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

Local Legend – World War II veteran turns 100

Woodend World War Two veteran Joy Daymon will be celebrating her 100th birthday this month.

A Western Australian by origin, Joy remembers being 17 years of age, sitting with her family at Sunday lunch, and hearing over the radio that women were being allowed to enlist in the Air Force; she also remembers her father pointing at all three young women at the table, saying "None of you will be going!"

Joy was "the determined type" though, she says, barely waiting until she was 18 to enlist in the Women's Auxiliary Australian Air Force (WAAAF). Her first posting was across the country in Ascot Vale, Victoria, to undertake the challenging and intense training to become an aircraft mechanic. After successfully completing her training, Joy had various postings in Western Australia and Victoria, and by the end of the war, Joy was back in Victoria, at Bairnsdale Airfield. She put in her discharge papers, but was told she'd received another posting, back in her home state, WA, in Subiaco, as a flight mechanic. She was eventually discharged in 1946, at the age of 22.

loy speaks highly of her time in the Air Force, and of the people that she worked with in what was largely back then a maledominated environment. She liked the regularity of that life, having a routine, and the discipline. The food? "Eh, not too bad!" she chuckles.

Joy met her husband in the air force, however the young couple weren't in a rush to marry; only making it official a few years later, when lov was 26. "I didn't want to marry young!" she says. The couple's daughter was born four years after that. The young family first lived in a war service home in suburban Perth, but after a few years, loy suggested a move to Melbourne to be closer to her husband's family after so long on loy's home ground. They moved to inner northern Melbourne, bought a milk bar, and after that, a haberdashery, which she kept for a few years and closed after a mishap where a car came through her shop's front window. An offer to work for another haberdashery nearby came, and that's where she spent the rest of her time in the workforce. She says she enjoyed

and their many stories. She and her husband retired to Ocean Grove, but when her husband passed away in 1995, Joy moved to Woodend, to be near her daughter and family, who were living here. She loves having her own home base on its small acreage and being near family.

Any downsides to living here? "It's too darn

cold!" she says emphatically, with a laugh.

Joy participated more in the community in the early days, but still seems to have enviable energy levels for her years. She still goes out for a meal every week at a nearby services club; when I spoke to her on the phone, she was out with a friend for lunch and shopping. Joy has vivid memories from her world travels, including eight trips to









China. Two years ago, she went to Vietnam; and last year, Fiji. When we spoke, she was very much looking forward to her upcoming birthday trip with close friends, who will all go to the same resort in Fiji for a big celebration.

When asked if she had any advice for younger generations on how to live well, she told the story of how, a few years ago, a certain minister by the name of Reverend Mel called loy up in front of the congregation and asked her a similar question. Her answer, as she tells it? "Live a clean, happy life, and eat a little of everything you desire.

Honouring bereaved mothers with gentle presence and care



International Bereaved Mother's Day – held the Sunday before Mother's Day – honours mothers who carry their children in their hearts rather than their arms. It offers space to acknowledge the deep love and quiet grief of those who have lost a child, no matter their age, or those who are unable to become mothers.

If someone dear to you is walking this path, here are a few simple, heartfelt ways to offer care:

Acknowledge with kindness

"I'm holding you in my heart today." Simply being seen and remembered matters.

Offer a gentle token

A candle, a bloom, or a handwritten note can quietly say, "I see you.

Let the gesture be one of quiet comfort.

Share a memory

If you knew their child, sharing a cherished memory can bring comfort: "I was thinking of [child's name] today."

Create space to speak

A gentle invitation like, "Would you like to talk about them?" allows them to share if and when they feel ready. Your presence and willingness to listen are often enough.

Honour their silence

Grief sometimes asks for stillness. A message such as, "No need to respond – I just wanted you to know I'm thinking of you," respects the quiet while still offering your love.

These small, thoughtful gestures can help a grieving mother feel seen, supported, and lovingly held.

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Special 10 Year anniversary – The Ranges Cultural Centre.

The Woodend Community and Cultural Centre is celebrating its 10th anniversary with a rebrand as it continues to work towards securing funding to build the Stage 1 component. The project's new name is The Ranges Cultural Centre, and the group says it is "shovel ready", with plans and permits that are complete and endorsed.

This is an exciting new vision to transform the existing library and hall into a well designed, multipurpose public space that contributes significantly to the Shire's tourism activity, nurtures local arts and culture community and economy, and could function as one of the region's main drawcard destinations.

Once completed, the precinct will be attractive for tourists and locals alike, with a new visitor information centre, a contemporary information and learning centre, a multipurpose auditorium and performance space, weather protection and landscaping for farmers and craft markets, and new spaces for meetings, exhibitions, special events and community gatherings. The architectural design features transparent space with references to Woodend's 'timber town' history and encompasses the latest technology and sustainable design, providing opportunities to recognise First Nation and early settler history.

Breathing new life into the railway bridge rose garden

Woodend residents will have noticed a lot of activity at the rose garden on the south side of the railway bridge on High Street Woodend over this past year. The garden - which the Rotary Club of Woodend was instrumental in setting up, to enhance and beautify the entrance to Woodend from the south – has not had any serious maintenance for a while. The fence needed repair and repainting, the roses needed a pruning and the garden bed a good weeding.

Work began in autumn last year with weeding and then a generous amount of compost was added, covered by a layer of mulch, then pruning in late winter. At this stage, we started the restoration program on the fence, which took some time as it was quite weathered. In the spring we realised that we had an onion weed problem, which took many hours to eradicate. Work continued on the fence during the summer and into this autumn.

Work was carried out under the leadership of Rotarian Ed Brown, Lead in our Environmental activities. The Rotary Club would like to acknowledge Ed for his work on this community project. He has pruned and fed the roses, painted the fence, purchased materials and organised working bees, which were attended by a small group of enthusiastic Rotary members.

There has been very positive feedback from the community.

The garden will need ongoing maintenance which it will receive; the fence is ageing and will need ongoing work to keep it looking its best for many years to come. This project was made possible by the income generated by The New Woodend Star.

Rotarians tackle plastic waste in Bali

Woodend Rotary Club is partnering with the Rotary Club of Bali Seminyak and the Rotary Club of Perth to deliver the Plastic Free Bali project. This project was made possible in part by a global grant from the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International.

The project is implementing a bold vision to reduce plastic waste in the environment in West Bali through education and training of households and businesses. A team of education leaders is now visiting every household and business in the villages of Pemuteran, Sumberkima, Sumberklampok and Pejarakan to teach them how to manage their waste. The focus is on reducing, reusing and recycling plastics. They are also working with the villages to improve local waste management facilities and introduce income streams from recycling and compost.

Woodend Rotarians recently travelled to Bali to review progress on the Plastic Free Bali project. The group visited local trash facilities and met with locals to discuss waste issues while they were there.

Startup Central Victoria's FREE pre-accelerator program provides an opportunity for participants to test out an idea at minimal cost with the support of experienced professionals and mentors.

Over the past four years, 83 startups from across the Loddon Campaspe region have participated in the program. This includes 16 teams from the Macedon Ranges that collectively received pro-bono training valued at over \$100,000.

"Through the program we verified that we have an idea that will bring value to people," said Amy Cockroft from the CULTIVATE team also based in the Macedon Ranges.



A repeated message – it seems - from your local officer

I'm a little disappointed that I feel I need to write this article, I understand that the Woodend community wants to know what is going on in their town, and I try and write exactly that. However, I feel I'm writing the same thing over and over again. I'm regularly told by members of the community that they look forward to my articles, for the humour, honesty and information.

However, it doesn't feel like the message is being heard or understood. I write this article during the school holidays, and it won't hit The New Woodend Star until some weeks later. I've seen the community posts warning of what is happening, and I hope that the community is listening to these people. There were numerous cars broken into at night during the holidays and while I'm sure many of these victims feel violated, distressed and concerned that somebody has been creeping around their house/yard or driveway at night – ALL except one of these thefts and the theft of motor car could have been prevented if people just locked their cars. The only exception to this rule was a vehicle parked overnight at the railway station - this was the only vehicle where force/damage was used.

Much like many of you, I live in a rural area, in a much smaller community with a lower crime rate, outside the main town on some land. But even I still take precautions: I have two very large dogs that you would not even contemplate engaging with; I have security lights around the house, shed and cars – and yet no member of my family ever leaves their cars unlocked or anything of value in their cars. But even if you live in a quiet community, it doesn't stop people from elsewhere coming into town and causing havoc. PLEASE don't leave keys to your vehicles, outside in obvious places - under rocks, in letter boxes, on top of the front tyre of your vehicle. These things can be avoided, and it really is a case of lock things up or be prepared for higher insurance premiums and the possibility of the inconvenience of loss of something important.

I implore you, please give me something else to write about.

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ACRATH shines light on modern slavery at Victorian **Parliament**

ACRATH (Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans) was honoured to host the Speaker's Breakfast at the Victorian Parliament earlier this year, following an invitation from the Speaker of the House, Maree Edwards. This event provided a platform for ACRATH to present their ongoing efforts in combating forced marriage, human trafficking, and modern slavery.

During the breakfast, ACRATH shared a monthly memo with all Victorian parliamentarians, accompanied by images depicting various areas of their work, including forced marriage, migrant workers, the Easter campaign, and other calendar highlights. The event highlighted the importance of collaboration with MPs and their staff, emphasizing the need for continued efforts to address these critical issues.

Many MPs present at the event expressed their concerns about the growing issue of human trafficking and modern slavery. Shadow Minister Chris Crewther, who led Parliament's Modern Slavery Inquiry and contributed to the creation of Australia's Modern Slavery Act, was among the attendees. ACRATH aims to maintain close contact with electorate offices and leverage the coverage gained from the Speaker's Breakfast to further their mission.

ACRATH volunteers, though a small group, are dedicated to shedding light on the exploitation of vulnerable individuals. Their close links with the Australian Federal Police enable them to take strong and effective action in cases highlighted by parliamentarians.

March 2025 Council Meeting wrap

Some of the key items considered and endorsed at the March 2025 Council **Meeting included:**

Kyneton Urban Design Framework

Following earlier noting at the February 2025 Council Meeting of further consultation undertaken, Council adopted the Kyneton Urban Design Framework 2025 inclusive of the following changes:

Remove proposed kerb outstands at the: south-east corner of Market Street/Mollison Street, and west corners of Yaldwyn Street West/Mollison Street.

Undertake community consultation for the final detailed design of the Mollison Street/Piper Street intersection, to ensure appropriate traffic movements.

Design kerb outstands in Piper Street to ensure the heritage appearance of the street is maintained

Implement a kerb outstand trial on a Mollison Street intersection.

Modify the recommended speed limit to a minimum of 40km per hour.

The Kyneton UDF is a strategic plan for public realm improvements in Kyneton's commercial area, including Piper Street,

Mollison Street, and High Street. It aims to enhance the appearance, amenity, and functionality of the town centre through various projects, such as pedestrian safety improvements, upgrades to public spaces, and building design guidelines.

As outlined in the report, projects outlined in the UDF will likely require a mix of both Council funding and external grant funding. The community and other stakeholders will continue to be involved through engagement on the detailed design of key elements as they are implemented.

2025 Events and Festivals Grant Program and 2026 Anzac Day **Commemorative Services Support Fund**

Council adopted guidelines for both the 2025 Events and Festivals Grant Program, and the 2026 Anzac Day Commemorative Services Support Fund.

There are no changes from last year's endorsed guidelines for the upcoming round of the Events and Festivals Grant Program, which sees \$75,000 offered - as well as inkind support – across three different tiers, to support local events and festivals of various

The newly established Anzac Day Commemorative Services Support Fund will provide dedicated funding support from 2026 for those leading Anzac Day commemorations, allowing them to apply for up to \$5,000 to cover costs of accredited traffic management services or traffic management controls.

Council has a proud history of supporting

Anzac Day services yearly as required to ensure safe event delivery, however this Fund will ensure greater transparency and acknowledges the extra costs resulting from a Victorian Government department change in 2022. This change requires all traffic management plans to now be designed and conducted by qualified personnel (as opposed to volunteers or local emergency

Applications for both grants will closely align with the 2025 Community Funding Scheme, opening at 9am on 28 April 2025 and closing at 11pm on 25 May 2025 (four-week application period).

Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve

Council noted the final Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve Master Plan, which features a 10-year action plan to be implemented by the volunteer Committee of Management responsible for the Crown Land reserve. This follows an extensive community consultation process, during which a total of 19 submissions were

Replacing the previous 2012 Master Plan, this updated plan aims to better reflect the current needs of the community and user groups, and inform future development and upgrades of facilities such as playing surface improvements, accessways, changerooms, lighting and more.

You may recall that following a Notice of Motion at the December 2024 Scheduled Council Meeting (SCM), Council wrote to the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) regarding the safety concerns and plans for works at the intersection of High Street and Urguhart Street in Woodend (also known as the Coles intersection). Councillors and senior executive met with the Director of Loddon Mallee Hume and his team from DTP. Several road projects. including this intersection, were discussed. This was positive and various options were presented. Councillors highlighted the importance of future community consultation and engagement, and Council will keep the community informed when further information is made available by the department regarding this intersection.

There is a "Have Your Say" page on Council's website and one current item open for feedback is the review of the Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) which is required under legislation every four years. This is in relation to dogs and cats only, and areas it will cover include "responsible pet ownership, effective control of dogs in public areas, dog on and off leash areas, nuisance dogs and cats, barking, cat confinement and collection and disposal of animal

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Get grant-ready to support your next community initiative or event

Several of Council's grant programs are opening soon for 2025-26, with budding applicants invited to attend upcoming information sessions to give themselves the best chance in applying for funding.

The \$160,000 Community Funding Scheme is open to not-for-profit community groups and is allocated under three streams, including community, cultural and environmental projects (up to \$10,000); organisational support (up to \$5,000); and small community infrastructure (up to \$12,000).

The \$75,000 Events and Festivals Grant Program offers funding and in-kind support to organisers across three different tiers, to support local events and festivals of various sizes.

The newly established Anzac Day Commemorative Services Support Fund will provide dedicated funding support from 2026 for those leading Anzac Day commemorations, allowing them to apply for up to \$5,000 to cover costs of accredited traffic management services or controls.

Mayor Dom Bonanno encouraged community groups that have an idea for a project or event but just need some additional funding to bring it to fruition, to submit their application for consideration. "Of all the many services that Council delivers, we know that some of the most valuable initiatives are community-driven, whether through volunteer organisations giving up their time to support the broader community, or events that provide tourism and economic benefits to the Macedon Ranges," he said.

"I strongly encourage those with a grassroots idea, which may just need a funding leg up to become a reality, to find out more information, come to an information session, and put in their application if they feel they have a strong case based on the respective grant guidelines."

Applications for the three grant streams mentioned opened on 28 April 2025, and close at 11pm on 25 May 2025 (Events and Festivals + Anzac Day) and 11pm on 26 May 2025 (Community Funding Schame)

Other recurring Council-led grant programs to support the community include Small Project Grants, Australia Day Grants, Community Climate Action Grants and Environment Group Support Grants.



Happy howls and no barks for Kyneton's upgraded dog park

Dog owners in Kyneton and surrounds have a new facility to look forward to, with the Hurry Reserve (Kyneton Velodrome) designated dog off-leash area set for a much-needed upgrade.

Council welcomed a recent announcement from Victoria's Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos that a grant application of just over \$99,000 was among 26 successful applications state-wide, through a \$4.9 million second round of the New and Upgraded Dog

The Hurry Reserve upgrade will create a safer, more accessible and more enjoyable space for both dogs and their owners. It will be redesigned with designated areas for both active and guiet dogs through upgraded fencing and paths, alongside new shelters, seating, signage and more.

Mayor Dom Bonanno said Council would keep the community informed about planned improvements and designs, ensuring the area better suits local needs.

"We know how much our residents love their dogs, and this new park will give them a fantastic space to exercise, socialise, and have

"This upgrade means that every dog and pup, whether they love to run or prefer a relaxed environment, will have a space that suits them. "We thank the Victorian Government for helping us to make this upgrade a reality."

The proposed upgrade aligns with community feedback on a desire for dog park improvements, and Council's commitment to responsible pet ownership under its Domestic Animal Management Plan; a legislated four-year plan currently open for feedback to inform the specifics of its next iteration.

On the timing of the upgrades, our local furry friends are asked to please sit and stay for now - more information and firmer timelines will be provided as planning progresses, with completion targeted by June 2026.

Fire Danger Period set to end, vigilance still urged

The Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges concluded on Tuesday 22 April 2025 at lam, following notification by the Country Fire Authority.

From this time, residents on land over 2,000 square metres can burn off, provided they comply with Council's local laws and register their burn-off with Fire Permits Victoria (online via firepermits.vic.gov.au). By planning burn-offs (more than two hours in advance), an online registration will be the fastest and simplest option and allows 000 call-takers to prioritise emergency calls.

Those wishing to start their burn-off immediately (within two hours) can register by calling 1800 668 511 - however emergency calls will always be attended to first, and registering online is preferred.

Council's Director Community, Maria Weiss, urged residents to remain cautious and responsible when undertaking burn-offs, taking into consideration the weather conditions and ensuring that all necessary permits are obtained prior to ignition.

"Although the Fire Danger Period has officially concluded, the risk of fire hasn't disappeared - dry conditions and high winds outdoors, and the increase in fireplace/heater use indoors, can still lead to dangerous situations," she said.

"It is important to take the time to check your smoke alarm, maintain your property and remove excess vegetation. It not only protects your home and family but helps to safeguard the broader community as we head into the cooler months and prepare for the next fire

Residents are reminded that under Council's Community Local Law 2023:

- if your property is 2,000 square metres or less, burning in the open air is prohibited
- if your property is more than 2,000 square metres and equal to or less than 4,000 square metres, a permit is required for burning
- "If in doubt about whether a permit is needed, please check with Council first," said Ms Weiss. When burning off, residents are also
- to ensure weather conditions are safe and that burn piles do not exceed the size allowed for their land, as set out in local laws
- to check for overhanging branches that could catch fire, and ensure there is adequate fire suppression or extinguishing equipment on hand
- to check for wildlife that may be nesting in burn piles
- to ensure smoke does not cause a hazard to road users or a nuisance to neighbours.

To safely dispose of green waste, residents are also encouraged to utilise their green-lidded FOGO bin, or to drop off larger loads at their nearest resource recovery centre for a fee, taking advantage of green waste vouchers embedded in the last two editions of the maildelivered Shire Life magazine.

Vapes and e-cigarettes are an increasing litter problem in the Macedon Ranges, often discarded in parks, streets and waterways. As they break down, their batteries can leach harmful substances like lead and cobalt into soil and water, posing a serious environmental

Despite strict import and sales regulations, vapes remain common and many people are unsure how to dispose of them safely. When thrown in household bins, their lithium-ion batteries can explode and cause fires – endangering waste workers and the community.

The understory story

A brave band of 30 volunteers added nearly 500 new, low-growing plants to our "Black-Gum Biolink site near the Heritage Walk on 7 April.



This area was planned by the council, who provided the initial weed control and the wood-chip mulch. Woodend Landcare then took over the task of ordering the plants and hardware and of course organising the planting days.

Watering was a priority as the long, dry period had robbed the soil of any moisture. Thankfully, we had a volunteer who was able to provide water from his tanker-trailer and the council assisted by arranging a second tanker.

This planting included some more open areas than our usual creek-side plantings, so we were able to plant nearly 30 different indigenous flowering species to enhance the biodiversity.

Our new power-auger proved invaluable in digging the holes and we are very thankful to Woodend Community Bags for their donation, which paid for it. Without the auger and a second one owned by one of our volunteers, the planting would not have

Now we just have to hope for an "autumn break", with some decent rain to help the new plants settle in.

If you missed this planting day, the same areas will be planted with nearly 800 grasses on Sunday 25 May, so we will need all hands on deck again then. Please consider coming along to help at 9am and make your mark on the Woodend landscape. Morning tea will be provided.

Onsite Wastewater Management Plan

Council is developing a new Onsite Wastewater Management Plan (OWMP) and is inviting the community to provide feedback during the early stages of development.

The OWMP is essential for managing wastewater from properties not connected to the sewer system. It ensures wastewater is treated and disposed of safely to protect public health and the environment.

Given that parts of our municipality are in a Special Water Supply Catchment, effective wastewater management is crucial to safeguarding drinking water quality.

The plan consists of two key documents:

- The Operational Plan Outlines regulatory controls and includes an action plan detailing Council's priorities for the coming years.
- The Technical Document Provides a risk assessment framework, locality reports, and guidelines for effluent disposal.

Community input will help shape the plan to ensure it meets local needs, while complying with environmental and public health regulations.

Wildlife seizure at Kyneton

Search warrants were executed at a business premises in Kyneton last month, and a large number of animals located, as part of an ongoing investigation into the alleged unlawful possession of native and exotic wildlife. All wildlife is protected in Victoria under the Wildlife Act 1975, and it is illegal to possess, take or destroy wildlife without authorisation.

Exotic pest animals aren't pets and pose a serious biosecurity risk to Victoria. The illegal trade, sale and distribution of these exotic species risks normalising these animals as pets in Victoria, which in turn risks their escape or release into the landscape and becoming pest

Members of the public who know of any offences being committed against Victoria's wildlife can make an anonymous report to Crimestoppers via 1800 333 000.

Manager Regulatory Operations Loddon Mallee, Suriya Vine says,

"Our laws and permit systems exist to prevent the exploitation of native and exotic animals as well as protecting their welfare.

"If you are aware of suspicious behaviour around wildlife, we encourage you to report it to Crime Stoppers Victoria. Even a small amount of information from the public can help fight wildlife crime."

Changemakers Macedon Ranges wrap-up!

In partnership with Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group, Council successfully delivered the inaugural Changemakers Macedon Ranges Festival from 15-23 March 2025.

About 250 residents attended over 30 sustainability events which were designed to encourage locals to "try the change". Whether it was through hands-on activities like bike repair workshops, zero waste cooking classes, sewing and mending, traditional weaving and nature journalling classes, or information sessions on home electrification and sustainable house tours, the Changemakers Festival was all about the everyday ways we can include sustainability in our lives.

Community-led initiatives included the Kyneton Transition Hub's Open Edible Gardens and the Riddells Creek Cool Changes 'Enviro Energy Expo', which drew over 400 attendees. As well as 'Nature Storytime' sessions at all four local Goldfields Libraries, which provided the opportunity for young ones to get involved, engaging around 165 children and parents.

The festival enacted multiple actions included in the Macedon Ranges Climate Emergency Plan and delivered meaningful results through partnership and collaboration. Plans are already in motion for an even bigger festival next year.

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Save \$780 per year on your household hot water

Last month we presented a graph showing potential savings of about \$5,000 per year with an electrified home and electric vehicle, powered by solar (see page 23 of the April issue). This month's good news story is about the savings to be made with heat pump hot water.

Water heating is one of the biggest household energy loads, using nearly a quarter of a home's energy use.

Rewiring Australia's analysis indicates that Victorian homes with "instant" hot water fuelled by bottled gas (LPG) could save about \$850 per year by switching to electric heat pump hot water (\$19,600 - \$6,900 total saving over 15 years). And that's without investing in

We've heard from locals that not all heat pump hot water systems work well in Macedon Ranges winters. We've also heard that great units exist that will reliably provide the hot water that will make your morning shower a pleasure - even when it's frosty out. You will probably pay about \$6,000 for one of those, as opposed to \$3,500 for one that works in a milder climate (like Melbourne's).

Being the nerds we are, the Electrify 3442 team recrunched the numbers and we reckon the potential savings are still pretty good: \$680 per year over a system lifetime of 15 years. For those with solar, the savings are a bit better: \$840 per year over the system lifetime.

Victorian Energy Upgrades and Solar Victoria rebates for changing from gas to heat pump in 3442 could reduce your cost by about \$1,500 - boosting the annualised saving by \$100.

And now, perhaps the best news: Having a tank full of hot water, ready to go, beats the pants off getting up to discover everything's frozen up again and there is no "instant" hot water to be had!

If your existing hot water service is more than 10 years old or you're dreading that winter day when you get up to discover everything's frozen up again and there's no "instant" hot water to be had, consider a heat pump. An oversized "thermos" of hot showers awaits!

Peace of mind for families with free RSV protection

Babies will be safer from the respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) this winter, with a long-acting immunisation now available free for eligible families until 30 September.

The immunisation will be free for all newborns, so long as their mother wasn't vaccinated during pregnancy.

Free RSV immunisation

RSV is a highly infectious virus that infects up to 90 per cent of children within the first two years of life. The free program will protect around 40,000 babies born in Victoria this RSV season.

As part of the program, the long-acting monoclonal antibody, nirsevimab, is administered in hospital as part of standard post-birth care - helping parents avoid visits to the GP.

Eligible infants aged up to two years who are vulnerable to severe RSV disease will be protected too, through a catch-up program.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said of the program, "While pregnant women can now access an RSV vaccine, protection is administered to newborns and vulnerable infants at no cost, so no one misses out, and Victorian families can have peace of mind heading into winter.'

The state-based program complements the Commonwealth maternal vaccine, Abrysvo, which commenced in February as part of the coordinated national effort to protect as many babies as

Mothers are encouraged to get vaccinated during their pregnancy to help build immunity in their baby as early as possible. For those unable to be immunised with Abrysvo, or mums immunised less than two weeks before delivery, long-acting nirsevimab will now be available for babies.

In Australia, RSV is the most common cause of hospitalisation in infants because it can often progress to pneumonia or bronchiolitis in very young children.

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
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Supporting our students with four-legged friends

There's about to be more four-legged friends at schools across Victoria as part of a program to give students added wellbeing and mental health support.

Kyneton High School is one of 101 schools across Victoria that will receive a grant as part of the Animal-assisted Wellbeing and Engagement Program.

The school will receive \$3,536. Funding is typically for school support animal and/or equipment and professional development in animal-assisted programs.

The initiative aims to help students build confidence and social connections, enhance empathy and strengthen emotional

Existing animal-assisted wellbeing and engagement programs in schools are already helping students to engage in learning more effectively, leading to improved attendance.

At some schools, students are improving literacy skills by reading books to dogs, others are building confidence and trust by working

Some schools have a support animal trained to work at their school under the care of a certified handler, while other schools work with certified external providers to tailor weekly wellbeing and engagement activities for students.

The three years program is intended to help students benefit from animal-assisted wellbeing and engagement programs at their school and prioritising services for students with disability and additional

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas MP congratulated successful schools, and said "Support animals have a huge impact on the wellbeing and engagement of students, helping them to participate, learn and succeed at school. Having more furry friends in the classroom is always a good thing."

Round two grant applications will open to schools in Term 2.

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


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Hawks make a flying start to the season!

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
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
Vale Sylvia Boxshall



Sylvia Boxshall was a dedicated and valued member and volunteer of the Woodend District Heritage Society. A woman of quiet charm and kindness, she had an insatiable curiosity about those who had gone before and how they dealt with the vagaries of fate they encountered. Sylvia was a longtime volunteer at the Woodend District Heritage Society in the old Courthouse in Forest Street, spending every Wednesday doing research there.

From that research, she wrote her wonderful book They Went To War, about all the men and woman connected to Woodend who served their country in World War I. Not only did she give details of their early life and military service but followed their lives if they returned. This book was presented to the mayor of Fromelles and the secretary of the town's WWI museum in the town, where it now forms part of their war history collection. Fromelles was the site of the first battle involving Australians on the Western Front, resulting in over 5000 casualties.

Sylvia followed up with her book Name, Rank and Number about those who served in World War II. Each book included many photos and a synopsis of the war itself. This book was followed by Our Men At War,

detailing the eleven men who joined and returned from fighting in South Africa. Not content with that, Sylvia wrote Beyond the Black Forest, a history of Woodend from the early days.

She then wrote a fiction book, Kate, loosely based on the life of her Gran, a 'Lancashire lass'. Sylvia was also a seamstress, clothes designer, artist and keen gardner, running a nursery in Tylden for some years. But her greatest love was for her family and her four children and five grandchildren who will miss her loving guidance and lovely smile as will we, her friends.
