Theme set for 2024 Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service

Planning is underway for the 2024 Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service, and the theme for the event has been unveiled by the volunteer organising committee. The focus for the 2024 service will be 'Honouring Every Role, Every Sacrifice', showcasing the different ways that Australians have served, and continue to serve, in wartime, conflict or peacekeeping. President of the Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service (MMADDS) Committee, Leona Latcham said the roles that constitute 'service' are so varied. "Our minds often jump to the commonly represented images of those who served, such as soldiers on the ground at the front line at the most familiar places of conflict throughout history, like Vietnam and Gallipoli," said Leona. "We want to acknowledge the many ways that Australians work to serve and protect our country, from the mechanics who maintained the army's fleet of vehicles, to the peacekeepers in Rwanda. The stories, sacrifices and contributions of all who served are powerful, important and deserving of our thanks and attention. "Leona said they are keen to hear from any locals who may want to help out, and encouraged people to get in touch with the committee.

"We're calling out for anyone interested in volunteering on the day. The event now attracts around 2,000 attendees from the Central Victoria region and also from Melbourne and broader Victoria. Many people don't realise that the Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service is put together by a small, dedicated group of volunteers with the generous financial support from our sponsors.

"On the day of the service, we have wonderful assistance from community groups including CFA, SES and Scouts, but we are always in need of additional hands to help coordinate on the morning and ensure it flows smoothly and safely. If you're interested in donating your time, please get in touch.

Kate's big run

Hearing about this I knew this story had to be told. Kate MacMunn, a woman from Woodend, a midwife and mother of three just completed the Great Southern Endurance Run.

Starting the 100-mile (162 kilometre) event from Harrietville, out and up over Feathertop, out to the Viking and back; Kate completed it in 36 hours and 19 minutes of continuous running. She was the fastest woman in the event by five hours, and she was fourth-placed overall in an international field. Runners drink and eat on the run, fuelled at a number of points on the course, running through the night on walking tracks climbing 10,600 metres in elevation.

When I talked to Kate about this incredible achievement, she reflected that she has always been looking for ways to find the limits of her capacity. This ultra-marathon, while a profound test of physical endurance, was primarily a test of mental fortitude, about which she is deeply proud. Kate has taken on challenges before: the motorbike ride from Vladivostok to Copenhagen with her husband Ben Cumming through Mongolia, the "-stans" and into Europe. Then a little later, Copenhagen to Cape Town, down the west coast of Africa. That's another series of big stories.

While proud of herself and the Amazonian achievement of this recent marathon, she speaks glowingly about her community of support: the women she trains with who bolstered her morale through the months of training (90–140km/week), and her husband, kids, parents, outlaws and siblings who stepped up and supported her through the rigours of training, preparation and the event itself. A stirring, inspiring story of belief and support for a brave woman's goal.

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Macedon event lends a compassionate ear to inventions that could change the world

In a world of self-aggrandising presentations and Al-authored promotions, it's heartening to find a group of medical technologists advocating for a return to simpler, more direct communications with their customers–connecting with the very human needs that should drive all meaningful innovation.

Perhaps it was the Zen-like calm of Mount Macedon, where the Woodend-based hearing scientist Dr Elaine Saunders convened the inaugural session of Mountain Mentoring, a novel networking event to help biomedical researchers share their projects and discuss new commercialisation strategies.

Or perhaps it was the underlying inspiration provided by Elaine and her partner, Dr Peter Blamey, who made audiological history in 2019 with the sale of their pioneering system for self-assessing and managing customised hearing aids.

Whatever the inspiration, Mountain Mentoring – held at the kindlydonated premises of Mount Macedon Realty – provided a unique forum for 12 trailblazing scientists to exchange ideas on several potentially life-changing projects, and to reflect deeply on the potential of medical breakthroughs in a headlong world.

Take-home inspiration

The humanist 'take-home message' was powerfully captured by Dr Sophie Brice, a digital researcher at the Australian Institute of Health Service Management, who concluded the day's presentations by observing, "What's inside the customer's head is rarely the same as what the clinician is thinking. The service side is where we need more conversation – on engaging customers, earning their trust, and finding out what they really think and need."

The founding members of Mountain Mentoring had a wide range of human needs in their sights, including several that could put Australia on the world map. They include a diagnostic device for dry eye disease being jointly developed by researchers at the University of Melbourne and RMIT University; a Bionics Institute project that's using infrared light to map changes in the tinnitus-afflicted brain; and an Eltham man who's breeding algae in his garage to show farmers how they might grow this compelling, climate-friendly fuel.

Much of the day's discussion focused on the propensity of medtech startups to drift from the human need for their products in the race to adopt the latest whizzbang technology, to tick the right 'boxes' for investors, or – worse – to focus on the most lucrative or headline-grabbing market.

World-first inventions

Tinnitus was high on the agenda, with the Bionics Institute researcher, Dr Mehrnaz Shoushtarian, joined by Sydney-based bioengineer Matthieu Recugnat, whose startup MindEar has devised "the world's first Al companion" for tinnitus sufferers.

Both Mehrnaz and Matthieu acknowledged the steep challenges of seeking investment for their work: while it may affect up to 15% of the population, the sheer complexity of tinnitus – its mysterious causes, multifaceted treatments, and "unmonetisable" diagnoses – remain major hurdles to investment.

Perception was central to the discussion, as participants weighed the "disconnect" between the number of people who suffer from hearing loss and those who actively seek out a hearing aid. Some may be put off by the appearance or the cost, or have tried a substandard device and simply lost faith in the idea.

"It's all about understanding the market, positioning yourself and targeting your niche," advised Elaine, whose remote 'teleaudiology' system was bought by global hearing giant Sonova in 2019. "The most important information you need to build a business is always going to come from your customers."

Making it personal

Melbourne audiologist Dr Caitlin Barr gave the participants pause for thought with a moving account of her battles with neurodiversity, and how her experiences with "medication-focused" doctors had driven her appreciation of a more empathetic, holistic approach to hearing loss. Today, she is CEO of Soundfair, a charity that runs a social-enterprise hearing centre which aims to address the huge range of social, emotional and behavioural impacts of hearing loss through audiology, psychology, and everything in between.

"The problem is far more than hearing loss, it's all the different impacts on your life," asserted Caitlin. "In order to move to a more holistic and meaningful service, clinicians need to adopt a wholeof-person approach to their patients, and really get emotionally involved."

Matthieu cited research that showed 60-70% of hearing aid customers say the relationship with their audiologist is the most important part of any hearing service. "Being a human being and providing a caring service, not just a hearing aid," is how he put it.

Connecting with customers

He was backed by Rob Poulsen from Audeara, a Brisbane-based startup that tailors its sound-enhancing headphones through a sophisticated online hearing test. Rob described his team's delicate balancing act between a software package to help clinicians program its headphones, and the direct links it can establish with customers through its in-house app.

"Marketing departments are often so far removed from the experiences of their customers," said Rob, "when ultimately, nothing is more important than that relationship and trust."

If there was one overriding lesson from the day, it was the importance of this personal approach – this establishment of care and connection with the end user – as a vital component of any new health product.

When Elaine and Peter set up Blamey Saunders Hears, they employed a group of tele-audiologists to guide users through their then entirely novel approach to online hearing diagnosis. One of their first employees was Dr Sophie Brice.

"It was immediately clear how important it was to listen to the customer, and have the knowledge and understanding to answer their questions in a genuinely caring manner," said Sophie. "We were providing a hearing service – which is, after all, also a listening service."

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Open Garden raising funds to help refugees settle in Woodend

"To plant a garden is to believe in tomorrow" – Audrey Hepburn

In the Macedon Ranges we are lucky to live amongst some of the most beautiful gardens in Victoria, if not Australia. One such private garden will soon be open to the public for the first time. Stone Hill is a private garden in Woodend North that is known and admired worldwide.

Designed by Woodend local Michael McCoy, author and host of ABC TV's Dream Gardens, Stone Hill has been featured in such prestigious magazines as *Gardens Illustrated* (UK) and *Garden Design* (USA), as well as lavishly illustrated garden books *Dreamscapes, Australian Dreamscapes* and *Wild*.

With naturalistic planting based largely on perennials, Stone Hill is a garden full of flower colour and foliage texture in a constant state of seasonal flux. It was designed to require minimal irrigation, a perfect example of planting thriving in local conditions.

Owners Sue and Gerry Moriarty will make their garden available as a special fundraising initiative for Woodend Refugee Resettlement (WRR). Recently formed, WRR is a group of locals who will be assisting newly-arrived refugee families to settle in Woodend through financial and practical support. Working closely with CRISP, Community Refugee Integration and Settlement Pilot, a federal government initiative, the group welcomes one family at a time, helping them find accommodation, employment, translation/ language services, as well as to navigate the health and education systems and to connect directly with our community and culture upon arrival.

Switching on to the benefits of household electrification







A recent Monash University report has highlighted a range of benefits flowing from household electrification.

"Switching on: Benefits of Household Electrification in Australia" lists among the benefits:

- Cost savings: Victorian households stand to save over \$1000 per year by electrifying their gas heating, water heating and cooking. New electric appliances are more efficient than gas, producing less waste heat, and elimination of gas connections (or bottle hire) add to the cost savings.
- Future proofing: gas prices are rising almost twice as fast as electricity prices. If that trend continues, the cost savings from electrification will increase.
- Health benefits: burning gas indoors results in particulates and combustion products that are hazardous to health, increasing the risk of asthma and respiratory conditions.

Local project Electrify 3442 will work with households to realise those benefits and to expand the cost savings that are made through household solar and battery installations and uptake of electric vehicles.

Sue Barker, Electrify 3442 project team member, says: "A community survey in March will explore uptake of electric appliances, solar and home batteries and electric vehicles and the factors preventing households going "all electric", as a basis for future support activities. Catch us at the Woodend Farmers' Market in March and look for invitations to participate all around the district.

EPA Fire Prevention Program will use drone flyovers this summer

EPA Victoria will use drone flyovers this summer to check that waste and resource recovery businesses throughout the northwest region are doing all they can to prevent fires breaking out. As summer temperatures rise, so does the potential for fires at facilities that store waste materials. EPA's Fire Prevention Program plans to operate random flyovers using drones and thermal imaging technology to check for hot spots, ensure waste piles are being properly managed and fire risks have been reduced. Between November 2022 and October 2023, 380 fire prevention inspections of waste and recovery facilities were conducted.

Some of the hazards and unsafe practices found include the improper management and storage of combustible and recyclable waste, failing to identify risks on site and inadequate maintenance of fire suppression equipment.

Under Victoria's new environment protection law, duty holders must understand fire risks and use appropriate measures to eliminate or reduce them.

Woodend Landcare wins MRSC Community Award 2024

Woodend Landcare members past and present are grateful and proud to have been awarded Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Community Awards 2024 – Healthy People and Environment Award.



Woodend Landcare Inc. and its predecessor 'Friends of Five Mile Creek' have been active in Woodend for nearly 30 years. Run and organised by volunteers, the group has done an enormous amount of work on public land along Five Mile Creek and its tributaries within and around Woodend, such as Slatey Creek Reserve and various railway reserves. Woodend Landcare conducts about ten Sunday morning working bees every year and the 'Thursday Crew' works every week when weather permits. These are open for anyone to attend, and the group is always happy for non-Landcare members to join in and join up (see woodendlandcare.org).

As well as along Five Mile Creek, Woodend Landcare provides advice and guidance on request to local groups and private landholders. Woodend Landcare is a member of the Upper Campaspe Landcare Network and works closely with the Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC), North Central Catchment Management Authority (NCCMA) and local community groups and schools.

The aim of Woodend Landcare has always been to restore areas which have been degraded by introduced weeds, and to preserve and enhance areas of indigenous vegetation. In all, its volunteers have planted over 30,000 native plants. One particular focus has been ensuring the survival of Woodend's unique threatened tree, the Black Gum (Eucalyptus aggregata).

Woodend Landcare also supports the Indian myna trapping project (MRIMAG) and one committee member performs 'Waterwatch' in collaboration with NCCMA, to monitor water quality in Five Mile Creek. We have provided numerous letters of support and have auspiced projects run by other groups and private landholders that align with our 'caring for the land' values.

In 2023, Woodend Landcare also oversaw the construction of a new pedestrian bridge over Five Mile Creek, thanks to a bequest from Woodend Landcare's ex-President, Jo Clancy. This, together with all the work undertaken by Woodend Landcare volunteers, is for the benefit of all Woodenders to enjoy.

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Important conference for recreational beekeepers

Melbourne, Saturday 9 March: "Ahead and ready for the likely arrival of Varroa destructor"

The Victorian Apiarists' Association (VAA) is organising a conference for hobbyist beekeepers, who number at least 14,000 across Melbourne and regional Victoria.

The Recreational Conference for beekeepers will inform home apiarists about a real threat to beekeeping that looms on the horizon in the form of the Varroa destructor. This pest, approaching Victoria from across the Murray, may arrive in Victoria within the next twelve months, and could lead to a total loss to beekeepers of their bees.

The Recreational Conference will build recreational beekeepers' skills, inform them of remedies, and help them meet today's biosecurity challenges in the time of varroa, protecting their often quite substantial investment in hives, bees and the recommended safety equipment, all of which can cost \$1,000 or more.

This special workshop will empower you and give you tools to identify local risks and plan for what you will do in an emergency. Planning for bushfire can be tough, so why do it alone?

There is no cost to attend this small-group Fire Safety Planning workshop, but numbers are limited to just 16 places.

Fire Safety Planning Workshops run for around three hours. That might seem like a long session, but taking a bit of time now will help you to think clearly and make decisions when it really counts.

Remember - if you are caught in a bushfire, it will be noisy, smoky, hot and extremely stressful. A well-thought-out plan can make all the difference.

- use local knowledge to prepare for a range of fire scenarios
- receive practical, hands-on guidance from CFA to help you start, improve or review your plan
- work alongside others and share ideas.

Get your water sorted for fire season

With a hot, dry summer expected, Greater Western Water (GWW) is urging residents to know what to do if their water supply is affected by a bushfire or grassfire.

Just as it's important for residents to prepare their properties and fire plans, GWW also prepares its teams, equipment and infrastructure for the annual fire season.

In a major fire event, water supply can't be guaranteed as it comes under extreme demand from firefighters and residents.

There are simple steps GWW customers can take to prepare, including:

- Keep a supply of drinking water in your emergency kit.
- Make sure your mobile phone number is up to date by calling 13 44 99 or visiting gww.com.au/contact, as GWW uses text messages, their website and social media to provide updates.
- Find your closest fire hydrant and clear any grass or shrubs that could slow down access to it.

Jodie Hallam, GWW General Manager of Operations and Delivery Solutions, said that in a bushfire customers may experience low water pressure, lack of supply or reduced water quality.

"We service municipalities that are at increased fire risk, including Hume, Macedon Ranges, Melton, Moorabool, Wyndham, Brimbank and Hobsons Bay," she said.

"I encourage everyone to review the Fire Ready Kit available on the CFA website, as it provides lots of helpful advice on how to prepare for fire season, including setting up water supplies that are independent from mains.

"Our crews will be active in communities over the coming months maintaining network reliability. We will work closely with CFA in the event of a bushfire, to ensure access to water supplies and minimise disruption to customers."

The Woodend Primary School Community Children's Garden will be a welcoming space for local families and kids to grow fresh produce, get active and learn, thanks to a new irrigation system.

In partnership with Woodend Landcare, Greater Western Water contributed

\$3,780 towards the installation of a new irrigation system with timer – helping to keep the children's garden green and thriving while saving students and parents precious time.

The project has been delivered as part of Greater Western Water's Thriving Communities Grants and Sponsorship Program.

Before the irrigation system was installed, students and volunteers had a roster to hand water the plants – a task that often took over an hour to complete.

Woodend Primary's Community Children's Garden irrigation system is programmed to water the garden consistently and efficiently yearround, adjusted to meet the needs of healthy plants and produce. The garden offers a weekly outdoor learning experience for students to learn about plant sciences and gardening techniques, and to develop a greater appreciation of all aspects of our fragile ecosystem.

Woodend Primary's community garden will help foster a sense of community for parents and local volunteers as a place to collaborate in growing and maintaining this special space.

Food grown at the school is offered for sale for fundraising or taken home by students and volunteers, with excess produce donated to the Woodend Neighbourhood House food bank and community lunches.

Of the project, Mary-Anne Thomas, Member for Macedon said, "This new irrigation system will deliver so many benefits to local students and parents as they learn how to take care of plants and grow their own produce to eat at home or share with local charities." Grant program making kinders more inclusive

More than 330 kindergartens across Victoria are sharing in \$10 million to upgrade facilities and buy specialist equipment.

Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn announced the grant recipients of funding that will help make sure all early learning facilities give children the support they need to reach their full potential at kinder. Sixty-five kindergartens will upgrade buildings and playgrounds, while 268 will be able to purchase equipment to boost inclusive learning, such as mobility stools or sensory equipment, giving children of all abilities the chance to participate fully in kindergarten programs.

The Building Blocks Inclusion grants provide up to \$10,000 for inclusive equipment and \$200,000 for building and playground upgrades.

The Building Blocks program – which also includes grants for infrastructure planning – offers grants to contribute to kindergarten infrastructure and is critical to ensure the successful rollout of the Best Start, Best Life reforms across Victoria.

Since it was launched in 2020, Building Blocks has provided over \$190 million to plan, build, and improve early childhood services across the state.

The Best Start, Best Life reforms, help children thrive, save families money and support parents – especially women – to return to work or study if they choose. The Victorian Budget 23/24 invests an additional \$1.2 billion to build or expand around 145 kindergartens across the state, supporting the delivery of 15 hours of free Three-Year-Old Kindergarten each week by 2029 and 30 hours of free Pre-Prep each week by 2032.

Minister for Children, Lizzie Blandthorn said, "These grants ensure hundreds of kindergartens have the facilities and equipment they need to give Victorian children a great start in life – no matter their abilities."

Saving families money and helping enrol kids in kinder

The State Government is making it easier to find a kindergarten place by boosting funding for local council central enrolment systems.

Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn announced a significant increase in funding to expand the Central Registration and Enrolment Schemes (CRES) Administrative Support Grants program.

The funding increase will support operating costs to enable councils to provide registration and enrolment services at no cost to families – helping up to 140,000 children benefitting from this once-in-a-generation reform, saving families up to \$2,500 per child every year.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council was successful in obtaining the funding.

This extra funding recognises the crucial role councils play in supporting the nation-leading Best Start, Best Life reforms that provide all Victorian children with access to two years of free, quality kindergarten.

A CRES is a single point for families to apply for multiple services within a local government area, helping them secure a kindergarten place that best meets their needs.

Mary-Anne Thomas, Member for Macedon said, "Councils play a critical role in the Best Start, Best Life reforms. This funding will ensure local families can access kinder easily to have the best start to life, no matter where they live." As well as simplifying the registration and enrolment process, a CRES can work with other services such as Maternal and Child Health to engage vulnerable and disadvantaged families who need more support.

In 2023, more councils delivered a CRES than ever before, with approximately 69,000 children enrolled through a CRES up from 63,000 enrolments in 2022.

This new investment will see all CRES councils offered an increase in their annual base funding. This will include extra supports for those councils with high numbers of enrolments and rural councils.

The Best Start, Best Life reforms are deliver free kinder across Victoria, a year of universal pre-prep, and establishing 50 government-operated childcare centres.

Young People as Agents of Change

Young People as Agents of Change is a collaborative effort in the Macedon Ranges, working with young individuals and partners like Council and the Centre Against Sexual Assault Central Victoria (CASACV).

2024 School Immunisation Program

If you have a child in Year 7 or Year 10 at secondary school in 2024, look out for immunisation information provided by their school. Some vaccines are routinely provided free of charge to all Victorian secondary school students.

Students in Year 7 (or aged 12-13 years) receive the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine (one dose) and the diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) combined vaccine (one dose).

Students in Year 10 (or aged 15-16 years) receive the Meningococcal ACWY vaccine (one dose).

Your child's school will support these important immunisations, together with Council, as part of the Secondary School Immunisations Program (SSIP). They will communicate with you about upcoming immunisation sessions at school, and you will receive information about providing consent for your child to be immunised.

Protect yourself from mosquito-borne disease

Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites. In Australia, some of these include Murray Valley encephalitis virus, Ross River virus, Barmah Forest virus, Dengue virus, Japanese encephalitis and West Nile virus.

Periods of heavy rainfall or floods can lead to ideal breeding conditions for mosquitoes, even in non-tropical areas. Diseases that are spread by insects are known as 'vector-borne' diseases. Mosquito-borne diseases can make people ill and, in severe cases, can cause death.

How to avoid mosquito bites:

There are many simple things you can do to avoid getting bitten by mosquitoes, including:

- wearing long, loose-fitting clothes if mosquitoes are around
- covering up as much as possible
- using an effective mosquito repellent, containing either picaridin or diethyltoluamide (DEET) on all exposed skin
- using plug-in mosquito vaporisers or diffusers with repellenttreatment pads in enclosed external areas like verandahs and decks – these should be switched off as soon as the area is no longer in use
- preventing mosquito breeding around your own home
- maintaining fly screens on windows, doors, vents and chimneys (screens should be no coarser than 12 x 12 meshes per 25mm, or 1.2mm - use an even coarser mesh if you wish to keep out other smaller biting insects, like sandflies)
- using mosquito coils in outdoor areas these should be supervised at all times.

Council understands that it has again been a stressful time for some residents in our Shire with the weather and rainfall over the last few months. Our Officers continue to work with the Victoria State Emergency Service (SES), the various water and catchment authorities and other organisations preparing throughout the year and during these times of emergency. The reports and videos that you are able to provide to Council are valuable in providing us with information to assess and address issues, and we continue to look to find solutions as we expect these events will increase in frequency.

Local businesses are encouraged to enter the 2024 Josh's Rainbow Eggs Macedon Ranges Business Excellence awards. It's a chance for us to recognise outstanding service, innovation, products and professionalism, and acknowledge those that work so hard to provide service above and beyond ... and we know there are many local businesses and people out there that do this. Council is currently running a pilot program at Woodend and Kyneton primary schools until October called "Branch Out", which is working to provide better mental health support for primary schoolaged children and is being implemented through things such as music and theatre, training and seminars for teachers and parents, and referral pathways. Following the assessment and review, the aim is to then extend it to all primary schools in the Shire.

The Macedon Ranges Regional Sports precinct is also progressing at a great pace and is scheduled to open this year, which we are all very excited about. We know many sport and recreation clubs and other groups have been in discussions with Council preparing for this.

You may be aware that the Malmsbury Youth Justice Centre (MYJC) no longer houses any young people, and the decommissioning process continues. The facility and land are owned by the State Government, who have committed to provide an opportunity for the community and stakeholders to be involved in the consultation process for the future use of the site, which is positive news. Hopefully we will know more details about the timeline and process soon.

December 2023 Council Meeting wrap

Several guiding documents endorsed and more draft policies out for consultation in 2024

A number of important items were endorsed at the last Council Meeting for 2023, including four different plans, reports or strategies that were adopted following earlier community consultation:

Macedon

Ranges

- the Macedon Ranges Shire Thematic Environmental History Report, which will be used to guide heritage protection and to inform the draft Heritage Strategy 2024. The report identifies the unique history that has played a role in the development of the shire over the last two centuries, covering key themes including how the environment was shaped, people migration settlement, and the development of industry and farming.
- the Stanley Park Environmental Management Plan for Stanley Park in Mount Macedon, which provides an updated vision for the park and will guide future revegetation projects. The2023 EMP was developed in collaboration with the Stanley Park Community Asset Committee and Melbourne Water, providing revised guidance for the management of the reserve over the next ten years and informing an Infrastructure Master Plan for the reserve.
- the Climate Emergency Plan 2023-30 (CEP), developed through the Cooler-ER Change initiative, which aims to accelerate action in the shire to address climate change. The Reincludes a total of 56 actions across six themes to mitigate and adapt to the current Climate Emergency, and was collaboratively developed alongside the community, relevant agencies and the Victorian Government.
- the Mobility and Road Safety Strategy 2023-32, which identifies key road safety issues in the shire and will assist in the implementation of proactive initiatives to enhance safety for all road users. The strategy supports Council's and the Victorian Government's vision of reducing road fatalities and crash injuries within the Macedon Ranges over the next ten years. It also includes non-vehicle road user considerations in road design and targets a reduction in wildlife road trauma.

Council also endorsed a number of initiatives to go out for community consultation in early 2024, to account for the upcoming extended school holiday period and to support maximum engagement:

- Draft Complaint and Unreasonable Behaviour Policy: the draft policy outlines how Council will manage complaints and unreasonable behaviour and provides clear guidance for both the complainant and Council. The draft will be available for public consultation in February 2024.
- Draft Special Charge Scheme Policy: this policy applies to Special Charge Scheme (SCS)infrastructure projects such as resident-funded upgrading of roads and drainage. It outlines the decision-making process and criteria for SCS projects where providing these services or infrastructure items is deemed to provide a special benefit to property owners or certain community members.
- Draft Fair Access Policy: this policy supports Council in the identification and removal of systemic factors contributing to gender inequality relating to the availability of quality community sports infrastructure at times that are suitable.

In other matters, Council:

- renewed an agreement with the North Central Goldfields Regional Library Corporation (the Corporation) to continue services whilst longer-term arrangements are being finalised
- endorsed the allocation of \$12,150 to five applicants under the Small Project Grants program (funding for the 2023/24 program has now been expended, with the next round due to open on July 2024).

The Woodend Horse Trough

A love of animals inspired George Bills of Camberwell to leave £70,000 for the construction of ornamental concrete troughs for horses and cattle around Australia. In 1931, Mr Fleicher, Woodend's Shire Secretary, applied to the Bills Estate for funding, and the trough was installed at the intersection of Urquhart and High Streets the following year. On 3 December 1932, the *Woodend Star* announced that it was "to be regarded as an acquisition to the town. Connected with the horse trough is a smaller one for the benefit of thirsty dogs, surmounted by a drinking fountain that people may use under hygienic conditions." A marble tablet states that the trough was donated by Annis and George Bills, Australia. George Bills was born in Brighton in Sussex, England, in 1859. Ten years later, he and his family migrated to New Zealand before he and some of his siblings moved to Victoria in 1873. He and his brother Harry moved to Sydney in 1880, where Harry established a successful wire-working business at the Quay. George chose Brisbane to set up a similar business two years later, with a partner William Brown. In 1883, brothers Richard and Walter Bills moved to Brisbane with a mattress machine coiler which Walter had invented. The mattress business boomed; George converted to mattress-making in Brisbane, and Walter established his mattress company in Melbourne known as BBB Mattresses.

George married Annis Elizabeth Swann in Brisbane in 1885. They then set sail for England, where George managed brother Harry's mattress business in Liverpool. Walter joined them and the company became known as Bills Brothers. When George retired, he moved back to Camberwell in Victoria, where he pursued his interest in animal welfare. In 1924, he became a Life Governor of the RSPCA. He died in 1927, and his Trust enabled the opening of the Tally Ho Home in Burwood for dogs, cats and other pets. In 2005, to mark the centenary of Rotary International, Woodend Rotary restored the trough.
