



Black Forest Drive artist impressions released

Artist impressions showing key safety improvements planned for Black Forest Drive between Woodend and Macedon have been released, along with more information about the final scope of

The safety improvements will benefit all road users and include changing the lane configuration to one lane in each direction, to allow for new dedicated bike lanes.

Designs include a new painted centre median to provide space for new right-turn lanes and pedestrian refuges and road surface

The dedicated bike lanes will improve safety by separating bikes from other vehicles. The lanes will also make bike riders more visible to other road users, reducing the chance of collisions occurring.

New right-hand turn lanes for accessing side roads will be added at 13 locations in the new centre median, to provide safer turning for all road users and reduce the risk of nose-to-tail collisions.

The new centre median can also be used by all road users to safely turn into properties without needing to stop in a traffic

Pedestrian islands will be built at key locations to boost safety, especially for school children using bus stops.

The works are designed to improve safety for all road users along a 12-kilometre stretch of the road, between Quarry Road and Mount Macedon Road.

The safety improvements have been informed by crash history data, road safety guidelines, community feedback and the surrounding environment.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said that the works will deliver important safety improvements for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians using Black Forest Drive.

Funded by the state government in the Victorian Budget 2021–22, the Black Forest Drive safety improvements were the subject of extensive community consultation by the Department of Transport and Planning and Works on the safety improvements are expected to start in early 2024.

Message from your local Police Sergeant

I've been watching with interest social media posts on the proposed changes to Black Forest Drive, and it's important to remember there are various opinions and competing priorities around the issue. VicPol management were consulted, and I did give my thoughts for consideration, such as needed repairs to the Woodend-Tylden Rd and improvements to the intersection of Urquhart/High Street. But alas this was not to be. Here's hoping that these also get the attention they deserve in the future.

As most of you would expect, we are constantly being asked to undertake traffic duties to curb the ballooning road tragedies. Unfortunately, Woodend residents have not been immune to road tragedies this year. The impact on families/friends left behind and the greater community has been significant. So, we will continue to be out and about enforcing road rules, conducting breath tests, and making ourselves ever-present on the roads. Please be safe on the roads, don't speed, don't be distracted by your phone, and if you want to have a drink; find alternatives to get home safely.

I'm also going to cross promote something here. This summer is predicted to be very warm and dry, potentially resulting in a fire season we haven't seen in several years. Please prepare early the old saying: "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" or, for the metric minded, a gram of prevention is worth a kilo of cure. Lastly, I understand that many of you want to speak with us at the Police Station about a range of "things". Victoria Police current policies say we must work in pairs while in the car or when the Police Station can be open to the public. With such a small number of members, this means we are out and about more often than not; often just coming in to complete paperwork - so please be understanding that this means we are rarely able to be open for

Tea and Empathy

The mental anguish of refugees and asylum-seekers living in bureaucratic limbo is the theme of an upcoming event to be held at the Norma Richardson Hall in Woodend.

Tamil refugee Neil Para will recount his years of uncertainty following escape from the Sri Lankan civil war. He arrived in Australia with his wife and two young daughters and was held in community detention for nearly ten years, forbidden to undertake paid employment. His daughters were denied the opportunity to pursue study beyond the age of 18.

The situation for Neil and his family is now resolved, but the future of over 12,000 refugees and asylum-seekers remains uncertain. Atena Kashani, an 18-year-old from Iran, has been granted temporary asylum in Australia, but has no prospect of a permanent solution. She is desperate to further her education and has been offered a scholarship to undertake a law degree but, under the terms of her bridging visa, is unable to pursue it. She is one of thousands denied the opportunity to work or study and make a meaningful contribution to the country that supports them.

Neil and Atena will be joined in Woodend by author and academic Sandy Watson. A Trentham resident with close ties to the refugee community, Sandy founded her local branch of Rural Australians for Refugees and is Communications Convenor of the national body. Together with Neil and Atena, she aims to shed light on the trauma faced by refugees confronting an uncertain future.

The event, sponsored by Macedon Ranges Rural Australians for Refugees, is both an information afternoon and a fundraiser. Refreshments will be served in the form of a high tea. Wine can be purchased by the glass. Raffle tickets will be on sale with excellent prizes and music will be provided by Bendigobased string ensemble, Trio Elegante. All funds raised will go to organisations directly supporting refugees and asylum seekers.



Victorian Rotary Emergency Services Community Awards

Over 120 people gathered at Hyatt Place, Essendon Fields on the Saturday night of 16 September 2023 to celebrate the inaugural Victorian Rotary Emergency Services Community Awards (RESCA), honouring 11 finalists from ten of Victoria's emergency services agencies.

The Rotary Districts of Victoria Emergency Services Community Awards are an important mechanism for our community to acknowledge and celebrate the selfless community service of Victorian emergency services personnel and recognises the incredible achievements of both volunteer and paid officers. The Awards are community-nominated and recognise community involvement, in keeping with Rotary's motto of "Service Above Self".

The RESCA committee, led by Woodend Rotarian Grant Hocking with members from three districts, worked for several months to deliver this event and were rewarded by great attendance from across the emergency services sector. Deputy Secretary Emergency Management Kate Fitzgerald and Inspector General Emergency Management Tony Pearce were in attendance to acknowledge and congratulate all the finalists and recognise the two winners. Several other agencies were represented by Commissioners or CEOs along with Rotarians, and family and friends of the finalists.

There were excellent presentations from Dot Hennessy on the formation of RESCA and Dr Faye Bendrups on the ESF scholarship program.

The overall winner of Officer in a Volunteer Capacity was Country Fire Authority Group Officer Omeo Group of Brigades Graham Symons, and the overall winner for Officer in a Paid Capacity, is operational firefighter Tyson Taylor from Fire Rescue Victoria. These two winners went on to represent Victoria at the AUSRESCA (Australian RESCA) ceremony at Government House, Yarralumla, ACT.

The Victorian RESCA program also supports two Emergency Service Foundation Research Scholarships investigating mental health in emergency service workers (www.esf.com.au). The scholarship program was launched at the Victorian RESCA event, with applications being accepted until 19 November. Anyone working in the Victorian emergency services sector can apply for the \$10,000 scholarships. The announcement of the two successful scholarship applicants will be made in December

Time to start your presummer clean up!

CFA Now that the weather is starting to improve, people are beginning to venture outdoors, especially into the garden and other areas on larger properties. So, now is the time to prepare to reduce the risks of fire danger to you, your family and your property.

Clearing volatile fuels such as grass, undergrowth, fallen leaves, bark, dead branches and twigs will lower the intensity of a fire.

New local laws in the Macedon Ranges for burning off apply from 25 September 2023

Following the adoption of a new Community Local Law, new burning off rules and regulations apply.

If your property is less than 2,000 square metres (half an acre) - burning in the open air will be prohibited.

If your property is between 2,000 square metres and less than or equal to 4,000 square metres (one acre) – you must apply for a permit to burn off.

To apply for a permit to burn, complete an application and submit it to Council. There is no charge for a permit to burn application:

So, please visit the MRSC website for information, links and to make sure you are covered.

When undertaking a burn prior to the start of the Fire Restriction period, you should be very careful. If a burn escapes due to carelessness and damages someone else's property, you will be held responsible. The most common causes of a burn getting out of control are strong winds and, more importantly, human error!

Always register your burn-off

- Call 1800 668 511 before you start a burn. Too often our volunteers are called to fight a fire which turns out to be a private burn.
- Keep your burn safe and legal.
- Never leave a burn unattended.
- Monitor weather conditions. If it's too windy you should
- Have sufficient equipment and water to stop a fire spreading.

Do yourself (and our bushland) a favour

Choose non-invasive plants for your garden

Woodend Landcare and its predecessors have been working for over thirty years to protect and enhance areas of native plants on public land in the township. Compared to many other more rural Landcare groups, we have to deal with a lot more invasive plants emanating from nearby gardens. Many gardeners innocently choose plants that spread into the bush and then out-compete the indigenous species. Seeds can be spread by birds, but also by animals such as foxes and even by wind.

By far the worst offender is English ivy, which will flower and set seed if allowed to climb. Birds then carry the seed into bush areas and as a result, many of our indigenous plantings are now being swamped by ivy. If left, ivy will smother and kill natives, reducing the diversity of plants, animals and insects.

But ivy is not the only offender. Many people want fast-growing hedges, and some of the popular species such as Viburnum tinus, Ligustrum vulgare (privet) and Pittosporum tenuifolium are now also turning up in our indigenous areas. This is less likely to be a problem if the hedges are regularly trimmed and not allowed to flower and set seed, but unfortunately with our busy lifestyles, many hedges get out of control. Portuguese laurel (Prunus lusitanica) is also becoming a popular hedge and has real

Stinking iris (Iris foetidissima) is grown for its bright orange seeds. These plants, however, are poisonous, with seeds that are readily spread by birds, and they are becoming common throughout our revegetated and native bush areas.

We have no hope of eliminating every non-indigenous plant from our public bushland reserves, but we do need to do our best to eradicate the most threatening of invaders that smother and displace local native species, reducing biodiversity. So please think carefully about your plant choices when planning your garden. There are plenty of non-invasive plants available, both Australian and exotic - just be thoughtful with your choices.

Our website woodendlandcare.org has some useful resources about weeds and planting lists. Our group also has members with expertise on this topic. Contact us if you want to discuss plant options.

Clover glycine survey – bushland reserves **Kvneton**

5 November, 10am-12pm, Bald Hill

Help us survey the threatened species clover glycine. Clover glycine is recorded at two of Council's bushland reserves, Black Hill and Bald Hill. However, it is unclear how these populations are faring, and we are keen to know more. Local ecologist Karl Just will provide skills in identifying the species and lead the surveys at both reserves.


Textile recycling now available

Spring update

The Newham & District Landcare Group has been continuously busy



this year by providing members with information evenings, newsletters packed with great articles and links, conservation projects, and of course their autumn and spring tubestock sale. An informative evening was held on Friday 27 October at the Newham Hall on pollinators in our environment and how to contribute to pathways towards greater biodiversity.

The Group is delighted to report that they hae been awarded a Victorian Landcare Grant of \$19,982, administered through North Central Catchment Management Authority.

This vital funding will enable furtherment enhance the Cobaw Biolink On-Ground works on both public and private land:

- Weed control and additional tubestock for the Anderson Road Triangle will continue a very exciting project which will see it converting a 10,000 m² triangle of degraded public land into a significant patch of biodiverse woodland habitat within the Cobaw Biolink.
- A 650-metre stretch of seasonal waterway in the upper Campaspe Catchment that in the past was cleared for farming activities will be fenced to exclude stock and will be revegetated with indigenous native plants. Stream rehabilitation works such as this not only build a network of habitat across the landscape, they serve to mitigate the risk of erosion and improve water quality.

Sacred Heart receives Landcare grant



Terrific news! We've just received a 2023 Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grant!

We're excited to announce that Sacred Heart College Kyneton has recently received a 2023 Victorian Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grant and will be using the \$4,900 grant for our Campaspe River revegetation project.

Our school backs onto the Campaspe River, and for many years we have been working to remove weeds and restore some form of indigenous riparian strip. There have been several efforts at spraying, cutting and grooming woody weeds, followed by several rounds of plantings and followup weed control to reduce competition from invasive introduced species. We are now ready to do another round of weed control, replanting, nest box placement and followup weed control to reduce competition for new plantings.

On Wednesday 11 October, Brendan and Paul from Campaspe River and Land Management Group aided Sacred Heart College students and staff in the planting along the Campaspe River. Brendan also provided materials for the planting and donated several Australian Anchor plants (Discaria pubescens), that are listed as threatened under the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act and are rare in Victoria.

Year 11 and 12 Environmental Studies students were involved in planting across the morning as part of this revegetation project. The College will oversee ongoing maintenance and weed control, with an aim of reducing competition from introduced species, and the students will monitor the success of the planting in the months ahead.

The Victorian Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grants are funded by the Victorian Government through the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action.



To help start the conversation, Woodend CFA wants to know what questions you have about fire as part of our Woodend Community Preparedness 2023 Project, which is being coordinated by Woodend CFA volunteers Cara Nolan and Tom

"There is a huge amount of information available to help people prepare for, respond to and recover from bushfire events," stated Tom Lowe, "but this can sometimes be overwhelming.

"We want to find out what people in the Woodend community most want to know about bushfire, so that we can tailor the information we provide and make it more relevant to the likely fire scenarios in the Woodend area.

"By using local networks such as schools, online forums and community groups to engage with the community," added Cara Nolan, "we're already learning about people's concerns and getting a better understanding about their priorities Some of these are specific to property preparation, but others are wondering about living with the threat of bushfire in the long-term."

So, you can help by answering a couple of simple guestions:

- What do you want to know?
- What are your concerns and what will help you feel more prepared for bushfires?
- How would you like to receive information around bushfire preparedness?



New infrastructure grants to support community sports

The Victorian Government is helping communities transform sports facilities, build change rooms and recreation infrastructure through a new round of funding.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas announced last month the opening of applications for the 2023-24 Local Sports Infrastructure Fund – backed by up to \$5 million from the Victorian Budget 2023–24.

The Fund has three funding streams; providing up to \$300,000 for Community Facilities, up to \$250,000 for Community Sports Lighting, and up to \$40,000 for Planning.

Ms Thomas said the aim was to help sporting clubs keep up with soaring demand, while also making them accessible and more inclusive. "Sport and active recreation are the heart and soul of Macedon. Unfortunately, many clubs and communities are struggling with run down facilities," she said.

"I urge councils and sporting organisations to partner and apply for projects that will make a real difference to the lives of Victorians

All Victorian councils and Alpine Resorts Victoria are eligible to apply for funds towards a range of community sports infrastructure and active recreation developments including court lighting upgrades, skate parks, planning projects and more to benefit local clubs and communities.

15,605 scones! That's just a few scones! A group from the Woodend Eves branch donned hair

nets and aprons and headed to the Royal Melbourne Show, to witness scone-making veterans whip up thousands of scones at the Royal Melbourne Show. The line to grab a scone or country fare from the CWA pavilion was constant throughout the show. It was a great opportunity to chat to other branches and create new connections.

Talking scones: we headed to Bupa Woodend for a sconemaking workshop as part of our community connection focus with older members of our community. The residents made scones for the other residents to enjoy for afternoon tea. It was a lovely morning and all residents participated in whatever way they felt comfortable. Thanks to our chief jam-maker for her contribution to topping the scones. Food, community and connection never go out of fashion!

Which leads us to our next question.

Sometimes we get asked, "How can the CWA stay relevant?" The CWA is more than making scones. It's about learning life skills, preserving the past and sustaining the future. Before the buzzword 'upcycling' was invented, generations of CWA members would work their magic on 'making do' and craftily creating from what people had in their cupboards.

Here is a story of upcycling from one of our members.

'Now almost a collector's item, the vintage Onkaparinga blankets are a rare find in today's society and almost a thing of the past. I saw an entry of a fellow CWA Sister at the Craft Show and her exquisite sewing skill caught my eye and I wondered...

I had a blanket that belonged to my parents, sitting at the back of a cupboard, long superseded by doonas on our beds. When I was growing up, Onkaparinga for me was a much-loved brand. Onkaparinga started in South Australia in 1869 in Hahndorf and then moved operations to Lobethal. We lived in South Australia and one by one my brother, sister and I moved for work and study to Victoria, and then my parents in their retirement joined us. My parents invested in these Australian pure wool blankets because of their quality and warmth. Although they have long since passed, the memories of climbing into my parent's bed and hiding under the covers and looking up at the colours of the blanket, and all the laughs and love shared are wrapped up now in a beautiful coat that fellow CWA sister Kelly has made for me. I feel close to my family and my childhood, which I will cherish forever when I put on this beautiful coat.

I just wanted to say thank you to Kelly for creating this beautiful coat out of family memories. I'll leave you with a lasting thought and one more bit of history, I am absolutely certain I was conceived under this very blanket over 58 years ago!' Now I can wear it! Upcycling is always in fashion.



Solar Rebates: What's New and Are You Eligible?

Countback to fill vacancy for South Ward

A countback to fill an extraordinary vacancy on Macedon Ranges Shire Council for South Ward will be held online at 10am on Monday 13 November. The vacancy is due to the resignation of Councillor Anne Moore.

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) will hold a countback of all formal votes from the 2020 Macedon Ranges Shire Council South Ward election to fill the vacancy. Votes will be redistributed to candidates who were unsuccessful in 2020 but who are still eligible to be elected.

The countback is based on the proportional representation method of counting, which means candidates must achieve a proportion of votes known as a quota.

"The candidate who gets the quota will be elected. If no candidate reaches the quota, the candidate with the highest number of countback votes will be elected," said VEC election manager, Kathy Georgiou.

A link to join the countback will be available from 9.30am on Monday 13 November at vec.vic.gov.au

Candidates and other interested parties can watch the countback.

Update on rates charges

During a recent review of Council's rates income for the year, an error was discovered in the calculation of Council's rates and charges.

The error meant that the amount of the municipal charge applied was too great, and a credit of \$23 for each rateable property was required to correct the error.

To make this adjustment, Council adopted a revised Budget 2023/24 on 28 September 2023 correcting the declared municipal charge.

The revised Budget 2023/24 included the updated municipal charge of \$189 per rateable property for 2023, down from \$212 (the difference of \$23.)

You don't need to take any action to receive the credit on your rates account; the credit has already been processed and was applied to all rateable properties on Thursday 29 September 2023.

On future rates notices for 2023/24, you will see that each future instalment amount has been slightly reduced (compared with the originally issued notice); the credit will not appear as a separate line on the notice.

If you've already paid your rates in full, you may have a credit amount remaining on your account. You may choose to carry this forward to offset the rates and charges for 2024/25, in which case you don't need to do anything.

Alternatively, if you'd prefer a refund, you can contact Council's Customer Service team.

Macedon Ranges Regional Sports Precinct – project update

The Macedon Ranges Regional Sports Precinct is being delivered through a number of stages, as funding permits.

Stage 1 includes a sports hub with three indoor multi-sport courts, an administration area, kiosk, reception and amenities, a multipurpose pavilion, an AFL/cricket oval, fitness loop, playground and landscaping. This stage is well progressed and is on schedule to be completed by May 2024. The upgrade of the Hamilton and Barringo Road intersection is about to be put out

Stage 2 includes the extension of the sports hub, with an additional three multi-sport courts, additional amenities. an additional AFL/cricket oval, two outdoor sports courts. additional car parking and landscaping; these works are about to be put out to tender for detailed design and documentation.

Other upgrades flagged within the Sports Precinct's Master Plan but subject to further funding include: retractable seating in stadiums, a function and multi-purpose room extension to the sports hub, a canopy connecting existing outdoor netball courts and the sports hub, an extension to the sports pavilion and cricket nets. Advocacy for this additional funding will continue.

Macedon Ranges Shared Trails Project update

The Macedon Ranges Shared Trails Project will deliver approximately 24km of trail through rural landscapes to link with railway stations and points of interest along the journey.

This project is being delivered under a design and construct contract. The trail crosses many land tenures with different land managers, involving significant environmental and cultural heritage assessments and approvals to use their land and construct the trail. The design process for each stage has been an extended process, as it has been crucial to meet the conditions and requirements of all land managers. Once the design conditions and relevant approvals have been obtained for each stage, plans can be finalised for construction to commence.

The trail will be constructed in the following stages to address physical, boundary and topographical constraints:

- Stage 1: Woodend Station to Bawden Road, Woodend at the boundary of the Macedon Regional Park;
- Stage 2: Middle Gully Road, Woodend through Macedon and New Gisborne to the rail bridge on Kilmore Road and Markham Road, Riddells Creek;
- Stage 3: From the rail bridge, travelling along the north side of the rail line to Riddells Creek Railway Station.

The Stage 1 detailed design is approved and Stage 2 detailed design is nearing completion. Cultural Heritage Management Plans and a Land Use Activity Agreement have been completed. Once all written approvals are in place, construction can commence on the next stage.

It is expected Stage 1 and Stage 2 will be completed by June 2024, with Stage 3 (to Riddells Creek) to follow. A copy of the trail alignment is available on Council's website. For regular updates, sign up at mrsc.vic.gov.au/shared-trails



New fire truck for Hesket-Kerrie CFA

Hesket-Kerrie CFA, located along the northern side and lower slopes of Mount Macedon, is a volunteer brigade run by a team of dedicated fire fighters operating out of two fire stations located in Hesket at the bottom of the mountain and Cherokee nestled in the foothills.

The role of the brigade is to protect the lives and properties of the community in the local area and it is pivotal in protecting the northern face of the mountain when fires threaten from the north. The brigade is also called upon to fight fires throughout the state when required.

The brigade is currently fundraising to purchase a Medium Tanker, to supplement government funding for the vehicle. The new, larger-capacity (carries more water), more technologically advanced and much safer tanker will greatly assist in building the brigade's resources and strengthen its capabilities.

The target is to raise \$80,000, of which the brigade has already raised \$40,000 over the past few years by providing car parking duties and various events at Hanging Rock, by tin-rattling at the Gisborne Market, etc and of course through some generous donations from the community along the way. This amount will enable the brigade to provision the truck with breathing apparatus so structure fires can be accessed for both rescue and extinguishing fires. The target date to fund the purchase of the tanker is late April 2024.



Early Days in the Woodend Pharmacy

A pill-making tray, pestle and mortar, and suppository makers were some tools used by early chemists in Woodend. Their handbook was the "Commercial Hand Book of Chemical Analysis 1850". The first Woodend pharmacy was built in 1859 with Dr Turnour as the first owner. Other early pharmacists were Dr Randall, Dr Bird and I. W. Whitehouse.

Glenis Ponsford who, with her pharmacist husband Geoff, ran the pharmacy from 1959 until 1988, described how early chemists used iron, sulphate and bismuth carbonate. Chemical and herbal drugs were available and leeches were used for letting blood. Popular drugs were tincture of nux vomica (strychnine, a poison), aromatic spirit of ammonia, sal volatile and magnesium sulphate.

The first prescription book, from 1859 until 1884, shows the names and addresses of the purchasers, the ingredients, the product and the price. Few prescriptions were made up in the first few years, with only two between 1 December 1859 and 1 January 1860. The first was for the baby of Mrs Rub who had a fever. Initially poisons such as arsenic and strychnine were sold for problems like toothache and cleaning straw hats. After laws were introduced to control their sale, from 1881 a poisons book listed the details of the buyer. Veterinary medicines were also available.




Photo 328: F. Boyett could be consulted every Tuesday afternoon at Southwell's Pharmacy in the late 1890s. He advertised to be a "surgical and mechanical dentist".

In the late 1890s, pharmacist R.W. Maxwell advertised his skills as a dispensing chemist and surgeon dentist. He lists a number of cures such as Dr Woodhall's Lung Healer for bronchitis, asthma, coughs and colds; balsam of aniseed for influenza and hoarseness; chilblain liniment and pectoral cough mixture. The Ponsfords bought the business from Ken Murphy,

who had acquired it from Alan Hull nine years before. Ken recalled that the pharmacy was very busy, serving a doctor, two small hospitals and Clyde School. Relying on the Herald and Weekly Times Farmers Handbook, he also learnt sufficient veterinary medicine to help farmers with problems such as milk fever.
