Ziggy and Miles Johnston

Get ready for an unforgettable afternoon of world-class music right here in Woodend! Internationally acclaimed Australian guitarists Ziggy and Miles Johnston are returning home to Australia and will perform a special concert that promises virtuosic playing, warmth, and captivating artistry.

Now based in New York, the Johnston brothers have been hailed for their "deeply considered musicianship, immaculate care and superlative technique" (5MBS). Winners of the 2023 Young Concert Artists International Auditions, they are rapidly earning a reputation as two of Australia's finest young musicians on the global stage.

Their Woodend concert draws inspiration from their time in New York City, showcasing the guitar duo's signature strengths - intuitive interplay, seamless unity, and the remarkable ability to conjure the depth and colour of a full orchestra.

At the heart of the program is Sidekick, a playful and powerful new work by Australian composer Katie Jenkins, written especially for the brothers. Jenkins captures their spirited dynamic perfectly, describing the piece as one that "makes fun of each other but needs each other they compete with one another but are stronger together."

Audiences will also be treated to Ziggy and Miles' exquisite arrangement of Claude Debussy's Suite bergamasque, which finds new life on the guitar, highlighting its intimacy and shimmering tonal palette. The concert opens with Astor Piazzolla's fiery Tango no.1: Deciso and closes with Radamés Gnattali's Suite Retratos – two masterpieces of Latin American guitar music that celebrate passion, rhythm, and freedom of expression.



Local hero chasing AFL dream

Congratulations are in order for Cooper Duff-Tytler, the Woodend Hesket Football Netball Club and Woodend Junior Football Netball Club player who has taken the football world by storm. From kicking the footy around at the local oval to playing on the MCG on Grand Final day, Cooper's journey is one that inspires every young athlete in

For Cooper, it all started right here in Woodend.

"My footy memories as a young kid in Woodend are pretty basic," Cooper reflects. "I just remember looking forward to Sunday all week to the time I got to play footy with my mates. Some great friends like Willem Hanegraaf always made junior footy fun and why I loved it so

Like many kids in country Victoria, Cooper's early years were spent juggling multiple sports, showing natural talent across the board. Under the guidance of his junior coaches at Woodend - his Dad Jason and Tony Hanegraaf - Cooper developed not just his skills, but the character and work ethic that would define his pathway to the top.

"Some junior coaches were my Dad and Tony Hanegraaf and they both made sure I focused on getting my teammates involved, which is still important to me today," Cooper says.

That team-first mentality has become a cornerstone of his game.

Cooper's rise through the football ranks has been nothing short of remarkable. After representing Australia in basketball at junior level and excelling on the footy field, he faced a decision that would shape

In 2024, when selected for the prestigious AFL Academy – a group of just 30 of the nation's best young players - Cooper made the tough call to focus solely on football. As he explained in a previous interview, "I think my love for the game, and ultimately I chose what I thought would give me the best opportunities and most successful in. Ultimately it came down to what I wanted to do every day in my

The decision wasn't about abandoning basketball, but about excellence. "I could have continued playing both. For me I didn't want to keep kicking along doing both and separating my time and trying to keep up with the others," Cooper said. "I wanted to put all my time into one sport and try to excel and get the best out of myself."

While football ultimately won his heart, Cooper's basketball career was far from ordinary. Representing Australia at junior level gave him a unique skill set that translates beautifully to the football field.

"I think spatial awareness and my ball control are strengths in my game that basketball has helped with," Cooper explains. Those skills, honed on the basketball court, have become defining features of his football

Cooper's 2024 season was a whirlwind of achievements. He made his debut for the Calder Cannons in round 12, earning best-on-ground honours in four of his six appearances. He also played in the AFL Futures Game on the MCG on Grand Final day – a stage most young players only dream of.

When asked about the moment he believed he could make it to the AFL, Cooper points to a specific game: "My first game for Vic Metro in U16 was probably the first time I thought I have a real shot at the AFL, although it had always been a dream."

But perhaps the most meaningful moment came closer to home. Cooper made his senior debut for Woodend Hesket in 2024, pulling on the same jumper he'd watched his heroes wear growing up. Playing alongside his brother Tobi made the occasion even more special. "It was exciting to play down at Woodend and make the senior debut for the local club," he said at the time.

When asked what the Woodend Hawks mean to him, Cooper's response is heartfelt: "The Woodend Hawks mean a lot to me. It's where I started my footy journey and the ongoing support from the club is pretty special."

In September 2025, Cooper kicked three goals in his VFL debut for Essendon, further cementing his credentials as a genuine AFL

As the 2025 AFL Draft approaches in November, Cooper remains focused and motivated. "If you put your head down and do the work you can get the results at the end," he said, "ultimately what I'm aiming for come November."

But Cooper's ambitions extend far beyond draft night. "I think it would be a pretty unreal experience to win a premiership in the AFL, but individually I want to carve out a long career and become a reliable teammate that people enjoy running out with each week."

For the young kids running around at Woodend Hesket, watching Cooper's journey with wide eyes and big dreams, his message is clear:

"My advice for young kids wanting to play AFL would be to find what you are good at and make sure to focus on that and try and use those strengths each week to help your team, but also just make sure to enjoy the journey."

Cooper Duff-Tytler's story is still being written, but one thing is certain - he's proof that with dedication, sacrifice, and the support of a strong community, dreams that start on country ovals can lead all the way to

The Woodend Hesket Football Netball Club and Woodend Junior Football Netball Clubs couldn't be prouder of him.

The Woodend community invites everyone to come together and celebrate this historic moment. On Wednesday 19 November, the Woodend clubroom will open from 6pm to watch the AFL Draft live. Everyone is welcome to join us as we cheer for Cooper when his name is called – a moment that represents years of community support, from junior footy Sundays to this incredible milestone. And a testament to what happens when talent meets dedication and a community that encourages kids to dream big.

Come down, be part of the celebration, and show Cooper the support of the community that helped shape him into the young man he is

Woodend Landcare – Hardy native 'Strappy' alternatives for **Woodend gardens**

When buying new garden plants this spring, we'd like to share some excellent native plant alternatives to replace common strapleaved garden plants, which can spread into the native bush and become weeds.



Our selections are specifically chosen to thrive in Woodend's cold climate and clay soil, ensuring beautiful, low-maintenance gardens that support our local wildlife.

Let's focus on two notorious weeds - stinking iris and agapanthus and explore hardy native substitutes.

The baddies...

Stinking Iris (Iris foetidissima) may have typical iris-like flowers and scarlet berries, but don't be fooled. The leaves smell offensive when crushed and cause skin dermatitis, while the toxic red berries can look enticing to children. Birds spread the berries, and as such the plant becomes an invasive weed.

Agapanthus can be invasive and very difficult to remove. Its fleshy leaves can be a skin irritant and it is difficult to remove once established. Although new sterile cultivars now exist, the oldfashioned varieties of agapanthus shed seed that is spread through the landscape by wind and water.

The goodies...

Instead, consider planting the robust native spiny-head mat-rush (Lomandra longfolia) and tussock grass (Poa labillardieri). These clumping strappies tolerate frost and clay soils, providing year-round greenery and habitat for small birds, frogs and insects.

Another excellent option is the bulbine lily (Bulbine bulbosa), which dies back over our cold winters. When planted en masse, it flourishes in spring with charming yellow floral displays.

Native flax-lilies, Tasman flax-lily (Dianella tasmanica) and blackanther flax-lily (Dianella reflexa) are other options. These hardy native strappies boast pretty contrasting blue and yellow flowers, followed

by purple berries. They're perfect for mass plantings or as a border plant, with Tasman flax-lily preferring wetter sites than black-anther

For a list of native plants to grow in your home garden refer to the Recommended Plant List on the Woodend Landcare blog (woodendlandcare.org).

Remember, every garden can make a difference. By choosing these native alternatives, you'll create a garden that not only looks beautiful but also provides food and habitat for insects and local



Black gum conservation event

Over the past 12 months, the Threatened Species Conservancy have been developing a strategic framework for prioritising the conservation effort of Black Gum (Eucalyptus aggregata) across private property around Woodend. To support landholders like you in conserving this important habitat, we're hosting a free community information session and panel Q&A event at the Woodend Community Centre on Saturday 15 November, 1pm to 4pm.

This event is a great opportunity to:

- learn more about the black gum's conservation needs and local recovery efforts;
- hear directly from local experts and partner organisations working to protect threatened species and habitats;
- find out what practical support and incentives are available to property owners who wish to conserve and manage native vegetation on their land; and
- learn how best to control gorse on your property with a practical demonstration of Gorse control best practice, facilitated by the Victorian Gorse Taskforce.

Free green waste week in the Ranges

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is encouraging residents to get their properties ready for summer with a free green waste disposal week ending on Sunday 2 November 2025.

Residents can drop off green waste at resource recovery facilities in Kyneton, Romsey or Woodend. Only residential loads are accepted, and residents can visit as many times as needed. Free self-loaded mulch is also available to help with garden maintenance.

Mayor Dom Bonanno said, "Preparing your property isn't just about keeping your garden tidy; it's a crucial part of reducing fire risk. Clearing green waste, long grass and debris from your property helps protect your home, your family and our community ahead of

"Summer in the Macedon Ranges comes with the risk of fire. Taking small steps now, like using our green waste facilities, makes a big difference in keeping everyone safe," he added.

The free green waste week program provides an easy, safe way to remove excess vegetation and reduce potential fuel loads on properties. Additionally, residents can also use Council's free green waste drop-off voucher, sent with the latest edition of ShireLife magazine, any time within the financial year.



September 2025 Council **Meeting wrap**



Some of the key items considered and endorsed at the **September 2025 Council Meeting included:**

Draft Open Space Strategy for consultation: Council endorsed the release of the draft Open Space Strategy for community consultation for four weeks, launching in early October 2025. This strategy outlines how Council plans to manage and improve parks, reserves, sporting grounds and other public spaces over the next 10 years. The strategy looks at how open spaces can support population growth, protect the environment and provide opportunities for health and wellbeing. Residents will be invited to provide feedback to ensure the strategy, and our open spaces, reflect local needs and priorities.

Kyneton Airfield hangar sites: Council approved authorising the CEO to enter into a lease with hangar owners at Kyneton Airfield (ground lease - land only). This decision will support aviation users while creating opportunities for economic development linked to the airfield. Leasing these sites will also contribute to the ongoing operation and maintenance of the facility, ensuring it remains an asset for both the aviation community and the wider region. Community engagement was undertaken in consideration of the proposal, with 56 submissions being received, and 37 respondents agreeing with the key terms outlined in the Notice of Intention to Lease. A key outcome following the consultation process, in acknowledgement of significant feedback from hangar owners relating to the proposed market rental, was to reduce this rental from \$6 down to \$5 per square metre plus GST. This income supports Council to maintain ongoing Airfield

Small Project Grant Recommendations: Council endorsed funding for two projects under the Small Project Grants Program, which provide a yearly pool of up to \$30,000 of which not-for-profit groups can apply for a maximum of \$3,000 per application. Council awarded \$1,120 to Kyneton Women's Sports Club for their Growing Safe and Accessible Sport Locally project, as well as \$2,880 to Baynton Sidonia Landcare Group for their Taungurung Cultural Heritage workshop project.

Australia Day Grant Guidelines: The Australia Day Grant Guidelines have been revised to provide a clear framework for assessing applications for Australia Day (26 January) events and acknowledgement ceremonies. The updated guidelines allow for flexibility around grant round dates, allow for alignment with the Small Project Grants and Community Funding Schemes, and incorporate the requirements of the Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy. They also clarify legal obligations for events. These revisions will help Council continue to support the community in a consistent, transparent and effective manner.

Community Directorate Integrated Annual Report: Councillors noted and approved the final report on the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, Disability Action Plan, Participate - Positive Ageing Plan, and Create - Municipal Early Years Plan on their conclusion, and noted that future actions relating to these areas and cohorts have been integrated into the draft Shaping the Ranges 2025-2035 plan. This approach is designed to strengthen outcomes and ensure they remain central to Council's long-term planning.

Council also endorsed the following:

- Scheduling of an additional meeting to be held on 8 October to consider the audited performance and financial statements as part of Council's Annual Report, commencing from 5pm and to be held online
- An updated Fraud and Corruption Control Policy which, alongside the Fraud and Corruption Control Framework, guides how fraud and corruption risks are managed through a structured approach to prevention, detection, reporting and response.
- Deferring an item surrounding Instruments of Delegation to the November 2025 Council Meeting, to provide additional time for Council officers to provide further information on outstanding gueries to Councillors for their consideration.
- Receiving the Quarterly Financial Report as at 30 June 2025 and also adopting the carrying forward of budgets for projects from the 2024-25 financial year to the 2025-26 financial year.
- Receiving the annual CEO Employment and Remuneration Committee Report, which ensures transparent governance and accountability in line with the Local Government Act 2020. This process ensures the CEO's performance and remuneration are regularly reviewed in a fair, transparent and accountable way.

Preparing your property for the fire season

Roadside slashing

Each year, Council carries out roadside slashing to help reduce the risk of fires caused by hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures, or collisions. About 1,000 kilometres of roadside are slashed annually, with a focus on main roads, bus routes, and critical evacuation

Property inspections and fire prevention notices

Council's Fire Management Officers have commenced inspecting properties across the municipality for fire hazards and may issue you with a fire prevention notice, outlining the works that are required.

If you receive a notice, don't ignore it as heavy penalties can apply to owners who fail to comply. Properties are expected to be maintained to the required standard throughout the Fire Danger

If you are planning to bale and require more time, complete the extension application found on the back of the notice.

For properties where stock grazing is being used for fuel reduction, you must be able to demonstrate that stocking levels are sufficient to effectively reduce vegetation. If not, further fuel reduction measures may be required.

Vale Jack Ramsdale

There were more people at the Kyneton Lawn Cemetery to farewell Jack Ramsdale than often attend the weekly football match. So respected was the man of many incarnations! Jack was christened as David John but was seldom

lack was involved in many activities, both for work and leisure, but it is his contribution to the Kyneton Marist Brothers Old Boys Association [Old Boys] that is addressed in this remembrance.

He had remained a bachelor and whilst set in his ways, was always willing to consider others' needs and would lend a hand. This was reinforced at his graveside service by John Scott, the celebrant for Jack's farewell. John had been a schoolmate of Jack's at the Brothers and remained close friends.

Extracts from the T J Scott website tribute page:

- With his cheeky smile and infectious laugh, he was described by many as a true legend, one of a kind - kind-hearted, always willing to help anyone, and loved by all
- He will be remembered for his love of bowling, fishing, and horse racing, but above all, for the character, warmth, and spirit he brought to every

lack had stated that he did not want a funeral service but relented to his family's wishes and agreed to a graveside service - but one strictly no longer than eight minutes. John managed to complete the recollections of Jack in the designated time, through quite drenching rain that strangely, commenced at the appointed time for the service.

To the issue! Amongst the assembly at least ten members of the Old Boys were seen reflecting on their mate. Jack was a doyen of the Association and a Past President who gave his all, no matter what he committed to do.

It is probably in his involvement with the Annual Retreat at Torrumbarry Weir Tourist Park that he is a stand-out. Once the number of acceptors was determined, Jack went shopping at his own pace and to selected suppliers. He then packed the perishables into portable freezers and the other stuff into suitable transport vessels.

At Torrumbarry, he transferred articles to storage in one of the three cabins allocated for the attendees. But quaintly, he often forgot what he had or where it was stored! When packing up for return home, something especially purchased was likely to turn up.

With declining numbers, the next retreat was somewhat uncertain, and now that lack has been added to our Honour Roll of deceased members, serious decisions will need to made.

Jack made it to seventy years, which is too young for a person who contributed to the Kyneton community. Paraphrasing Winston Churchill: "So much is owed by so many."

Again, reflecting on his tribute: "With his cheeky smile and infectious laugh, he was described by many as a true legend, one of a kind - kind-hearted, always willing to help anyone, and loved by all."

Rest in peace, mate!!

Bushfire myths

We sometimes hear people say "If I live in a town I'm safe" Unfortunately, this is not the case. Over the years, we have found that people do believe that only those who live on larger rural properties are in danger if there is a

bush fire in the area.

This is far from the truth. Every property in the Woodend and surrounding areas is in danger if there is a bushfire nearby.

Embers are not selective

There are three major ways that property can be damaged or destroyed during are bushfire: ember attack, radiant heat or direct flame contact.

Ember attack occurs when burning leaves and bark are thrown up into the air and then blown by the wind ahead of the actual fire front. In the case of a major fire these embers can travel several kilometres ahead of the fire front, falling to the ground with the potential to start new spot fires before the major fire actually arrives.

If you live in the township you have greater protection from the spread of the fire in terms of radiant heat and direct flame contact due to the natural barriers and a lower amount of surrounding fuel.

However, embers are still a significant danger. If a fire is near a township these embers are going to land anywhere.

So, if you live in the township you still need to undertake some basic protection measures.

Planning ahead: Finding the right final resting place

Many people know they would like to be buried but haven't yet thought through the details. Where might that be? Would you like to be laid to rest alone, or with another? What kind of vessel feels right, a coffin, a casket, or a shroud?

These choices help shape a burial into something personal and

Sharon Tregoning, Practice Manager and Holistic Funeral Director at Natural Grace in Woodend, says one of the most common questions she's asked is, "How much does it cost to be buried?"

"The prices are set by independent cemetery trusts," Sharon explains. "There's a wide variation – from less than \$500 in some small regional cemeteries to tens of thousands of dollars in larger metropolitan ones. When planning a burial, some things to consider

Right of Interment

This is the purchase of the right to use the grave. You don't own the land, but you do buy the right to use it in perpetuity.

This is the fee to dig the grave and for the cemetery administration.

Existing grave

If it's an existing site, check who currently holds the right of interment, as it may need to be updated if that person has already

Number of burials

Will this be a single resting place or shared with another loved one?

Choice of vessel

Some prefer a coffin or casket, while others choose a natural shroud made from linen or calico.

Natural or traditional burial

A natural burial allows the body to return gently to the earth, while a traditional burial follows the more familiar "six feet under" depth.

Location

Visit possible cemeteries and notice how each place feels, the landscape, the trees, the sense of peace.

Taking time to reflect and plan can bring clarity and comfort, a quiet gift of ease for those who love you.



This was much appreciated. When the "ring of steel" was lifted and she stopped posting, these friends asked Candice to bring back her cheery posts. So it has continued each year since, from September to May, as a weekly post called "For a Monday".

Each of the works in this exhibition comes from one of Candice's social media posts but has been transformed from a basic digital print by hand distressing the surface of the image with an artist's rubber, revealing the texture of the handmade paper underneath. This process allows these works to 'blur the line' between digital and non-digital art.


With twelve works in all, these images represent Candice's favourite exotic plants from her garden.

Election report calls for change to meet emerging challenges

A report tabled by the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) on the conduct of Victoria's 2024 local council elections has called for changes to Victoria's local government legislation.

The election was a success, with more than 4.3 million Victorians casting their vote and the lowest informality rate on record. However, the VEC has recommended broad reform to ensure it can continue to meet the expectations of all Victorians for transparent and fair elections, and safeguard against increasing integrity threats.

The report makes 10 key recommendations and 27 operational commitments, including:

- a continued focus on strengthening safeguards to detect and prevent postal vote fraud
- exploring options to publish provisional results in real time
- expanding the candidate questionnaire to include party membership, so voters have clear information about candidates' political affiliations.


'The 2024 council elections were the most complex to date and they were successfully delivered,' Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel said. 'Our focus is on the integrity of elections. When issues arose, our people and systems caught them quickly and responded rapidly.

Mr Bluemmel also highlighted the unprecedented challenges and the increasing complexity of election delivery.

'We are committed to continuous improvement in the delivery of elections,' Mr Bluemmel added, 'I look forward to providing updates in future election service plans and reports on the progress of our commitments.'



Boosting participation in regional sport

More people are being supported to get involved in sport with grants for sports clubs and community organisations to strengthen and expand opportunities for people living with a disability in regional communities.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas announced recently that applications are open for a second round of the Regional All Abilities Participation Grants and encouraged local clubs and organisations

Grants of up to \$25,000 are available in three categories: Equipment and Travel, Inclusion Workforce, and Programs and Disability-led

The grants can be used to purchase specialised or modified equipment and uniforms, such as sports wheelchairs, sensory balls, throwing frames, accessible starting systems, modified bats and racquets and other adaptive technologies enabling safe and inclusive participation. For clubs that already have the right equipment and uniforms, funding can be used to subsidise wages or salaries towards creating a skilled workforce to help boost participation - such as disability sports coaches, support workers or volunteers who are keen to broaden their skillset.

The funding can also be used to cover travel to competitions and festivals, and for clubs to create their own all-abilities sports

Ms Thomas said of the program, "Creating an inclusive environment will boost participation and open new pathways, whether it's playing, coaching or volunteering."

Organisations that support community participation in sport and active recreation such as local clubs, state sporting associations, disability or self-advocacy groups, and health or disability providers are encouraged to apply.

Increasing opportunities for more Victorians to participate in sport and active recreation is a key objective of the State Government's Active Victoria 2022-2026 – a strategic framework for sport and active recreation in Victoria.

Better roads blitz rolls out across Victoria

A major road maintenance blitz is rolling out to rebuild, repair, and resurface roads across Victoria.

Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne recently launched the Labor Government's \$976 million road maintenance blitz in Kyneton, where crews will begin fixing potholes and upgrading road surfaces across the state.

The Better Roads Blitz, crews will begin delivering hundreds of major maintenance projects between now and mid-2026 on roads – with 70 per cent of all the funding going towards our regional roads.

Projects will range from road rehabilitation and resurfacing to patching potholes and maintaining bridges, and installing traffic lights and signage, targeting the state's busiest travel and trade routes.

As well as repairing some of our busiest roads, crews will also mow, slash and spray tens of thousands of kilometres of roadsides, inspect and repair thousands of bridges and other structures.

Hundreds of sets of traffic lights and electronic signs will be repaired, graffiti cleaned up and other maintenance works delivered as needed.

"Whether it's fixing potholes, resurfacing roads or improving safety, this blitz will deliver better and smoother journeys for drivers right across regional Victoria - keeping our communities connected," said Ms Thomas.

Free pads and tampons have arrived in the Macedon **Ranges and Hepburn Shires**

Locals living in the Macedon Ranges and Hepburn Shires are set to benefit from the rollout of free pad and tampon vending machines helping remove barriers to work, education and community life.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas announced that vending machines have been installed at Central Highlands Rural Health, and Woodend, Romsey and Gisborne libraries.

Women and girls across Victoria have already saved thousands of dollars, with more than 100,000 packs of pads and tampons dispensed in the first six months of the program.

Once the rollout is complete, up to 1,500 free pad and tampon machines - both smart and battery-operated - will be available at more than 700 public locations across Victoria. Sites include regional libraries, hospitals, TAFEs, train stations and other community hubs.

Lack of access to period products is a real issue for women and girls in regional areas, where local services may be limited. It can affect health and wellbeing, school and work attendance, and social participation.

Councils across Victoria were invited to nominate sites for the machines - ensuring the rollout reflects the needs of communities right across the state.

Access to pads and tampons is a basic need, but one in five women reported struggling to afford period products.

Restoring Forests for the Future at Mount Macedon

Mount Macedon's future appears much greener, thanks to a landmark reforestation project underway, which restores native forests to former pine plantation sites and sets the stage for a more sustainable, resilient future.

This large-scale forest regeneration will help create a healthier environment for future generations.

The project received \$1.13 million funding through Victoria's BushBank programme, demonstrating the state's commitment to biodiversity and ecological restoration.

About 22,500 native tree saplings were planted during winter across the 94-hectare site on the south-east side of Mount Macedon.

Seeds from native local trees were collected from Macedon Regional Park in July 2023 to ensure the new forest originates from species with local progeny.

The seeds were carefully gathered, nurtured, and grown into healthy saplings by a local nursery, ready for planting.

Monitoring sites were established across the project area to observe the effects of browsing animals. Protective fencing was installed in March 2025. Drone-based weed mapping and spraying occurred in spring to prepare the ground for planting.

Once established, the forest will offer more green spaces for the community to enjoy. It will significantly increase habitat for native wildlife, boost soil health, and improve water quality.



Rachael Thomas

Rachael Thomas, nee McKenzie, dedicated lay member of the Methodist Church and secretary of the Rechabite Church in Newham for twenty years, was one of the large family of Alexander and Christina McKenzie of Newham. Alexander was the third son of Kenneth McKenzie and Hannah Glass. He married Christina Baldwin in 1885, and they bought forty acres on what is now Dons Road and built a four-room cottage called Craigilea. There they grew potatoes, rye and oats and had a family of ten children, one of whom, Dorothy, died young. In 1916, Alexander took on the lease of the General Store in Rochford and it was run by daughters Christina and Margaret. A son, Kenneth, became an apprentice to a local farrier, Dave Cook. Another son, Colin, became an accomplished musician and played in a band that was popular throughout the district for many years.

Rachael was born in 1905 and attended the local school. She learnt piano and drove her pony in a jinker to teach the instrument in the homes of her pupils. She developed a number of other skills, teaching sewing, knitting, crochet, reading and writing at the local primary school and playing the organ in churches. She was also secretary of the Young People's Guild in Newham where debates were held in the 1930s.

In 1937, she assisted at the Central Methodist Mission with Reverend Irving Benson and became a relief sister in Lonsdale Street, Melbourne. Two vears later she married Alfred lames Thomas, a Methodist House missionary. Alfred and his first wife had ministered in the Woodend area for many years. Rachael and Alfred lived at Colac where their son Raymond was born, and Alfred died the following year. She then moved to Melbourne to care for an elderly uncle and taught at local

Rachael returned often to the family farm to join her sisters, Margaret and Helen, and brother, Colin, who ran the farm. She lived there after the death of Margaret and then, after Colin's death, the farm passed to a nephew; Helen moved to Kyneton and Rachael had gone into care at the Trentham Bush Nursing hospital, where she died three days after turning ninety-five. The family kept the property until 2007.

Pedal Power: Year 9 students keep Sacred Heart's Great Vic tradition Alive

The Great Victorian Bike Ride (GVBR) began as a one-off event in 1984, organised by The Bicycle Institute of Victoria, to celebrate Victoria's 150th anniversary. The event was such a success that it has been running ever since (with a Covid break). Sacred Heart College, Kyneton has been part of the ride since 1998, when inspirational teacher, Di Taylor, initiated the college's participation. Di was always full of energy and enthusiasm and loved working with young people. Di challenged students to get out of their comfort zone and try new things. She was forever a smiling face, encouraging, challenging and dedicated to her profession. Di passed away in 2008 after battling cancer. Since then, Sacred Heart College has dedicated its annual ride to Di Taylor, with her family continuing to generously sponsor and support the College's team. Year 9 students are invited to take part in the event, and over the past 27 years, more than 350 students have participated. Their uniforms bear the team's name: 'Di's Crew'.

- Benefits for students participating in the Great Vic Bike Ride include:
- Learning practical bike maintenance and road cycling skills
- Developing spatial awareness and group communication
- · Improving physical fitness and overall wellbeing
- Building confidence, resilience, and a sense of achievement
- Strengthening teamwork and collaboration

In 2025, the GVBR rides approximately 364 km over five days travelling from Mortlake to Camperdown in the Western District of Victoria. The team will average 73 km of riding per day, staying overnight in the towns of Mortlake, Koroit, and Port Campbell and finishing in Camperdown. Although the ride is challenging, it is well within the reach of those willing to prepare for the event.

Training for the GVBR started in early Term 2, with after-school theory sessions leading into training rides on local roads. Training rides grow longer and more challenging as the year progresses and all participants are working to improve skills, knowledge and fitness. Each year the students, teaching staff and parent helpers have a fantastic time completing the ride. An annual GVBR Achievement Award is presented to a student who has best acted out Di's values of courage and service to others.

2025 will be staff member Craig Darroch's final year as SHC ride coordinator, having held the role since 2012. When asked to share a highlight, Craig said, "It is always fantastic to see how students support each other and staff members on the ride, the sense of camaraderie that develops each year is amazing." Students and parents, both past and present, express their gratitude to him, current staff riders Jamie Walker and Lauren White, and all the staff and volunteers involved across the years.
