eligible groups including:

- People aged 65 and over
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Pregnant women
- Children aged 6 months to under 5 years
- People with certain medical conditions

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is another common virus that spreads in winter. It often causes cold-like symptoms but can lead to serious illness. Council is also offering RSV vaccination for eligible adults and infants.

## Victorian students top of the class in NAPLAN

Victorian students have achieved their strongest NAPLAN results ever.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education Ben Carroll announced last month that Victorian students ranked first or second in 18 of 20 measures and significantly improved on their 2024 results.

An average of 70 per cent of Victorian students fall in the 'strong' or 'exceeding' bands, while all age groups ranked first or second in all 10 domains.

In Victoria, high performing students are supported to further excel, and this year more students reached the two highest bands.

The 2025 results also show that fewer students are needing additional support - with fewer students in the bottom band than in 2024 on 16 of 20 measures.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas congratulated local students, teachers, staff and families, saying "We've achieved this thanks to your hard work and dedication."

Victoria achieved its highest NAPLAN participation rate since 2008, with 96.6 per cent of students completing at least one assessment in 2025.

While celebrating these excellent results, work continues in lifting outcomes for disadvantaged students and to close the attainment gap for First Nations students - through targeted programs including the \$18.5 million Koorie Literacy and Numeracy Program.

## **Grants to preserve the legacy of Victorian Veterans**

Veterans and their families will receive funding through new grants that honour their service and support their wellbeing.

Minister for Veterans Natalie Suleyman last month opened applications for two grant programs that honour veterans, support their welfare and strengthen community recognition of their contribution.

The Anzac Day Proceeds Fund offers grants of up to \$150,000 to organisations delivering welfare support to veterans across the state, and grants of up to \$50,000 to organisations delivering initiatives for veterans in a specific region or area.

This year's funding priorities include initiatives that support female, First Nations and LGBTIQA+ veterans, veterans living with disability and those from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

Other priorities include support for veterans who served in post-1990 Australian Defence Force operations, and collaborative projects delivered by multiple ex-service organisations.

Previous recipients include Soldier On, which delivered the 'Empower-Her' program to more than 1,500 female veterans and their families by offering women-only retreats, family events and parenting support.

Applications are also open for the Victoria Remembers Grant Program, offering grants of up to \$30,000 for projects that commemorate veterans and deepen public understanding of their service, including new memorials, significant anniversary events and public education campaigns.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said, "This funding will help ensure we continue to remember and honour the service and sacrifice of the veteran community in Macedon."

Last year, the Vietnam Veterans Association Bendigo Branch partnered with Hebron Films to document and preserve the stories of Central Victoria's Vietnam veterans, marking 50 years since the end of the Vietnam War.

## **Smoother journeys on Tylden-Woodend Road**

A rebuild and rehabilitation project along two stretches of Tylden-Woodend Road in Tylden were completed recently, as part of the Victorian Government's \$964 million road maintenance program.

Crews have finished rebuilding a two-kilometre section of Tylden-Woodend Road between Caddys Lane and Maxwell Street and a one-kilometre-plus section from Harpers Road to the railway

Existing road surfaces were removed, the road foundations rebuilt, and new line-markings applied to the newly rebuilt roads.

"This means safer journeys for drivers in the area, who will see resurfaced roads and new markings - meaning a smoother journey for all," said Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP of the works.

## **Protecting our schools from** bushfire season

Grants are being provided by the Victorian Government to clear vegetation growth and reduce the risk of fire, to ensure schools are well-prepared for the upcoming bushfire season.

Mary-Anne Thomas today announced twenty-one schools in the region that will share in funding to carry out essential works.

The program was introduced in 2018 to help schools undertake essential vegetation clearance around the school buildings prior to the bushfire season and in line with municipal fire danger periods.

Schools receiving funds are listed on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR). These schools are required to undertake vegetation works on a regular basis to reduce the risk of harm to the school's community and buildings in the event of a bushfire.

The Bushfire Preparedness Vegetation Program also includes a School Support Program, providing two school visits to each participating schools by an accredited Bushfire Planning and Design consultant, who develops a Vegetation Management Plan. Schools can also engage additional bushfire-related professional services such as a Bushfire Attack Level expert - to provide further advice and support in reducing their bushfire risk.

Victoria is one of the most bushfire-prone areas in the world – that's why everyone should have a bushfire plan and the VicEmergency app downloaded on their phone.

## Work from home legislation on the horizon

The Victorian Government will introduce legislation to protect the ability of an employee to work from home. Under this proposed law, if a worker can reasonably do their job from home, they will have the right to do so for at least two days a week, whether they are in the public or private sector.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said of the proposal, "Work from home saves families money, helps people get back into the workforce - and it even cuts congestion."

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, more than a third of Australian workers - including 60 per cent of managers and professionals - regularly worked from home ("Working Arrangements, reference period August 2024, released December 2024).

The Department of Premier and Cabinet will undertake consultation to consider the types and size of businesses that will be covered by the scheme, as well as the definition of remote work.

The Victorian Government expects to introduce and pass the working from home legislation in 2026, with several legislative options available.

## **Investing in Victoria's** creative organisations

Jobs and local talent will be supported and creative industries strengthened across the state, following the launch of the next round of the Creative Enterprises Program (CEP) by the Minister for Creative Industries, Colin Brooks in July. Four years of funding is offered in this round to help creative organisations expand their work.

Eligible organisations can now apply for long-term funding to build their workforce, grow their reach, and create more opportunities for Victorians to get involved in the creative sector.

The program has three investment streams - First Peoples Organisations, Industry Service Organisations and Creative Organisations.

Organisations that receive funding will be expected to deliver benefits to the wider creative economy, by creating jobs, nurturing new talent, reaching new audiences. The program also supports creative organisations to diversify their income and strengthen their businesses, so they can continue to grow and adapt in a changing environment.

A First Peoples self-determined approach will ensure the program enhances the connection between Victoria's creative industries, Community and Country, increases First Peoples employment and participation, and enables Victorian Traditional Owner Custodians to work on their ancestral Country.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said she encourages local creative organisations to apply, to allow them to " ... continue to grow and adapt in a changing environment and ensure that Victoria remains the creative capital of Australia."

The program will invest in organisations that demonstrate a strong plan to support creative jobs, expand their reach and deliver real benefits for their communities.

According to the Victorian Government, the state's creative economy provides employment to more than 327,000 workers from performers and producers to designers, editors, technicians and beyond.

## **Power bill relief for** Victorians who need it most this winter

Another round of the Power Saving Bonus has opened for applications.

Minister for Energy and Resources Lily D'Ambrosio announced that the fifth round of the bonus will provide a \$100 payment to eligible concession card households across the state.

Eligible Victorian households can apply for the Power Saving Bonus through the Victorian Energy Compare (VEC) website, whilst checking they're on the best energy offer.

When applying, eligible households need a recent residential electricity bill and must hold a health care, pensioner concession, Veterans' Affairs pensioner concession or Veterans' Affairs gold card. For those without internet access or for anyone needing extra support accessing the bonus, 250 participating Neighbourhood Houses across Victoria are delivering in-person support to apply.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said, "I encourage eligible members of our community to apply for the fifth round of the Victorian Government's Power Saving Bonus and to visit the independent VEC website to find a better deal for their households."

All Victorians are encouraged to visit the free and independent VEC website to shop around for a better deal on their energy - last year, users typically saved \$240 per year on their energy bills by switching providers.

The Energy Assistance Program – helping to expand its services in response to increasing demand – is also offering free one-on-one help for vulnerable and hard-to-reach customers struggling with their energy bills.

## **Growing stronger, more** connected communities in Macedon

The Victorian Health Promotion Foundation (VicHealth) is calling for applications for \$4.7M in Growing Healthy Communities Grants, aimed at supporting community organisations to deliver health promotion initiatives that break down barriers to good health among young people and their families across Victoria.

VicHealth CEO, Prof. Anna Peeters AM, said that the Growing Healthy Communities initiative is an opportunity for community-led organisations to play a key role in shaping a healthier, fairer Victoria.

"By investing in local solutions that tackle the social and environmental drivers of poor health, we're supporting generational change, particularly for communities that have historically been left behind."

"Community organisations are uniquely placed to lead local change. Together, we can create healthier neighbourhoods, reduce preventable disease, and build a more connected, inclusive Victoria." Prof. Peeters said.

Projects must be delivered within the period from March 2026 to March 2028.



### Pioneer families lose two icons

In June this year, Woodend lost two highly regarded residents. Barbara Ruth Brown, who died aged 83 on 9 June, will be fondly and gratefully remembered by hundreds of students who attended the Woodend Primary School where 'Miss Brown' taught from 1970 until 2010, the last few years being part-time.

In the mid-1940s, Barbara's family left Brunswick to buy a farm in Hesket on what is now Hylands Road. Barbara's father, Harry, was a 'horseman', working the land with horses. Later, the family moved to Woodend. Barbara had seven brothers and sisters in a very close family where celebrations and family gatherings were common.

After school, Barbara attended teacher's college before starting her long career in teaching. She had a passion for teaching and was a bottomless source of care, strength, love and advice for all her family, including her thirty-three nieces and nephews and their families, her students and their parents. Many students said she had a lasting influence on their careers. She was active in the community, particularly enjoying tennis and being involved with St Mary's Anglican church. Animals were an important part of her life, especially dogs and cats, which featured in many happy photos at the memorial service.

A member of another pioneering family of the Hesket district, Arthur Else, died on 4 June aged ninety-eight. In 1885, Arthur's grandfather James bought eighty acres to add to his existing land in the Kerrie Valley and developed Spring Grove Farm. After his marriage, Arthur moved to Woodend and with his wife, Audrey, had four sons. He worked at the Woodend Railway Station for forty-one years in various roles. He was a keen sportsman, playing football, cricket, tennis and bowls. He volunteered at the Tourist Information Centre and was much respected for his numerous community activities.

In 2001 Arthur joined the Woodend & District Heritage Society. Janet Hawkins had initiated the Heritage Walk along Five Mile Creek, where locals can have plaques installed to commemorate their families. From 2002, Arthur made all the wooden frames for the concrete into which the plagues were placed; helped to dig the holes, mix the concrete and plant the trees; and then assisted at the annual ceremonies. Arthur continued to do this well into his nineties, also served as president of the Society and was awarded a Life Membership in recognition of his wonderful service. He is remembered as a man of honour and integrity, with a witty and cheeky sense of humour.
