



Honouring Heroes: A Remembrance Day Tribute in Woodend

The members of Woodend RSL were joined by 150 members of the local community on Saturday 11 November to mark Remembrance Day 2023.

A special guest at the service was Second World War veteran and Woodend resident, Joy Damon (98) who served as an RAAF flight mechanic. Her late husband, Reg, was an RAAF airframe fitter and was serving in Darwin during the Japanese bombing.

The service was led by the RSL sub-branch president, John McCausland (a veteran of peacekeeping operations in

Kashmir and the Middle East). He spoke about the importance of 11 November to Australia and how the original Armistice Day, which remembered those who died in the First World War, was replaced by Remembrance Day, where we remember those who have died in all conflicts and peacekeeping operations.

Mr McCausland spoke of the writings of Australia's First World War official correspondent, Charles Bean, who had served alongside troops on Gallipoli and the Somme and had observed the evolution of a unique Australian character. He

observed that this character was based on four values – courage, endurance, sacrifice and mateship (a term coined by Henry Lawson). Mr McCausland noted how this unique character had, over time, become evident in times of non-military crises, such as bushfire and floods, and was evident in last week's community response to the tragic traffic incident at nearby Daylesford.

Mr McCausland observed that, on this day, all Australians should pause, reflect and remember. Mr McCausland also thanked the principals and staff at all local schools for helping to instil in our young people the spirit and meaning of Remembrance.

The service contained readings by senior students from five local schools – Woodend Primary School, "A Poem for Remembrance Day"; Sacred Heart College, Kyneton, "The 11th of November"; St Ambrose Catholic Primary School, "In Flanders Fields"; Newham Primary School, "To the Sunburnt Ear"; Hesket Primary School, "For the Fallen".

Braemar College Cadet Unit provided the catafalque party and flag orderlies. The Ode from "For the Fallen" was delivered by Vietnam veteran Mr David Crockett. At the end of the service, wreaths were laid at the RSL Cenotaph by local support and service groups and school representatives.

In closing the service, Mr McCausland thanked the community for its generous support to the Poppy Appeal, which raised around \$9,200 for the support of veterans.



Safety on Public Land Act 2004

NOTIFICATION OF PUBLIC SAFETY ZONE DECLARATION

I, Mark Mellington, Acting Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Grampians Region, as delegate of the Secretary to the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, give notice pursuant to section 7(1A) of the Safety on Public Land Act 2004, that I have made public safety zone declarations published in the Victoria Government Gazette (Special Gazette S506-23) dated 25/09/2023.

The declaration made on 25/09/2023 takes effect from 02/10/2023 to 02/01/2024 inclusive specifies areas of State Forest which have been declared public safety zones for the purpose of the maintenance of public safety and the safe management of fuel reduction activities

The declaration specifies the period for which the areas have been declared public safety zones; the times or periods during which access is restricted or prohibited; restrictions or conditions (if any) applying to the public safety zones; and persons or classes of persons exempt from their operation.

Newham Primary reaches sustainability stars



A small school in the Macedon Ranges has been recognised as a sustainability champion, achieving the highest level of certification through Victoria's ResourceSmart Schools program.

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos today presented teachers and students at Newham Primary School with a 5 Star certificate. The school joined the ResourceSmart School program in 2014 and are one of the program's longest standing active schools.

The school has worked tirelessly over the last nine years to actively reduce their waste to landfill and energy consumption. The school has achieved reductions in their energy use by 92,000 kilowatts, reduced emissions by 96 tonnes of carbon emissions, and planted over 1000 trees, boosting biodiversity along the banks of Deep Creek tributary, creating a nature corridor for wildlife that connects with the Cobaw Biolink.

"I congratulate Newham Primary School on their 5-star certificate for their amazing achievements on reducing their waste to landfill and energy consumption. Their success is an example of what can be achieved by working together to combat climate change," said Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas.

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopolous said that Victoria, a world leader on climate action, had set strong renewable energy targets that will create a more climate-resilient and prosperous future for the next generation. "The work happening in schools like Newham Primary is having a real impact on meeting these targets," he said.

The ResourceSmart Schools program, delivered by Sustainability Victoria, supports Victorian schools to embed sustainability across school facilities, community and curriculum.

Since 2008, the ResourceSmart Schools program has assisted more than 1,400 schools to save 1.8 million kilolitres of water, divert 194,000 cubic metres of waste from landfill and abate 118,000 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions. Through the program, participating schools have saved a total of \$41 million on school operations bills.



A Collective 125 years of Scouting leadership experience at an end

Retiring Scouting leaders, Pam Lenders, Marli Traill, Elaine Young, and Colleen Dwyer-Grey have shared their knowledge and wisdom over countless Scouting troops, and their years of expertise in the outdoors has unfortunately come to an end. Between them, the four women share 125 years of experience, and their legacy and impact will live on not only in Scouting, but also in the wider community.

For years, 1st Woodend Scouts has been a safe place for growing and learning for the youth of the Macedon Ranges. According to Marli Traill, the family-friendly Scouting program prepares Scouts for obstacles they may encounter as they grow up. The Scouting program guides youths to make their own decisions; Pam Lenders explains that the program is most focused on giving children the chance to be self-led, allowing every opportunity to express themselves. She defines a Scouting leader as somebody who doesn't take over, and has a willingness to adapt to a child's needs to fully support them. Scouting programs are solution-focused, so when a Scout encounters a problem, the leaders encourage them to come to a solution as a team and with as little input from the leader as possible. Elaine Young describes it as a tool to design your goals, and create your own adventure, as every child is different. The Scouting program is accommodating to people of all ages and skill levels, and having a desire for outdoor adventure gives the kids a chance to explore new connections with other people their own

Colleen Dwyer-Grey reminisced on her first encounter with the 1st Woodend Scouts, and how her son's entry into Cub Scouts and her interest for the outdoors led her to join the program as a leader. At the time, girls were not allowed to be Scouts, but that didn't stop Colleen from getting involved. She struggled with a speech impediment at that time, and worried a lot about what other people would think of her. Through the Scouts, Colleen built up confidence from many speeches and the kids encouraged her to trust herself

Marli and Elaine recall the Scouting Zooms that occurred over the pandemic, when the program couldn't run face-to-face due to COVID-19. They say that while not everyone found it easy to engage with online meetings, those who joined the Thursday night Zooms were able to continue enjoying Scouts, even though they couldn't be outdoors together. Marli and Elaine had to work around this,

with lots of cooking activities, scavenger hunts, obstacle courses and tasks to set the kids. A lot of the children looked forward to the weekly meetings online, and it also helped keep the kids connected and not lonely.

All four women remarked on the Anzac Dawn Service, describing it as an amazing opportunity for the Scouts to remember the Anzacs, and how important it is to experience the service. The kids camp up at the Cross at Mt Macedon, and they are always ready at 3am for the Dawn Service. "It's such a privilege to be able to camp up there, because nobody else is allowed to," says Pam. In the morning, they set up the tables and chairs and start what is called the Gunfire Breakfast, where the Scouts hand out coffee, tea, and sausages, all for free and for people to enjoy. For the 100th commemoration of the Dawn Service, Pam recalls about 2,000 people being up on the mountain.

Awards are also present in each of the four women's Scouting careers, as Marli and Colleen alike have both been awarded the Silver Emu, awarded to an adult member in a leadership role for great responsibility and service, awarded four to five years after they are awarded the Silver Koala, which is awarded to an adult member who has been in a leadership role for a period of around 14-16 years. Elaine has been awarded the Meritorious Service Award, which is defined as performance at a higher standard for longer than it would be expected. She has also been given the Silver Wattle, an achievement award for outstanding service for a period of around ten to twelve years. These awards are very prestigious achievements, but Pam Lenders describes the experience of leading and being with the children as more fulfilling than any award. As Marli, Elaine and Pam have all had a background in childcare and teaching, they recount the same kind of experience from teaching days to being a Scout leader. Pam says that a lot of the problems you will encounter as a Scout leader will also be evident in teaching.

Recalling their most memorable moments, it was clear to see how much the four retiring leaders loved the program and how much it meant to them. All described the Scouting program in Woodend as not only a safe place for children, but also a place where they were able to grow themselves. They talked about how much they loved Woodend, a community-minded and welcoming town, which was a great place for children to develop people skills and connect with the community in a small rural setting.

We wish the best of luck to all four of these ladies going forward, and emphasise the importance of their legacy they have left behind.

New group to electrify the community

When a hot summer approaches, we Woodenders tend to have a lot on our minds. Bushfire risk. Buildings that are in various stages of readiness for rising temperatures and adverse weather events brought by El Niño and climate change. When the weather cools, our thoughts turn to how to keep warm; and all the while, electricity and gas costs go up.

A new project, Electrify 3442, aims to put the power in the community hands - so that households and businesses in postcode district 3442 can make their buildings more comfortable and energy efficient and reduce greenhouse emissions. And in a recent coup for the project, Rewiring Australia – a not-for-profit research and advocacy organisation dedicated to "electrifying everything" - has selected Electrify 3442 as one of only ten community partners nationwide tasked with bringing the electrification message to our

Led by local high school student activist Olivia Hedge and comprising leadership members from Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group's Renewable Energy, Go Renewable Energy! and Sustainable Homes action groups, Electrify 3442 wants to find a group of families, and eventually, businesses, willing to pledge to fully electrify.

But why electrify? Rewiring Australia says that a great proportion of Australia's domestic greenhouse gas emissions come from households and businesses. To address this, Electrify 3442 wants to get us all thinking about the "six things" - four significant energy users within our homes that can be upgraded to efficient electric, which, along with rooftop solar and a home battery, will save a lot every year on power bills (see graphic) and reduce energy-related carbon emissions.

Filling the knowledge gap is crucial, says Electrify 3442 member Sue Barker. She notes that while this community is no stranger to energy efficiency – according to solarquotes.com.au, our postcode district has over the national average of rooftop solar installations per 100 households - there is still a lot to know about going electric:



what's available, what's involved, how to choose products and tradespeople. And besides the technology, says Sue, not everyone knows about other resources, like government rebates that can help with the upfront costs. There's value in being armed with the knowledge ahead of time, she says, before an inefficient appliance - from my own current experience, an LPG bottled gas-heated hot water system - reaches the end of its life.

Sue Barker says the first task for the group will be to start the conversation, as the group assesses where we are as a community transitioning to energy efficient electric, and she says watch this space. Early in 2024, Electrify 3442 will kick off activities with a survey, and after that will set the first group of households on the road to electrification. Will yours be among them?

Saving water in the garden

Woodend Primary School's Community Children's Garden is the lucky recipient of a Greater Western Water Thriving Communities Grant for 2023-24.

Auspiced by Woodend Landcare, the \$3,780 grant covers hardware and installation of an automated irrigation system in the school vegetable garden.

The programmable watering system enables:

- irrigation of the garden at the most beneficial times of day (i.e. early morning or late evening), so less water is lost through evaporation,
- water delivered directly to the soil, where it is needed (rather than on the leaves), and
- sufficient quantities of water to be dispensed, so that it soaks far down into the soil to encourage deep root growth.

Together with mulch on the soil surface and compost-rich soil (both of which help to keep the soil moist), this results in healthier, more resilient, more productive crops, water savings and less time school parents need to spend watering the garden over summer holidays!



Jason and the team from Midland Irrigation reused some of the old watering system that was salvaged when the garden was refurbished in 2017-2018. Not only did reusing old fittings and pipes save them from landfill, it also reduced the project costs.

Installation of some of the driplines was left to WPS Garden Club students. With the help of parent volunteers, the students had fun constructing the dripper systems ("It's just like a big toy set"), while also learning about water-saving and plant water needs.

In mid-December, supporters and sponsors of the project, Minister for Water Harriet Shing, Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas, Greater Western Water MD Maree Lang and Woodend Landcare President Peter Yates will be visiting Woodend Primary School's Community Children's Garden to see the irrigation system and Children's Garden Club in action.

With or without an automated irrigation system, follow the tips above to efficiently use water in your garden this summer. Your plants, both edible and inedible, and your bank balance, will thank you for it.

The Mystery monument of Woodend

Many of the town folk who have either played golf or just gone for an enjoyable walk on the Woodend Golf Club golf course will have seen the pictured directional monument or marker or cairn (a mound of rough stones) close to the current 17th green.

A tribute to a member of the Royal Australian **Air Force**

Aircraftsman Class 1, Thomas Dorney's life was lost in World War Two.

Three generations of the Dorney family from the Macedon Ranges attended a Last Post Ceremony to honour Thomas Dorney. The service was held on 20 October at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra.

Thomas Dorney of the No. 10 Squadron of Sunderland aircraft was killed in action during WW2 when the aircraft in which he was travelling was shot down into the Bay of Biscay with no survivors. The aircraft was near the French coast whilst conducting a search and rescue mission for a crew of a Wellington aircraft.

All crew members aboard the Sunderland aircraft were reported as missing in action. There had been no confirmation of the outcomes released. But recently, it was found that records were reported by another allied aircraft crew who witnessed the Sunderland crashing into the ocean and bursting into flames.

The Australian War Memorial now offers families the opportunity to have a Last Post Service. As a family we researched the history of Tom's life, details of which were sent to the War Memorial staff, who were then able to research military records to complete an accurate and informative history of Thomas Dorney.

At the Last Post Ceremony, the ten family members present felt honoured to hear service of Thomas Dorney to his country, which was read by a servicing senior officer of the Royal Australian Air Force.

Will there be a bad fire season this vear?

People often ask me whether this year is going to be a bad fire season and my answer is simple. We live in one of the most dangerously fire-prone areas in the world, so every fire season has the potential to be a bad one ... it just depends how bad!

All of the forecasts indicate that this year will be an extremely dangerous summer. In fact, with reasonable rains in recent years and strong spring growth, this year promises to be yet another very dangerous fire season. And now is the time to continue preparing and maintaining your property to reduce the risks of fire danger to you and your family.

The Fire Danger Period started Monday November 27 - any burn offs will require a council permit.

Now that burn off restrictions are in place, you will be forbidden to conduct a burn-off in any form, no matter the size of your property, unless you have an official permit from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council. Please check the Macedon Ranges Shire Council website for all information about burning off, including links to getting a permit.

If the CFA is called to an illegal burn off during the Fire Danger Period, the Police will be called to the scene and serious charges and penalties may be incurred. In fact, lighting a fire in the open without a permit is an offence and can bring a heavy fine or 12 months imprisonment.

The use of chainsaws, lawn mowers, ride-ons and grass trimmers during the Fire Danger Period.

In recent years, we have attended a number of fires that were started by machinery of some kind. Many of these were started by people using ride-on mowers in long or longish grass.

There are actually laws in place during the Fire Danger Period for using such machinery – ride-on mowers, chainsaws, lawn mowers, grass trimmers and other equipment.

The value of reading

There is little debate about the value of reading to young children. Every Wednesday, Goodstart Early Learning Centre in Woodend gets a visit from the second hand bookshop owner, Ed Irons.

In his trademark long coat, waistcoat and bowtie, 70-year-old Ed reads to toddlers, pre-kinders and kindergarten children. It is the ideal set-up, Ed says, as he has a large supply of books to choose

But it's more than just grabbing books: age appropriateness, opportunities for children to participate, and good stories are criteria for selection.

"I just love it. It makes my week," Ed says, "When I get back to the shop, I need to calm down with a coffee!" Excitement is mutual. When Ed gets out of his car, toddlers at the fence announce his arrival and run to the reading mat.

As an educator and parent, Ed is concerned to enable literacy at all levels. He spent many years in universities helping the transition of students from secondary school. He allays the fears of parents who think the screen will take over from books, by stressing how young children get a lifetime association with books from the adults who read to them at an early age.

A typical reading session will be two stories, then questions and comments. "Children just want to engage. Sometimes it's about the stories and sometimes it isn't. I get knock-knock jokes, or they tell me about their pets or holiday plans. I have been given drawings and hugs."

Message from your Woodend **Police Station Commander**

By the time this is published, it will only be weeks before we are looking back at 2023. Crime-wise we remain relatively similar to prior months; just the odd theft and damage and many communities would be envious of the fantastic community we have here in Woodend. I've mentioned this repeatedly, but I will bore you again and not only because we're heading into the silly season: the road toll is the highest in more than a decade and most of you will be aware of the recent tragedy we had not far from our community. All Police across

the state will be tasked with traffic enforcement, so don't be surprised when we stop you for a preliminary breath test, or far worse, for a traffic indiscretion

I'm aware that some of this information was on the front cover of last month's Woodend Star, flagging that all the emergency services are busily preparing for the upcoming fire season. I recently was in a state level meeting where a fire expert was asked, "What are you expecting this year?" He answered, "I'll tell you after Easter!" Needless to say, they are concerned. Now is the time to prepare, not once the temperature is regularly over 30 and you'd be cooking in the sun. It's far too late when you see smoke rolling down Black Forest Drive or Ashbourne Road. The CFA and the Red Cross have a number of useful documents available to help you prepare your homes. In summary, have a plan, but also have a plan B and then a Plan C. If your plan is to not be home in high-risk days please leave early, as its far too late once you see smoke.

Whilst we aren't the anti-fun police, the Fire Danger Period for Macedon Ranges Shire has been declared from 1am on the 27th of November 2023, and any fire lit in the open air within Macedon Ranges without a Permit will result in a court appearance. "You light it you own it". Police won't be issuing warnings and the consequences to life and property won't be glossed over. If in doubt, jump onto the CFA website to be clear on what you can and can't do.

Lastly, please have a safe end of year, it's nice to know that we will be out and about, but hopefully you don't need our expertise.

Victorian Clubs rewarded for Road Safety commitment

Victorian football and netball clubs will share in more than \$600,000 for their efforts in campaigning to eliminate road trauma in their communities.

The state government and the Transport Accident Commission have announced this year's recipients of the TAC Club Rewards program, which incentivises grassroots clubs across the state to show a commitment to promoting road safety during the 2023 season.

Delivered in partnership with AFL Victoria, 251 clubs will receive rewards of up to \$10,000 through the program, the highest number of recipients in the program's five years.

The program encourages clubs to engage with players, members and their communities on key road safety issues and promote safe behaviours, with the dangers of distracted driving a key focus of this year's campaign.

Successful clubs, which include the Woodend Hesket Football Club, are able to use the money for a range of initiatives, including education programs, club transport initiatives, new equipment and uniforms and facility upgrades and improvements.

So far this year, 236 people have died on Victoria's roads and more than half of those deaths have happened in regional areas, where tens of thousands of local footballers and netballers travel for games and training.

Distracted driving is one of the major causes of fatal and serious injury crashes on Victoria's roads and is particularly concerning on regional roads where people are travelling at higher speeds.

AFL Victoria-affiliated clubs from across the state were able to apply for the program by showing how they supported road safety throughout the year, including taking part in the TAC's Road Safety Round 'Band Together' campaign.

Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne said, "Victoria's grassroots football and netball clubs are influential in their communities, so it is wonderful to be able incentivise them to roll out critical initiatives that promote safer driving."The TAC Club Rewards Program is part of the TAC's 31-year partnership with AFL Victoria, which aims to empower clubs to develop a culture where all players and members are expected to be safe on the roads.







Fire Danger Period and heat preparations this summer

Residents are being urged to prepare for an increased likelihood of warmer and drier conditions over summer, with the Country Fire Authority (CFA) declaring the Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges to begin at 1am on 27 November 2023, to end on 1 May 2024 (unless otherwise advised). During the Fire Danger Period, no fire may be lit in the open air without a permit.

Council is focused on working with the community to collectively reduce our shire's fire risk, including undertaking an annual roadside slashing program across Council-managed roads to reduce the likelihood of fires starting from hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures and collisions.

Council's Municipal Fire Prevention Officers are also conducting property inspections across the shire to check for fire hazards and issue Fire Prevention Notices where appropriate.

Residents are reminded of the importance of being prepared for fires, and to ensure their properties are maintained to ensure there are minimum flammable fuels including stockpiles of green waste and foliage in gutters. Free green waste disposal is available for ratepayers and tenants at Council's transfer stations in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend.

ACVVS - we're coming to you!



Funding locked in for Sports Precinct's second stage

A second stage of the Macedon Ranges Regional Sports Precinct has been financially secured, through confirmation of a 2021 election funding commitment.

On 31 October, Council hosted a site visit with Federal Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories Kristy McBain and Federal Member for McEwen, Rob Mitchell, who viewed progress on Stage One of the priority project, which is on track for completion by May 2024.

Following construction starting last year and builder Monaco Hickey taking on the works

in June 2023, the first stage is progressing well to deliver a three-court sports hub, a natural turf oval and sports pavilion, passive recreation facilities, landscaping and associated infrastructure.

The Australian Government's \$15 million, alongside \$2 million from Council, will expand on this first stage to include the extension of the sports hub with three more multi-sport courts, more amenities, a second AFL/cricket oval, two outdoor sports courts, more car parking and landscaping.

Mayor Annette Death welcomed confirmation of the Australian Government's Stage Two funding, which would unlock even more benefits for user groups and the community.

"These new, modern facilities will ultimately mean that more people can actively participate in the sports and recreational

activities that they enjoy, both now and for generations to come," she said.

"I'd like to thank the Australian Government for its support to make the next stage a reality, and I'd also like to thank all our other funding contributors – including the Victorian Government, Melbourne Water and AFL Victoria – for helping us to get the first stage off the ground."

The Council-managed precinct will open to the public with limited use following the completion of Stage One works. The revised Stage Two of the precinct is currently being tendered out for detailed design and documentation, with construction targeted to start in late 2024/early 2025.



Woodend Guest Houses

Surrounded by hills and forests, with access to Hanging Rock, Trentham Falls and the benefits of mountain air, Woodend was by the 1920s a popular tourist destination. Several guest houses welcomed visitors until the 1930s, when numbers waned.

Braemar House, built in 1890, promoted the benefits of mountain air, and the extravagant style and luxurious accommodation attracted wealthy visitors but Braemar House struggled in the 1990s depression. It was sold in 1896/97 to William Knox, who had a new kitchen and servery built, servants' rooms and a children's hall. A billiards room replaced a south-facing verandah. However, eleven years later he sold to Miss Henderson, who opened Clyde School.

Devon Lodge in High Street, originally the site of Fahey's hotel from the 1850s, was run by the O'Brien family. In the 1940s it was advertised as a guest house in 'Where to Go', before becoming a special accommodation facility until the 2000s. Fontainbleau in Turner Road was a holiday house for Frederick McCubbin and his family until his death in 1917. Two years later, his widow, Annie, had built separate accommodation with 24 rooms and opened a guest house. Being fairly unsuccessful, she sold the property and the family moved. In 'Where to Go' 1961, it was still advertised as a guest house with eight rooms run by Mrs Ablitt.

Kynersley in Bowyers Road was another private home converted into a guest house during the busy tourist times of the 1920s. Where to Go' advertised it as being 1850 feet above sea level, with frequent train service to Woodend from the city, '... fresh milk, cream, butter. Conveyance meets all trains. Trips to beauty spots optional with tariff.' Mrs Florence Coop, widow of George, was the proprietress. Terms were 8 shillings per day, 42 per week.

Benvenuto, an historic country house built in the 1870s in Mt Macedon Road, is thought to have been a guest house for about ten years from 1929.

LINCS Program cultivates student engagement through community garden project



Sacred Heart College Kyneton offers a unique approach in supporting students who may grapple with disengagement and a lack of motivation towards their academic pursuits during the transition to Year 9. This approach comes in the form of the Learning, Initiating, Networking, and Connecting for Success (LINCS) Program.

Targeting the 8% of students disenchanted with Year 9, LINCS offers an alternative learning environment. It eschews conventional classroom focus for applied learning and hands-on experiences, seeking to rekindle enthusiasm. Central to this approach is the integration of the renowned Duke of Edinburgh Award framework, ensuring students not only explore diverse challenges but also receive formal recognition upon completion.

Within the LINCS program, students collaboratively design their learning experiences, encompassing physical activities, individual skill development,

community service, and adventurous pursuits. An illustrative example of this initiative was the collaboration between LINCS students and The Kyneton Community House for a significant Community Service Project started in 2021.

The joint endeavour aimed to revitalize the Community House Garden, a neglected space in need of rejuvenation. Despite initial setbacks due to the unforeseen challenges of the pandemic and inclement weather, the students persevered. Engaging a local garden designer and securing state government funding, they embarked on the ambitious task of transforming the overgrown garden into a multifaceted landscape comprising a fairy garden, sensory wall, water features, native plants, and vegetable gardens.

The subsequent two years presented hurdles, with COVID restrictions and harsh weather impeding progress. Nonetheless, the baton was passed to a new LINCS class in 2023. Undeterred by past setbacks, these students continued the original plan, modifying it as necessary. Fuelled by unwavering support

from the Community House staff, they forged ahead, unimpeded by the challenges that had plagued their predecessors.

The result of their dedication and teamwork is a vibrant and inviting garden that enriches the community space. Through this project, the LINCS students gained invaluable lessons in teamwork, patience, practical gardening skills, and an enduring sense of accomplishment.

The Sacred Heart Kyneton's LINCS program stands as a testament to the power of hands-on learning, fostering not just a garden but a profound sense of achievement and resilience among its students.
