

The Victoria Hotel will be the venue for another interesting and inspirational guest speaker as part of the Birds of a Feather regular lunchtime gatherings. The first speaker for 2024 will be media professional Julie Peters.

Julie worked at the Australian Broadcasting Corporation for 50 years and in her late 30s she became the first employee there to openly transition. This was at a time when there was little understanding around what it meant to be transgender, and there were no organisational policies in place to support her.

Now in her 70s, Julie has had a varied career. As well, working behind the scenes at the ABC, she is a doctoral researcher in public health and the anthropology of gender/transgender, and a teacher, sessional academic, cabaret performer, writer, parliamentary

candidate and environmentalist.

Organised by Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health's Country LGBTIQA+ Inclusion Program (CLIP), Birds of a Feather offers the opportunity for adults who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual,

Applications will be open until 15 May, and the peace fellows who are selected will begin their studies in 2025. Find out who is eligible and how they can apply at https://my.rotary.org/en/ peace-fellowship-application

Help midcareer change-makers and young professionals who have peacebuilding experience apply for a fully funded Rotary Peace Fellowship.

Among the applicants who are accepted this year will be members of the first cohort at Rotary's newest peace centre, Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey. The new centre will offer a certificate program in peace and development studies for candidates who plan to focus on peacebuilding in the Middle East and North Africa region.

Since the Rotary Peace Centers program began in 2002, more than 1,700 fellows have graduated. They are now working on peace and development initiatives in more than 140 countries. Many serve as leaders in government, nongovernmental organizations, education and research institutions, peacekeeping and law enforcement agencies, media and the arts, and international organizations such as UNICEF, the United Nations, the World Bank, and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.







We provide peer support for people bereaved by suicide, through monthly group meetings where people are free to come and go as they need.

We offer and promote training to help people recognise signs that someone is struggling with their mental health, be confident to talk with them, and support them to stay safe.

We bring together service providers and work with them on a range of important programs and projects. Together we are advocating for better services for our community.

On February 16, it was 41 years since the devastating Ash Wednesday bushfires destroyed over 425 houses and claimed seven lives in the Macedon and Mt Macedon areas. We also passed 15 years since Black Saturday on February 7. We should therefore not become complacent.

Everyone needs a fire plan

We covered this in last month's article, but it is worth another reminder. One of the most important things we all need to do is prepare and practice a clear Fire Safety Plan.

During summer, we tend to concentrate on preparing a Bushfire Safety Plan, which covers your preparation and procedures during a grass or bushfire. But as we head into the cooler months, your attention should turn to a Home Fire Safety Plan.

While we attend most of our bush, grass and scrub fires over the warmer months, the CFA

attends more structural fires (such as houses, sheds and chimneys) in the cooler months. This is the time when people start using their fires, heaters and electric blankets again. In fact, cooking, heating and electrical equipment are among the leading causes of home fires each year.

Authorities sick and tyred of cleaning up

Environmental authorities are urging Victorian households and businesses to spare the environment and dispose of their used tyres legally and responsibly after more than 2700 car and truck tyres were found dumped on public land last year.

The Conservation Regulator and Parks Victoria recorded at least 60 separate illegal dumping incidents involving personal or commercial quantities of tyres across Victorian public land in 2023, with the State's Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) estimating that thousands more have been dumped, burned, or stockpiled.

Dumped car tyres can have serious impacts on human and environmental health. Old tyres also contain harmful chemicals that leach into the environment and groundwater as they break down, potentially poisoning plants and animals.

Discarded tyres also present a serious fire risk, as tyre fires are harder to control or extinguish than regular fires. As rubber burns hotter and more easily, tyres dumped in forests can fuel bushfires with devastating effects.

David McIlroy, Director of Regulatory Operations, Conservation Regulator said, "Illegally dumped rubber tyres can seriously risk the health of communities, environments, and native wildlife, and Victorian individuals and businesses need to clean up their act." Legal disposal of old tyres reduces these environmental and safety risks, and recycled tyres can often be turned into other products, including roads and artificial playground turf.

Individual or small quantities of tyres can be responsibly disposed of at recycling centres, such as local council transfer stations, for a small fee so that they can be repurposed. Most tyre outlets will also accept old tyres as part of government recycling schemes, either for free if people have purchased new tyres from their shop, or for a small fee if brought from elsewhere.

When disposing of tyres through one of the above options, people should check with their local council, recycling facility, or individual tyre seller to see if they accept them.



Victorian businesses also have legal obligations for safely storing and transporting large amounts of waste tyres. EPA Victoria produces guidance on managing these responsibilities, which can be found at: www.epa.vic.gov.au/for-business/find-a-topic/ manage-industrial-waste/waste-tyres

In Victoria, it is an offence to dump litter or waste under the Environment Protection Act 2017, with maximum penalties ranging between \$3,846 and \$230,772.

Macedon Ranges Obedience Dog Club

The first Induction for the year saw a very hot Sunday and lots of white cabbage butterflies. Seventeen new pups braved the early morning heat.

February is almost over, and the weather will be cooling down. Just remember that we can still get several hot days between now and Easter, which comes early this year, and dog's paws are not designed to walk on hot surfaces.

Walking your dog during the heat of the day can cause severe burns to paw pads, which will be very painful for your pup. So how to tell a surface is too hot? Take the 5-second-test - If it's too hot for you to put your hand on the surface for five seconds, it's too hot for paws!

Dogs lose heat through panting and only sweat through their paws. They are at high risk of heatstroke, so make sure they have constant access to shade and ensure there is always cold, clean, fresh water

Some other tips include: not running or cycling with your dog when it's hot, and instead of heading out in the heat of the day, head out in the early morning or late evening instead, when it's cooler; uusing sunscreen on the dog's ear tips and nose to prevent sunburn; making frozen treats using fruit, like berries and watermelon; putting ice cubes in their drinking water and setting up a sprinkler or paddling pool, in the shade of course, to entertain them and keep

First up, the energy bills

Grab recent energy bills (both electric and gas if yours is a dual-fuel household) and head to Victorian Energy Compare (compare. energy.vic.gov.au). With very little effort you can get quotes for a range of plans delivering your household needs. Weighing up the options takes a little more time but usually repays effort invested with savings - sometimes up to several hundred dollars per year.

If you're a concession card holder and are having trouble affording your energy bills, the Victorian Government has an Energy Assistance program to help you navigate the market and access support. Drop in at Woodend Neighbourhood House and ask them to help connect you with the program.

And the Community Survey

Electrify 3442 exists to help local households transition to all-electric, powered by solar energy. In February we launched a Community Survey to help us understand what will help our community electrify their homes. The survey will run until Easter and is accessible online at mrsg.org.au/electrify3442. If online access is difficult for you, drop in at Woodend Library. The team there can help you access the survey online or provide you with a paper copy to complete.

We want to hear from everyone, no matter where on the electrification pathway your household may be. Encourage your family, friends and neighbours to participate. The results of the survey will inform the tailored support we will provide later in the year. We look forward to sharing the results at a community forum in Woodend on Sunday 21st April.

Catch us at the Woodend Community Farmers Market on Saturday 2nd March and Saturday 6th April. We're happy to talk about solar, batteries, electric heating, electric hot water, electric vehicles and electric cooking. Illegal fruit netting causes rapid rise in wildlife harm

Victorian gardeners are being urged to ensure they're using wildlifefriendly fruit netting when trying to protect their backyard crops, as wildlife carers and authorities report a spike in animal injuries and deaths from entanglements this summer.

The Conservation Regulator is warning the community about the dangers illegal netting poses to native wildlife, such as birds, bats, and possums, and are reminding household growers that they must use safe, compliant fruit netting with mesh no bigger than 5mm x 5mm. In Victoria, it has been illegal to use or sell netting with a mesh size

bigger than this since 1 September 2021, as larger mesh netting on fruiting trees or plants is more likely to entangle, distress, and fatally injure animals.

Wayne Robins, Acting Chief Conservation Regulator said, "We know Victorians love their fruit and vegetable gardens, but as backyard visits from native animals become more common, it is the responsibility of households to protect vulnerable wildlife from harm by complying with fruit netting laws." He said that stories of unnecessary wildlife injuries and deaths caused by entanglements in unsafe and illegal household fruit netting were disappointing. "The Conservation Regulator is working to assess any reports we receive and take the appropriate action," he added.

In addition to an appropriate mesh size, experts also recommend using netting that is white and has a cross-weave design, as it reduces the risks to wildlife and is easier for nocturnal animals to see and avoid at night.

Other tips for safer netting:

- Try protecting selected branches with bags or sleeves, rather than netting the whole tree.
- Never throw netting loosely over trees or let it lay on the ground. This can trap reptiles and other animals.
- Fix netting tightly to the tree trunk to help stop rats and birds from reaching fruit.

Native species play an important part in our ecosystem, and following a dry spring with stunted plant growth, Victorians are more likely to see wildlife, such as vulnerable grey-headed flying foxes, in their backyards looking for food.

If you find entangled, injured, or distressed wildlife, you can find temporary care information and contact details for the closest wildlife services by calling DEECA on 136 186 or using the Help for Injured Wildlife tool: www.wildlife.vic.gov.au/injured-native-wildlife/ help-for-injured-wildlife

In Victoria, all wildlife is protected by law. It is illegal to use or sell non-compliant household fruit netting under Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Regulations 2019 and Authorised Officers can issue onthe-spot fines of \$384 to users and \$769 to sellers of illegal netting. Offenders also face a maximum penalty of \$2,884 if prosecuted in

The community is encouraged to report any information about wildlife crime to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.





Working with Council to prevent family violence

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council will share in almost \$3 million to prevent family violence and all forms of violence against women.

The program, announced last month, will see Councils around the state delivering a range of initiatives as part of the Victorian Government's Free from Violence Local Government Program 2024-27.

Programs and activities that will help people in the community understand the role they can play to make their community safer.

As large employers with unique connections to their local communities, councils are well placed to support communities to both prevent family violence and stop violence against women.

This is the second round of the program, which is already supporting 15 councils to carry out primary prevention initiatives in their local area.

State Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said that in focusing on ending family violence, the state government is investing in local communities to support family violence intervention programs. "All women and children have the right to be safe at home," she said.

Investing in Macedon women to change the game

The current round of the program also has a strong focus on supporting club or organisation initiatives that encourage the equitable inclusion of women and girls from all backgrounds and experiences.


The program is part of the Change Our Game initiative, which works to make sport more accessible, increasing local participation and providing opportunities for all Victorians to be leaders in their local sporting community.

The fund is guided by five priorities of experiences: First Peoples-led experiences, wellness, arts and culture, food and drink, and nature.

A new guide for tourism operators will also help them deliver projects that are ready for investment, maximise their returns and provide a better experience for visitors.

Hello everyone. Councillors are currently busy with budget deliberations for the 2024/25 financial year. Unfortunately, as with



councils right across Victoria, this year's budget is facing some tight constraints for several reasons, including the fast-rising costs that are affecting everyone across the board and demand on resources of managing shire-wide emergencies such as weather events. In addition, our capacity to raise more money is restricted, as annual rate rises are limited by the rate cap that is typically well below the CPI, and the increased costs local governments must meet. However, we continue to listen to community feedback, and to create a budget that reflects community priorities, as outlined in our council plan and community vision, and with the funding mechanisms we have available.

Apart from budget deliberations, your councillors continue to be very busy, working with staff and the community on some major priorities, particularly in the strategic planning area, that we are hoping to progress and/or finalise. For the West Ward, this includes the Kyneton Urban Design Framework. Across the Shire, we are also planning to complete the Gisborne Futures process this year and are currently engaged with developing the Romsey Structure Plan and the Riddells Creek Movement Network Study. Once again, we encourage everyone to stay involved and engage with these consultations when they happen. Councillors and Council officers listen to and value the feedback we receive and whilst we cannot adopt everything that is suggested, Council consistently works very hard to incorporate community feedback into the final product.

A reminder that late last year, Council set up a textiles collection trial at our three Resource Recovery facilities around the Shire. The trial will continue to run until September this year and aims to provide residents with the opportunity to recycle unwanted, worn out or damaged textiles that are unsuitable for op shops. Residents from Woodend, in particular, made use of this service with the Woodend Resource Recovery Facility processing 6.8 tonnes of textiles last year - over half the total amount processed across the shire.

Watch out for the latest program of events to be held at the Kyneton Town Hall in 2024. Tickets for events are now on sale, and the program again features a diverse range of performances and activities designed to appeal to people of all ages and interests. During April, Council is also running a range of 'Live and Local' events across the Shire featuring local bands and artists who will perform across the shire's charming community halls, as part of the 2024 Macedon Ranges Autumn Festival. The program feature You Am I's Tim Rogers, Juliarna Clark, The Whiskey Rogues, Valley Road and more, complemented by local wines and food trucks featuring regional produce. People will be able to view current public consultations and have their say in new ways through the new Your Say hub, which has the capacity to host surveys, interactive maps, Q&As, forums and more.

The launch of Your Say supports a strategic priority in the Council Plan 2021-2031 to 'Enhance customer experience through the transformation of our services, to ensure they are easy to access and provide user-friendly experiences'.

Your Say also supports a specific Council Plan action also set to be completed this financial year, with new Community Engagement Guidelines under development to better guide Council staff in undertaking effective, relevant, and transparent community consultation.

Chief Executive Officer, Bernie O'Sullivan, said it was integral to hear from the community to help tailor the projects, policies and services

"We have subject matter experts here at Council who work hard to develop initiatives relevant to their field, but two-way conversation is essential to make sure we're hitting the mark," he said.

"Council is committed to genuine consultation and closing the loop with the community. This new online engagement hub - together with the new staff guidelines - will support that commitment. I encourage residents to continue taking the time to review public consultations and provide feedback."

A number of draft policies or initiatives endorsed by Council for public consultation late last year are set to invite feedback from 5 February, including:

Romsey Skatepark designs – proposed designs for a new skatepark that would feature a large bowl, a quarter pipe, a pump track and a series of hips and corners. Funding of

- \$550,000 has already been committed by the Victorian Government towards construction, while Council allocated \$20,000 towards initial planning works in the Budget 2023/24.
- Draft Complaint and Unreasonable Behaviour Policy this policy outlines how Council will manage complaints and unreasonable behaviour and provides clear guidance for both the complainant and Council.
- Draft Special Charge Scheme Policy this policy applies to Special Charge Scheme (SCS) infrastructure projects such as resident-funded upgrading of roads and drainage.
- Draft Fair Access Policy this policy supports Council in the identification and removal of systemic factors contributing to gender inequality relating to the availability of quality community sports infrastructure at times that are suitable.





The special recuiting train

On 24 April 1916, a special train left Spencer Street station on a mission to recruit young men around the state to the AIF, with a view to sending them to the war front. On 30 May, The Argus reported that "The first meeting of the tour was held at Woodend. The Royal Park Military Band, which had been in the district over the weekend, met the train, and with a detachment of the 65th Battalion of senior cadets, marched down the main street to the Mechanics Institute. There, an improvised platform had been erected, and from it, Mr Hutchinson (Minister for Lands), Mr Chanter and the recruiting sergeants addressed the crowd, which comprised nearly all the townspeople, as all places of business had been closed during the meeting. More than an hour was occupied ... speaking to eligible young men, but only five volunteered. Woodend and its district have already sent men to the front, but there are still several eligible men in the town."When you drive down the Avenue of Honour at Woodend, remember each tree represents a person from the Woodend District who went to the battlefields of World War I.

The train then continued on to Kyneton, where the Chairman of the Committee remarked that if insufficient young men joined up, compulsory conscription might be introduced. However, many of the young men of Kyneton volunteered and added to the enormous contribution made by the men of the whole country.

Caring for the whole student at SHC

Sacred Heart College Kyneton is a Catholic school in the Mercy tradition. The College has a commitment to excellence in learning and teaching and strives to support the wellbeing and growth of each young person in our community.

As the new Year 7 Level Leader, it has been a joy to support these newest members of our community as they join the College during transition week. As you can see from happy faces in the accompanying photographs, it has been an enjoyable but busy week.

This is my second year at the College, having led the Junior Literacy Intervention Program, as well as being a teacher of English in 2023, and I'm excited to broaden the work I do with our Year 7s across the year. I know how important the transition period is for our young people and look forward to working with Year 7 students and their families during this time.



Our College is immensely proud of the wellbeing programs in place for students. The SHC Wellbeing Framework underpins areas of personal development, the Year 7 focus being the Mercy Value of Respect. During the transition period, our Year 7 students engage in several key activities. This begins with Transition Week, where students immerse themselves in the SHC culture, developing an understanding of what learning and effort looks like and reflecting on their own learning habits. Students spend lots of time fostering strong relationships with their peers as well as staff, while having fun on excursions to the Botanical Gardens and Splash Waterpark.

Beyond Transition Week, our Year 7s attend a three-day adventure camp in Kinglake to strengthen their understanding of how to respect and care for each other, themselves, and the environment in which we live. This is complimented by our Peer Support Program, where groups of our newest students work with a group of Year 9 students who have undertaken training as members of the Peer Support Team. These students plan and deliver activities to help with the transition of Year 7s across the first half of the year. The program also offers an opportunity for connection to students in a higher year level, which can be beneficial when first moving around the College grounds.



Throughout Year 7, we regularly revisit and reflect on the learning established during transition period within our Compass (wellbeing) lessons and with the support of Homeroom Teachers, Year Level Leaders and Heads of House. A key component of our Wellbeing Program is working in partnership with parents, with the aim of nurturing each student to reach their potential.
